WARREN M. RIDEOUT

On June 27 Warren M. Rideout died at his home in Somerville after a lingering illness of heart disease. Three days before his death he was stricken

with paralysis from which he did not regain consciousness. He was the son of the late George Rideout and was sixty-five years old the day he died. He was married twice, first wife being Miss Sophia Shaw who prede-

ceased him eight years ago. He leaves to mourn his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Perry H. Bishop of Coronation, a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Annie Rideout of East Florenceville, one grandchild, Glenna Bishop, three sisters, Mrs. Charles Stevens, Hartland, Mrs. Nelson Day and Mrs. Harry Shaw of Washington, and a number of other relatives. When a young man he joined the United Baptist church and lived a faithful Christian until his death.

The funeral was held from his home Sunday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. G. F. Bolster, who took his text from Hebrews 11:10. The music was furnished by the United Baptist choir and the hymns they used were, "I'm Going Home," "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," "When I Get to the End of The Way." The beautiful floral tributes showed the high esteem in which he was held.

BIG FIRE AT FLORENCEVILLE

B. F. Smith Loses Warehouse—Loss Estimated at \$4,000

A serious fire broke out Saturday shortly after 12 o'clock at Florenceville Station in the potato warehouse owned by B. F. Smith, after the passing of the south bound freight train. For a time it looked very serious for the destruction of all warehouses. Fortunately the westerly wind saved the situation although cinders and half shingles were blown for a mile across country. The 40 by 60 foot building was quite new, having been constructed eight years ago and was formerly owned by B. C. McIsaac. Fortunately the potato season is over, the building was empty save a number of potato stoves, scales, etc., and a few barrels of vitriol. The property was covered by \$4,000 insurance and will be rebuilt during the summer in time for the potato business in fall. Practically 10 years ago fire destroyed all warehouses owned by B. F. Smith, McCain Produce Co., and Guy Porter, also Florenceville Station, freight shed, 800 tons hay and 10 box cars on track, making a clean sweep.

HARTLAND CADETS PASS INSPECTION

The Hartland Cadet Corps, No. 978, paraded last Thursday afternoon for their third annual inspection. The inspection was held on the baseball grounds under Lieut.-Colonel Snow, of St. John, accompanied by the instructor, Lieut. G. W. Montgomery. C. W. N. A. EDITORS LAND AT BRUSSELS

Brussels, June 23—The Canadian Weekly Newspaper Editors on tour in Europe arrived here today and were accorded a most enthusiastic welcome by the Belgian people and the press of this city in which many references were made to the part Canada's soldiers had taken in the great war.

After landing at Antwerp where they were officially welcomed the entire party proceeded to Malines where they were greeted by Cardinal Mercier. Here today they were received by King Albert who shook hands with all members of the party and wished them a pleasant journey through his country and a safe return to Canada. His Majesty also expressed the hope that the visit of the Canadian Newspapermen would be followed by increased trade between Canada and Belgium and a closer understanding between the people of the two countries.

The party which numbered about 200 is made up of the editors and publishers of weekly newspapers in all the provinces of Canada and their wives. They left Montreal on board the "Melita" and after visiting the Belgian battlefields will go to Paris for a three days stay and will later spend some time in England where they will be received by their Majesties the King and Queen and will visit the Empire Exhibition at Wembley.
