Temperance People Ask Change in License Act

St. John-It is quite probable that the St. John liquor license act will be considerably amended in the near future and that as a result of the changes the liquor men will find it harder to engage in the business of disposing of spirituous beverages.

The system of granting extension retail licenses, in excess of the number provided by the act, (75), will also probably be done away with and the license commissioners will be instructed to grant only 75 licenses, and thus come within the precise limit of the act.

Temperance people, all over the province, but particularly in St. John, are agitating for a change in legislation affecting the liquor traffic. Their ultimate goal is prohibition, but, as they realize that, to accomplish this, is an herculean task, they are seeking to amend the St. John license act and are thus inserting the thin edge of the wedge which may eventually be driven and more sweeping reforms accomplished. At the recent annual meeting of the general division of the Sons of Temperance, considerable attention was given to the St. John license act and the G. W. P. was requested to communicate with all temperance societies in the province with a view to obtaining their support for the temperance committee in requesting the provincial government to pass sections 4 of the proposed bill to amend the license law. By this section it is asked to provide that before an applicant can be granted a license, he must have a petition of a majority of the ratepayers in the ward or parish where he wants to do liquor business.

The sons of Temperance will make a petition of the ratepayers, and endeavor to impress the provincial government with the desirability of the change. It is probably being fought, not only by the local liquor interests, but by the whole strength of the licensed victuallers association of Canada, as its enforcement will make a great change in the regulations governing licenses.

In the matter of limiting the retail licenses to seventy-five, the temperance people are being agitated for some time, and the government has already practically committed itself to their views in this regard.

Under the present license regulations it is necessary for every person who desires to sell liquor, to make application to the inspector of licenses on or before the 25th day of each year, after which date the commission meets and fix a date for the hearing of the applications; and also to deal with any protests that may be lodged. Such protests are presented to the inspector or at least, four days before the meeting of the board.

The inspector is required under the act to keep in his office, after three days previous to the meeting of the board, a record of all petitions and certificates lodged with him and all such papers are open to public inspection.

The meetings of the board to consider applications are also open to the public and are usually attended by a number of the dealers. In the event of a protest being lodged against any dealer the latter has an opportunity to present his side of the case either personally or through his attorney.

Each applicant deposits with the inspector, with his application a fee of \$5. To cover the cost of advertising and inspection.

If the applicant is granted a license this fee is credited on the amount paid for such license.

There are several classes of licenses-retail, \$300, hotel, \$400, wholesale \$500, and brewers \$800, and the monies received for them are placed to the credit of the government in the Bank of British North America on or before May 1, when the ensuing license year commences. For some years the commissioners have been unable to get down number of retail licenses, limited by the act. According to the extension licenses were issued to applicants in excess of seventy-five, as the commissioners felt it would be an injustice to these men if they were closed up at once. The case for three months was devised to enable such a dealer to close out his stock without a loss, but it has had an effect of rendering the limit to 75, worthless. At the end of three months a dealer, who was doing business on extension license could go to the board and announce that he had not been able to close up his business, and consequently get another extension. At the same time he would buy new stock and remain in business for the year on practically the same terms as the regular license holder. In fact he had an advantage over the annual license holder for he could pay his license in quarterly installments, and thus be relieved of the necessity of
