STEAMSHIP WRECK.
Over 100 Persons go Down with the Hilda.

OFF ST. MALO HARBOR.

Only Five Persons Survive Story of the Awful Disaster.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—With passengers and crew numbering more than 100, the Southwestern Railway's cross channel steamer Hilda, foundered Sunday morning and the majority of the persons on board were drowned.

The Hilda left Southampton Friday night for St. Malo, on the north coast of France. Her passage was greatly delayed by a fog in the channel, and when nearing St. Malo she ran into a severe snow storm, apparently missed her course, and foundered on the rocks off Jardin light house, three miles from St. Malo. The Company's steamer Ada, outward from St. Malo, rescued five of the passengers and one of the crew. These are now on the way to Southampton and it is believed are the only survivors, though an unconfirmed report reached Paris that seventy had been saved.

The crew numbered 26 and there were about a hundred passengers, all Frenchmen, the majority being on board from St. Briac and neighborhood. A telegram from Servan, adjoining the town of St. Malo, gives the few particulars yet available. The Hilda was near St. Malo Saturday morning. She

struck the rocks at four o'clock Sunday morning in the roadstead off the Island off Cezembre. She had missed the tide owing to bad weather and fog. The majority of the crew and passengers were asleep at the time. Two boats were lowered, one of which containing five men, arrived at Servan. The second boat was picked up empty at St. Cast, where thirteen bodies were washed ashore. The top of the Hilda's funnel and her mast are visible at low tide, according to the telegram from Servan.

ST. MALO, FRANCE, Nov. 20.—The exact number of lives lost on the Hilda is unknown here. It is understood that there were about twenty first class passengers, including several English people. Among the latter were the Honorable Mrs. Butler, sister of Lord Lanesborough, and Colonel Follet. Though it is not certain that these were actually on board they were expected to travel by the Hilda and it is known that all the first class passengers were drowned. These passengers were English officers and others who were commencing to rejoin their families or to spend the season at St. Malo and Dinard (opposite St. Malo).

It appears to be certain that only six were saved, these being five on board and an English seaman named Grinter, belonging to Guernsey, and that the total number on board, including the crew, was 105.

Many bodies have been washed ashore at different points, some wearing life belts. Six of the survivors, according to a report in circulation here, were rescued by the Ada from the rigging.

WRECKAGE ASHORE
FROM THE WRECK.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Special reports received here of the wreck of the London and Southwestern Railway Company's steamer Hilda which left Southampton Friday night for St. Malo, France, and was totally wrecked on Lesportes reef, three miles from St. Malo, with loss of over one hundred lives give a graphic description of the disaster.

Owing to the rough sea and thick snow storm the captain of the Hilda says he took the buoy light for the rocks off the St. Malo light house. He gave signals which were not seen by the harbor and the steamer proceeded slowly towards the light. When she struck the rocks the steamer's boilers exploded and she was cut in two, giving the passengers no time to save themselves. Seven bodies were in the life belts picked up off the village of St. Castle yesterday evening. The coast near St. Malo is covered with wreckage. Two thirds of the Hilda's passengers were French, returning to France with the proceeds of the sale of the harvest of onions and potatoes. The others were English families who were going to spend the winter at Dinard. The wreck lies on the beach three miles off St. Malo showing only her main mast and fore-castle.

FIRED THREE SHOTS AT MONTREAL BUTCHER

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—Alphonse Normandin is under arrest charged

with attempting to murder Hermidas Leduc, a butcher. The two men had a quarrel yesterday afternoon. Last evening Normandin went to Leduc's shop. The latter was behind the counter and he was surprised to see Normandin draw a revolver. The next moment a shot was fired at him.

No damage was done except to the wall, and Leduc rushed at Normandin. The latter fired again, and then ran out of the shop pursued by his intended victim.

As they reached the street Normandin was caught and fired another shot at close range. This time the bullet grazed Leduc's right hip, but did not hurt him very much.

JAPAN'S WAR BURDEN

While Russia and Japan expended approximately the same amounts upon the war, the burden upon Japan was relatively far heavier than that upon Russia. In a German publication Professor Helfferich has presented the following table which exhibits the financial condition of the two countries at the close of the war in a striking way.

From this it will be seen that while Russia spent some 18 per cent., or over 400 million marks (about \$100,000,000), more than Japan her total expenditure was only some 67 per cent. of her ordinary revenue before the war. Japan's war disbursements, on the other hand, were 510 per cent. of her ordinary revenue. Russia spent two-thirds of one year's income, and Japan spent five years' income. To meet the cost Russia had to increase her national debt

WHALING FLEET IN GREAT PERIL
It is Believed the Ship Must Be Abandoned

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 18.—Capt. Francis Tuttle, formerly in command of the revenue cutter Bear, states that from what he learned from Capt. Bodfish, of the whaler William Baylis, there is absolutely no chance for the whaling fleet to escape. In his opinion the ship will be crushed in the ice. The crews will have to desert and make for the MacKenzie river. The fleet is reported to be sixty miles from Banks Land, which is 500 miles east of the MacKenzie. He does not think a relief expedition could aid them in any way.

These figures help to bring home a realization of the financial burden Japan undertook to preserve her national interests. No one can say it was not a wise expenditure from that point of view and no one will doubt that in the years of peace

which she has just secured Japan will be able to arrange to meet her obligations without undue stress.
