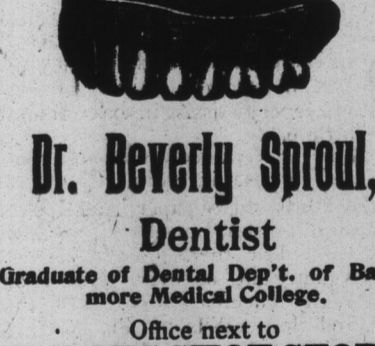

HEAVIEST MAN IN ENGLAND.

William Ecclestone Weighs 200 Pounds and is Still Growing.

Possibly the heaviest man in the world is Mr. William Thomas Ecclestone, the landlord of the Coach and Horses, an old coaching house to the north of London, on the main road to Harrow and Watford.

He weighs over forty stone, and his measurements are as follows:

Chest..... 6 feet 8 1/2 inches
Thigh..... 2 feet 1 1/2 inches
Calf..... 1 foot 9 1/2 inches
Arm..... 2 feet 2 inches

It is a pedestrian tour to walk round Mr. Ecclestone. He is several inches bulkier than Jesse Amos Baker, the American heavyweight, who was buried at Preston on Monday day, and who in life claimed to be the heaviest man on earth. Mr. Baker weighed forty-two stone, two stone more than Mr. Ecclestone, but his chest and waist measurements respectively were only 5 feet 9 inches and 3 feet 1 inch.
