PASSED THE QUEER.

Counterfeiter Arrested Here on Sunday.

BY POLICEMAN NOBLE.

A Large sum of Bogus Money Found on Him—May Have Partners.

On Saturday, I. C. R. Police Officer Noble received a telegram from J. B. Gauvreau, police officer of Rimouski, saying that a counterfeiter was on his way south. The telegram read as follows—
Rimouski, Aug. 20—A tall, stout dark complexioned man, wearing only black moustache, trying to change lousres of Mexico five dollar bills for Canadian money, please arrest. I have a warrant issued against him. Conductor Bernier received one of these bills yesterday on No. 45 train. Wears dark clothes and dark derby hat.

Police Officer Noble immediately began to make inquiries and soon found that a man answering to the foregoing description was in town. He had arrived Friday night and put up at the Commercial. On Saturday he went over to the Mission and on his return was seen by Officer Noble who followed him to the Commercial hotel, where he learned that he was registered as Dr. Cleveland of Colorado. Noble was convinced at first sight of the man that he was on the right track and wired Officer Gauvreau in the evening that he would keep Cleveland under surveillance until he arrived with necessary papers for the arrest. On learning that Gauvreau was on No. 34 train Monday morning Officer Noble arrested his man and found 133 bogus five dollar Mexican bills in the lining of his trousers, and four in his pocketbook with some Canadian money.

On the arrival of the Express Sunday morning Policeman Noble handed over his charge to Officer Gauvreau, who returned to Rimouski with him by the next train. The "Doctor" seems to be quite proficient in his profession. It is said he prescribed for the proprietor of the Commercial and several others.

During his brief stay here he managed to convert some of his bogus money into good Canadian currency. At the Mission Post Office he bought fifteen cents worth of stamps giving in payment one of his bogus \$5.00 bills. He also tried to work the same game in A. G. Berry's meat shop, saying he wanted fifteen cents worth of beef for a poultice for his sprained leg. Berry refused his queer stuff, however, and the man departed.

At the Canadian Express Office he bought two \$50.00 money orders payable to "M. J. Siros, Madawaska, and signed himself as J. Siros.

This fact ought to be taken notice of by the authorities as it may lead to other interesting developments. "M. J. Siros" may be a partner in the game. He paid good Canadian money for the Express Orders and probably this is his method of banking his surplus cash.

Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier arrived this morning in their private car attached to the Maritime express, they were received by Senator Casgrain, Mr. Charles Marclé, M. P. and Mrs. Marclé, and Mr. C. R. Scoles Manager of the Atlantic & Lake Superior railway who presented Lady Laurier with a bouquet of flowers. Both the Premier and his wife were in splendid humor and anxious to reach Carleton where they will be the guests of Senator and Mrs. Casgrain for a few days. After a half hour's pleasant conversation the government car was attached to the Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway train drawn by the locomotive, Marclé, which was gaily decorated with bunting. The date of the reception to the premier at New Carlisle the County Seat of Bonaventure County will be fixed in a few days.
