His Excellency, Monsignor Sbarretti, arrived at Campbellton Tuesday on the Ocean Limited. Although the news of his intended visit was received a short time before, a large number of citizens were present at the station and the town was gay with bunting, the papal colors being conspicuous everywhere. His Excellency was accompanied by His Lordship Bishop Barry, Vicar General Dugal, Fathers Doucett, Allard, Richard, Vaude, Mortel, Boucher, Campbell, Pacifico, Ferdinand, Synott, O'Leary, Wheton, McLaughlin, Purcell and Conway.

Mgr. Sbarretti was met at the station by Rev. Father Wallace and presented to his Worship, Mayor Murray, who extended a cordial welcome to the delegate on behalf of the citizens.

A procession was formed up of the A. O. H., C. O. F. and C. M. B. A. being in regalia, with six mounted marshals in uniform, under the direction of Chief Marshal Wm. Currie, and marched to the R. C. Church where addresses were presented to His Excellency in English and French, and were responded to. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed and was presided over by the delegate.

The cordial feeling among all classes in the community was happily commented upon by all.

After a visit to the Mission where similar ceremonies were carried out on Wednesday His Excellency left by the Ocean Limited highly pleased with his visit.

BOY MURDERED

Terrible Tragedy at Windsor, N. S.

A Windsor, N.S., correspondent sends the following account of the tragedy in that town by which Nelson Dill lost his life:

On Sunday the stillness of the Sabbath was broken in upon by the excited reports of a murder, which happened here between midnight and 1 o'clock. The scene of the murder was King Street near (King's) College road, familiar to so many of your people who come here to attend the closing. Some boys were returning home from town in company with Wm. Haley, who was pretty well under the influence of liquor. When at Victoria Park, William went ahead and the boys afterwards caught up to him, went into Frank Lynch's store, where Haley was getting some parcels, while on there they accosted him, "Hy, Billie and he made a reply and told them if they didn't stop teasing him and calling names on the streets he would slap their mouths. There were other words spoken, the boys not being quarrelsome but only mischievous. When near Mrs. Wiggins' residence Haley started to cross the street to take a short cut home via the college road, and as he crossed Nelson Dill, one of the boys, gave him a shove. He went a short distance, probably by the force of the shove, then came back and struck Dill. The boys fell back a few yards. Dill said, "I'm stabbed; he's got a knife." He fell, as the boys thought, in a faint, in front of Mrs. Woodland's, and in ten minutes he was dead. Dr. Reid, coroner, was notified, and drove out with Police-man Conlin, who arrested Haley, who was lying on the sidewalk, not the gutter, as stated. He was taken to jail, but couldn't remember anything in the morning about the awful affair, he said. He is a married man about 40 years of age; has a wife and several children and a son of Robt. Haley, farmer. Deceased was eighteen years old; his son of Charles Dill, Spa Spring road, and a few years ago was on the mechanical staff of the Hants Journal. Afterwards he worked in the Windsor foundry and since then at Curry's factory, at Curry's Corner. He was a quiet, inoffensive boy and belonged to a quiet, industrious and respectable family. His two brothers who, were with him went home and notified the parents, who are terribly grief-stricken. The mother is an invalid. At the Post mortem it was found the deceased died from a stab in the heart, which penetrated it, causing death.

The jury were Henry Brown, Samuel Morrison, Wm. Redden, Frank Warr, Joseph Della Torre, James Chandler, Orland Chandler, James Pemberton, Fred Willey, Herbert Kirkup and two others Dr. Reid, coroner. They met at Curry's corner, at the undertaking rooms. The prisoner will probably be sent up for Preliminary examination. It was not found necessary to examine him yesterday.

The affair is a terrible one and has caused considerable excitement. Liquor has certainly been a great curse to this town.

Liquor Licenses Cases in Court

On Saturday last Inspector Basset obtained five convictions for violations of the Liquor License act on actions brought by him against the undermentioned persons for the illegal sale of liquor as per information laid before magistrate McMillan at Black Point. In the case against Peter Russell of Belleudene the defendant waived trial and was fined fifty dollars and costs for selling liquor without a license. In the case of John C. Barclay who was charged with selling liquor in his licensed premises at Jacquet River on a certain Sunday, the defendant waived trial and was fined \$50 and costs. In the case of Eugene Samson who was charged with three violations of the law against selling liquors to minors by her barkeeper in her licensed premises in the town of Dalhousie, the defendant waived trial in each case and was fined for each offence as the law directs—On Tuesday last cases against Wm. Dumouir and Elizabeth Loubert were continued as per adjournment, with the result that William Darmouth's case is further adjourned to Tuesday next at 10 a.m. and the case against Elizabeth Loubert is dismissed. We understand that the inspector is so dissatisfied with the dismissal of this case that he has decided to appeal from the magistrate's judgment.

PUBLIC WORKS IN GASPE.

Amounts Obtained by Hon. Rudolph Lemieux for Roads in His County.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux has obtained a great deal for his county again this year. In every part of the county some improvement to our harbors is being made. Where the work is not actually going on, the preliminaries for the starting of a wharf or breakwater are being made. The engineer is preparing the plans or tenders are being asked for the construction of the improvements.

The wants of Gaspe were numerous but already Mr. Lemieux has supplied many and he is doing his best to satisfy the others at an early date.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux has also given a great deal of his attention to the construction and repairing of colonization roads.

This list gives an idea of the extent of the county of Gaspe and of the numerous wants which must be provided by its representative in the councils of the nation. Mr. Lemieux has plenty to show that he has always looked after the interests of his electors. It was due to his efforts and to those of Mr. Marci, the member for Bonaventure that a subsidy of \$6400 per mile has been granted for the construction of the two railways to Gaspe, and the electors of Gaspe have to thank also Hon. Rudolph Lemieux for the nice subsidy of 4,000 acres per mile to encourage and help the construction of these railways. Without him these subsidies would never have been granted, and it will be Mr. Lemieux we have to thank for the work done so far. It is not true that additional 1000 acres per mile has been granted to this railway company at the request of another party, as reported in an interview published by the Quebec Daily Telegraph and reproduced by "Events" a few weeks ago.
