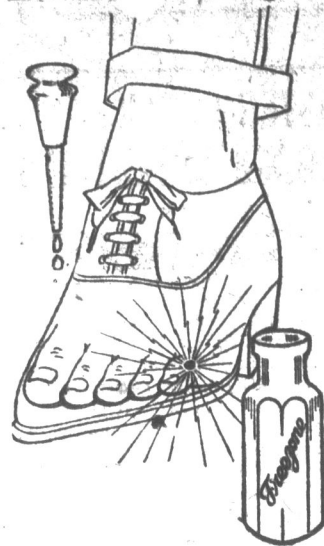


## CORNS

## BRISTOL SCHOOLS—PAST AND PRESENT

The first school in this place was built about 30 years ago near the place where the residence of Theodore Rogers now stands. The little brook which rippled near the door was called "School Brook," now called Tapley Brook.

Old time school house were built in the following manner:—The neighbors would gather for the woods; haul logs, fashion corners by dove-tailing or saddling. There would be laid up about 7 feet high—beams would be put across the top and then the roof was put on, made of shaved shingles or split. The building would have from two to four windows, a chimney built of flat stones and mud at the end. The furniture consisted of long rows of benches on each side against the wall with long high desks parallel to the seats. Lewie was burned to "fink" or fill the cracks on the inside and the outside cracks were "finked" with moss. To prepare for winter, a trench was dug around this structure to get enough mud to throw up a banking about 8 feet high. Early or primitive schools having floors, other than cedar or pine were not very durable, lasting on an average, ten years.

The manner of engaging teachers was singular and often the position was precarious. The terms were called "quarters." A man considering himself a pedagogue would come into a settlement and announce his intentions of "keeping a school." He visited the homes and solicited pupils asking how many could be signed for. If there were four old enough to attend—the attendance for two was engaged at \$3.00 per quarter. Alternate Saturdays the school was closed; holidays extended from Christmas to New Years. The teacher boarded at the homes of his pupils—a week at each place. This system has some serious disadvantages.

The second school house was built near where the United Baptist church now stands. The main highway then followed the hills about a quarter of mile back from the present road. The road diverged from its present place between Florenceville and Bristol near the residence of Harry Smith, passing in front of Frank Baker's and following the first rise on the natural terrace of this beautiful stretch of land, crossing the aforesaid school brook and passing the land which now included in the beautiful grounds about the homes of A. W. Phillips, Harry Street and Rainforth Giberson. The little Shikhehawk was crossed by a bridge above the site of the roller flour mill and passed thru the land of Geo. Caldwell, entering what was later the trotting park, crossing the Big Shikhehawk about ten rods back or up stream from the present covered bridge, followed the edge of the bank and journeyed thru poled road, about the end of the bridge now standing.

The third school house was built on the lands belonging now to the Bristol Woodworking factory, the road having been changed in the meantime.

## ASK PROVINCE DEVELOP POWER

Fredericton, Feb. 21—The Provincial government were urged today by a delegation from the town of Grand Falls not to renew the rights of the Grand Falls Company, which now controls the Grand Falls power on the St. John River, when they expire on May 1 next, but undertake the public development of the potential water powers under the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission.

Premier Ventor in replying to the delegation stated that the government were not yet ready to make a statement of their policy in regard to the important matter which they had urged, but said that complete information on the subject is now being secured. He intimated that the government might be in a position to announce its definite decision before the conclusion of the coming session of the legislature.

Mayor Collins of Grand Falls, head of the delegation, which included Messrs. Costigan, Rideout, and McCleary. They were introduced by Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, formerly M.L.A. for Victoria county.
