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LEMIEUX NOMINATED

The Solicitor-General Chosen by Nicolet Liberals ASKS TIME TO CONSIDER Will Obtain Advice of Sir Wilfrid Laurier Before Accepting

Beaucour, Que Oct 7—Amidst tremendous enthusiasm the Liberal convention for Nicolet yesterday afternoon nominated Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux, Solicitor General, to contest the county for the Dominion Parliament. There were 350 delegates present, and the meeting was one of the most harmonious and enthusiastic ever held in the riding.

Mr. Lemieux was the only candidate mentioned. On the opening of the convention Mr. Trahan immediately announced that it was the desire of the Liberals of Nicolet that Mr. Lemieux should be their candidate. Amidst loud applause he offered the nomination to the Solicitor-General, and assured him that the Liberals of the riding would see that it only would be necessary for him to hold two or three meetings there, and they would take care that he should be elected by a ample majority.

Hon. R. Lemieux on rising to reply was tendered an ovation, the cheering lasting several minutes. He heartily thanked the delegates for the honor they had conferred upon him, and proceeded to sketch his career in Gaspé, from the time when in 1867, young and unknown, he redeemed the old Conservative riding by forty-six votes, and his election in 1900 by 1,500 majority, and re-election by acclamation after his appointment to the ministry. These made ties which he found it hard, if not impossible to break! As a follower of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he did not feel at liberty to accept the nomination, but would lose no time in consulting his leader, and would act upon his advice.

Several of those present made speeches earnestly requesting Mr. Lemieux to accept the candidature and the convention closed with rousing cheers for the Solicitor General.

DEATH OF W. J. C. CROSSDALE

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 7—Wm. J. C. Crossdale, the well known civil engineer, passed away at his home here today in his 84th year. Crossdale was one of Moncton's oldest citizens, and he was well informed in the early history of realising in this section of Canada. He arrived from England in 1847 and was engaged on the St. Andrews and on the Quebec Railway until 1856. He then came to Moncton and was engaged on the European and North American Railway between St. John and Point Du Chene. He afterwards went to P. E. I., and was engineer at Charlottetown, and Summerside, and engaged in similar work in Cape Breton and in various parts of Nova Scotia. Later he was in charge of the location of the Interprovincial from Moncton to Newville. Between 1879 and 1882 he was Government engineer in Newfoundland, and recently he has been employed in the engineering department here. Mrs. T. R. Busted of Bordeaux is a daughter of the deceased.
