WORST STORM IN HISTORY

There was never in the memory of man been such a stormy month as the February just ending. A week ago a furious gale completely tied up all traffic, and all trains were many hours late. Mails were delayed, and highways so blocked that practically all business has been at a standstill for a week. But the heaviest blow of all came yesterday afternoon and lasted all night. At time of going to press roads are drifting faster than they can be cleared out. There have been no trains from the south in 24 hours, the northbound express getting no further than Woodstock yesterday where also the southbound train was held. It is expected that these trains will attempt to reach their destinations today.

The conditions of this month recall a winter 34 years ago, which goes into history as "the winter of the deep snow." That winter set in early and during January there was the old-fashioned "thaw" and after freezing again there was ice everywhere, so that the young people went anywhere they wished on skates on the river, ponds, or through the fields. On Saturday, Feb. 18, heavy snow began to fall, and it continued to snow until Monday with a strong wind. It is said that the fall amounted to five feet. Every mode of travel was effectually tied up. The railway was blocked until the following Friday, there being no trains at all for just a week.

On April 10 of the same year there was still four feet of snow in the open fields. Then thawing came rapidly and the river rose to greater height than it had reached since 1887, so the records stated, and the Matheson Island was so inundated that a barn on its highest part floated away bodily.

PURE BRED BULLS

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, Makes Announcement

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, announces that definite arrangements have been made with the Dominion Live Stock Branch for a continuation of the policy of loaning Pure Bred Bulls free of charge to farmers that will organize in the form of an association. Ten members will constitute an association. Associations receiving bulls must make provision for proper care and treatment. Bulls will be delivered to nearest railway station.

Under this policy thirty-four Bulls were placed in New Brunswick last year and will make a marked improvement in the live stock of the province. There are still many sections that might well avail themselves of this opportunity of improving their stock.
