LIEUT. GOV, TODD VISITS HARTLAND

Although Wet and Cloudy Enthusiasm
Not Dampened

On Friday last, Hartland, for the first time, was honored by a visit from a representative of his Gracious Majesty, in the person of Hon. William F. Todd, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, who arrived by auto about 2 p.m., accompanied by Mrs. Todd, R. S. Baker, the Governor's private secretary, and Col. W. C. Good, his military aid. The gubernatorial party were met at the town limits by the Woodstock band and a detachment of returned men in uniform under the command of Maj. W. A. McDougall. Other officers in line were Maj. Bull, and Lieutenants Flemming, Boyer, Rigby and Golding.

Accompanied by His Worship Mayor McFarland, and Mrs. McFarland, the party proceeded to the new school building where the reception ceremony took place in the assembly hall. Mayor McFarland presided with his usual grace and dignity. Mrs. George O. Britton on behalf of the Women's Institute read a happy address of welcome to Mrs. Todd, which was responded to by that lady in a few brief and well chosen words.

At this point a beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented to Mrs. Todd, the presentation being made by little Miss Dorothy Laskey.

Mayor McFarland, on behalf of the town and Fred W. Smith, M.L.A., on behalf of the local members, then read addresses of welcome to the Governor, which we are giving in full in this issue of the Observer. These addresses speak for themselves, but the least that can be said is that their charming unconventionality, happy phrasing, wealth of classical allusions, and the genuine heights of real eloquence displayed therein put them in a class by themselves, making them models for future generations. Mayor McFarland, in his address, surprised even his most intimate friends, and definitely clinched his claim to a third turn in the Mayor's chair, if any additional argument was required.

The platform, and the Governor's table later, were graced by the august presence of the town Council, and their charming wives, the clergymen of the town, the three local members for the County, and their equally charming better-halves.

Notwithstanding the bad weather, a good sized crowd was in attendance and the supper put on by the returned men, with the assistance of the Eastern Star and the Women's Institute was a decided success, and we are very glad to learn that notwithstanding all the drawbacks, the net returns were over \$200, which will go to swell the returned men's "memorial fund." The conduct of the returned men, in spite of certain discouraging incidents, is beyond praise. Suffice it to say, that they lived up to the best traditions of the British army, which is first of all, to be a good sport.

We regret that we cannot give the Governor's remarks in full, but His Honor expressed his pleasure at being present, his appreciation of Carleton county in general, and the Town of Hartland in particular, pointing out future developments which might be expected, and the need of wider markets for farm produce. Incidentally, His Honor intimated the wish that in the coming American election a party might come in power who would be inclined to throw down some of the tariff bars which now prevent our farm produce from obtaining an entry into that country.

A pleasing feature of the Governor's address was his kindly references to the returned men and the veteran James A. Barter, five of whose sons served in the Great War.

We also desire to express to you personally our sincere and hearty congratulations upon your appointment to your present high and honor-

able position, an appointment eminently justified by your own merit, and by the high and honorable position which your family and name have always occupied in this Province.

AUTOMOBILE - ACCIDENTS

An automobile collision occurred at Somerville, on Saturday, when a car driven by Blake Glass was struck by a large touring car driven by two women belonging to Fort Fairfield, Me., and practically demolished. It is said that Mr. Glass was going over a blind knoll when the large touring car crashed into him. Fortunately none of the occupants were injured. It is said that the women paid over \$600 to make good the damage resulting.

At Simonds, Sunday afternoon, a car driven by John Belyea ran into a stretch of gravel and turned over. Mrs. Belyea was thrown out and her arm and collar bone broken. She was conveyed to the Fisher Memorial Hospital in Woodstock. Mrs. Belyea escaped with a few bruises and a bad shaking up. Mr. and Mrs. Belyea reside at Windsor. On Thursday another accident occurred across the river at the Presque Isle hill. A Maine car contain four men went over a steep bank, plunging through bushes and trees. A rescuing party arriving to clear a road and draw the car up by chains and horse power, had a very difficult time as the chain broke as they had the car near the top and it went rolling down the bank again. They succeeded in getting it to the top safely at the second attempt. Strange to say the car was not injured in the least and stranger to say the occupants though unable to assist at all nor get themselves to the top of the hill were also unhurt.
