CURLERS' MEETING

Curlers Held Their Annual Meeting Last Night

SKIPS ELECTED

Secretary's Report Showed a Healthy Condition in Finances

The annual meeting of the Campbellton Curling and Skating Club was held in the rink last evening, a large number being in attendance.

The report of the Secretary showed the total receipts of last season to be \$2,553.35, \$1,527.21 of which was paid on mortgage \$456.11 for completing and furnishing the rink and \$488.18 for running expenses, leaving a balance of \$2,097.04 on hand. There is a balance of \$2,000.00 still on mortgage. General satisfaction was expressed at the showing of last year's finances.

The President, W. A. Mott, and the Secretary, D. F. Firth, were re-elected for the coming year. Messrs A. Macdonald, F. P. Matheson, J. H. Wilson, F. S. Blais and C. F. Clark were elected as Directors.

After some discussion eleven new members were elected.

The annual fee was on motion increased from \$5.00 to \$6.00 the extra dollar to go into a special fund for entertainment of visiting curlers.

The matter of skating was left entirely in the hands of the Director.

The salary of the Secretary-Treasurer was passed at 50.00 per year. On motion it was decided that the season's play proceed on the one game plan. This was felt to be most satisfactory as playing two or three games took up too much time and the match could not be finished, as was the case last year.

A Brief Sketch of this Firm's Business.

FISHING AND CANNING

Icehouses and Freezers Scattered Over Three Provinces.

The firm of A. & R. Loggie, with headquarters at Loggieville, Northumberland County, has canning factories at Loggieville, Point Beauséjour, Tracadie and Inkerman N. B.; Grand River, Cape Ogilvie, Long Cove, Gaspe, Baie St. Paul, St. Simon, St. Alphonse, Escoumance, Mille Vaches and Black River in the province of Quebec; Island Pond, Vermont and Portland and Vanboro, Me. Some of these are very large, particularly that at Island Pond.

Their icehouses and freezers are also quite widely distributed. Some of them have capacities running from 100 to 175 tons of frozen fish meat or game. Amongst the largest are those at Dalhousie, Tracadie, Inkerman and Loggieville, N. B.; Mulgrave, N. S.; Kishibecko and Bouchouche, N. B. There are smaller ones at Point Escoumance, Escoumance, N. B. and Margaree Cove and Bayfield, N. S.; and Maria, P. Q.

The firm not only does a large fish business, for which it is chiefly noted, but it also cans a large amount of blueberries. These are put up chiefly at Island Pond, Vermont. They also can them at Loggieville, Inkerman and Tracadie in this province; Baie St. Paul, St. Simon, St. Alphonse, Escoumance, Mille Vaches and Black River, P. Q. They put them up in two-pound and one-gallon tins. The output this season was about 150 car loads of 15 tons each, or depending on the weight of tins and boxes, 11 1/2 tons to the car. That means nearly 1,500 tons—3,000,000 pounds or 1,500,000 quarts of blueberries. Nearly all these blueberries are sold in the United States, although Canadian centres take some of them.

The canning of clams is an important item of Messrs. Loggie's business. It is done at Inkerman Gloucester County. They put up 150 tons of these this season in one and two pound tins.

About 4,000,000 pounds of salmon are shipped from their Dalhousie depot every year, and 1,000,000 lbs of smelts is an average output. Lobsters, mackerel, finnan haddies and haddock are also sent out in large consignments.

Besides blueberries, Messrs. Loggie put up apples, corn, lima beans, squash and pumpkins. They do not go largely into the preserving of the five first named articles every year, but put them up in seasons when the prospects for trade in them are good. These are among what commercial travellers would term side lines.

At the big Loggieville freezer there is a stock which is calculated to gladden the heart of the epicure. Besides large quantities of prime beef, mutton and lamb there are stocks of turkeys, chickens, domestic and wild geese, brant, black ducks and plover.

Messrs. A. & R. Loggie own the following craft, which are used chiefly in the firm's business—Gray Loggie, a three masted schooner of 92 tons net; tow boat Eva, 14 tons; str. Odell, license-1 to carry 60 passengers; Lina, a tow boat; Beaver 1, of 28 tons; Beaver 11, of 53 tons, and 30 salmon boats. They also own a large part of the real estate in Loggieville and vicinity.

The firm now consists of Messrs. Andrew, Robert and Frank Loggie, each of whom supervises a different department of the firm's operations.

NEW BOAT BUILDING.

Will be Christened "Lady Eileen" After Governor's Daughter.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Interprovincial Navigation Co. of Canada, Limited, was held in town on Friday. A large amount of routine business was transacted, including the passing of bye-laws, and the completion of organization.

From reports presented to the meeting it was learned that the construction of the new boat for the Bay Chaleur route was well under way. Mr. North, the superintendent of construction, intends leaving on the 28th inst by "Ionian" for Glasgow, to personally superintend the work.

Permission has been received from the Governor General to name the new boat after his daughter, "Lady Eileen."

All arrangements are now completed for the delivery of the boat in time for the service next spring.

MIRAMICHI PRESBYTERY.

Passes Resolution on Retirement of Rev. J. D. Murray

The Presbytery of Miramichi at its last meeting passed the following resolution touching on the Rev. J. D. Murray's retirement from the active work of the ministry—

Resolved that this Presbytery place on record its appreciation of the faithful labors of the Rev. J. D. Murray, who, for seventeen years successfully held the office of pastor of Red Bank congregation.

Mr. Murray was an earnest exponent of Gospel Truth and ever guarded jealously the moral and spiritual interests of the people, and the effect of this was noted in the loving reverence with which he was, and must for long, continue to be regarded by the people of his own and also of other denominations in the district.

Mr. Murray was compelled to resign his charge on account of ill health, due mainly we believe to the self-sacrificing character of his labors on behalf of the church. Mr. Murray is retiring from Red Bank has concluded a long and honorable career as a minister of the Presbyterian church, having labored under her banner for a period of about 40 years.

Mr. Murray was ably supported in his ministry by one who was a true helpmate and it is the earnest prayer of the Presbytery that they may be long spared to each other, to enjoy together their well earned rest.

Both members of the firm Messrs John and Richard Sowerby came over to town to attend church and before they could get back home again the mill and all its contents were destroyed. The neighbors and others about the place put up a stiff fight to prevent the spread of the flames to other buildings adjoining and their efforts were successful.

The mill had not been running for some time and just how the fire started is somewhat of a mystery. It is supposed that some passer-by threw a match or a live cigar-end into the sawdust and ignited it.

We understand the property was insured for about \$8,000 and that the Messrs Sowerby will re-build on the old site.
