It was a couple of days before Mr. McKenzie could get the boiler inspector's report. It was not very satisfactory. He stated that he did not know whether they would stand in salt water. Mr. McKenzie then wired Mr. Johnson who is mechanical foreman with the McLaughlin people at Arnprior to meet him at Ottawa.

Mr. Johnson was of the opinion that if the boilers would stand one season he would still be a very cheap boat and new boilers could be put in during the winter for \$3000.

Mr. Johnson gave the boat a thorough examination and reported that the boilers would not stand the season in salt water and could not recommend the purchase. The inspector stated that the only other boat suitable for the route that might be purchased was the "Minnie" owned by the Algoma S. S. Railway Co. now in difficulties.
