### THE CHRISTIAN WATCHMAN.

enjoyed one of those happy seasons before I thought of sending you the Essay mentioned in my last, but under the circumstances, concluded it would be more interesting to your readers to know what it said about those "Sabbath School Concerts." I will therefore give you a few extracts from the speeches made at the last Massachusetts State Sunday School Convention, on that subject.

Mr. F. Snow, "Regarded the Sunday School Convention as the very hinge upon which the efforts of the school turned, in it the minister, parents, children, and teachers, all meet as they could in one way."

Mr. H. Hoyt "Remarked that the experience of the preceding speaker, was only that of many others. It was markedly his own."

Mr. J. Chase, Jr., said, "he was a member of a church which resulted from a Mission Sabbath School. They had endeavored to make the concerts attractive to the children, as well as instructive to their parents. The children recite passages of Scripture, which are enforced by the remarks of the speakers. These concerts are among the choicest meetings they have. They are crowded, and they endeavor to make the people think better of the Sabbath School. Through their instrumentality, parents have been led to Christ in this way."

Mr. N. Hill, "Thought the Sabbath School Concert was not exclusively designed for the children and that therefore the exercises should be adapted as well for the adults, though the young men should be notified in their monthly gathering, and something adapted to their wants, that they might be retained and benefited. He had adopted a plan in his school which might be worthy of mention. He deeply felt the importance of bearing some one thought or idea with every scholar on his retiring from the school. Oftentimes the teachers may have hurried through the lessons in a general way, without impressing a single definite truth on the mind of any of his class. To redeem an hour thus in a measure lost, he had some one previously prepared to occupy just three minutes at the close of the school with a brief pertinent exhortation, bringing out but one Bible truth, and in such a way that every one might comprehend and retain it."

Rev. J. H. Twombly, "had found nothing so indispensable to real success in the school and the Monthly Concert, as a live Superintendent. No matter what the programme is, only let him have a heart alive and earnest on the subject of this great cause, and he will stir up the church and the people, and it need not be wearying. They must be cheerful, and not gloomy. Children cannot understand or love a somber, hard, and stern man. His words and speeches should be short, the prayers should be short, and the singing good."

Rev. E. P. Dyer "thought one point of importance, was to secure the presence of the parents, and that the exercises should be arranged with this end in view."
