HALIFAX ROBBERY
Employes Sold Stock on Their Own Account
THIEVES DISCOVERED
One Arrest Made—Receivers of Stolen Goods to be Prosecuted

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Some few weeks ago A. & W. Smith became suspicious and decided to investigate apparent losses in their immense stock. Suspicion rested on two of the shippers, Walter Kennedy and Fred Locke, Chief of Police O'Sullivan and his officers began an investigation, with the result that it developed that robberies of large quantities of stock had taken place for a considerable time back. It is alleged that the accused would sell barrels of flour, bags of sugar and large quantities of other groceries at a time. These sales were made to different retail dealers, and it is claimed that one dealer in the city received as much as ten barrels of sugar lately. The names of the merchants who bought these goods are in the hands of the police, and it is likely they will be included as receivers of stolen goods.

Yesterday afternoon the police thought that the time was ripe for an arrest and accordingly Mr. Hogg, member and manager of the firm, swore out information against Kennedy and Locke, and armed with warrants the officers went in search of the accused.

Locke was found in his accustomed place of business, as shipper of the firm of A. & W. Smith. When arrested he said nothing to the official, but accompanied him to the police station.

The police were unable to locate Kennedy, and up to the present time he has not been arrested. Different officers went in search of him, but were unable to find him at his accustomed haunts. When this was reported to the chief of police a general alarm was sent out and every policeman in Halifax had instructions to arrest Kennedy on sight. Telegrams have been sent in every direction and all points of exits from the province have been covered and the police at these points have got the accused's description through telegraphic instructions from Halifax headquarters.

This morning Locke was given the "third degree" by the authorities, and it is reported confessed everything, implicating Kennedy and other persons. It is understood that if his statements are true the theft of the pair will run into thousands of dollars.

N. B. PRESS ASSOCIATION.
Was Organized at Fredericton Thursday. Good Attendance at Meeting.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 24.—The New Brunswick Press Association was organized at a meeting of newspaper men, representing many sections of the province, held in the Parliament building, yesterday afternoon. The meeting was called by John T. Hawke, editor of the Moncton Transcript, and among those who responded to the call were: J. P. Malaney, Woodstock Press; R. E. Armstrong, St. Andrews Beacon; F. B. Ellis and W. C. Jordan, St. John Globe; M. McDade, St. John Freeman; E. J. Payson, Fredericton Gleamer; H. B. Anslow, Newcastle Advocate; T. L. Stewart, Chatham World; L. C. MacNutt and W. K. C. Parlee, Fredericton Herald.

Mr. Hawke called the gathering to order and Mr. Malaney read a number of letters and telegrams having to do with the calling of the meeting. On motion of Messrs. Armstrong and Stewart the meeting unanimously approved of the formation of a press association.

The following committees were appointed:

Constitution and bye-laws—Payson, Armstrong, Anslow.

Nominations—McDade, Ellis, Malaney.

Topics for discussion—Stewart, Parlee, Jordan.

On recommendation of the nominating committee the following officers were elected: President, J. T. Hawke; vice-presidents, J. L. Stewart, W. K. C. Parlee; secretary-treasurer, J. P. Malaney.

Executive committee—S. D. Scott, F. B. Ellis, H. B. Anslow, R. E. Armstrong, F. Robideaux, E. J. Payson, John Russell, jr.

A code of bye-laws was submitted by the committee and adopted section by section.

W. H. Golding, of St. John, was elected an honorary member.

The remainder of the afternoon was taken up by a discussion of advertising rates in the country newspapers.

It was decided to hold the regular annual meeting in this city some time during the next legislative session. A midsummer meeting will also be held at a place to be decided upon.

Among the matters discussed at last night's session was postal arrangements for newspapers and a resolution was passed asking for better service on the trains.

The association was presented with a box of cigars yesterday afternoon by Landlord McCaffery, of the Queen Hotel. At the close of last night's meeting the members repaired to the Queen Hotel and partook of an oyster supper.—Transcript

I. C. R. CARS ON AMERICAN ROADS

Mr. W. N. Rippey, of the car service Department of the I. C. R., returned Friday from an extended trip over several American roads, where he has been looking up I. C. R. cars. Mr. Rippey visited the headquarters of the Boston and Maine, the New York, N. H. and Hartford, the New York Central, and the Delaware and Hudson Canal Company and found a large number of the I. C. R. cars in use on the above roads. There seems to be a shortage of rolling stock on the American roads and all cars of other lines going in that direction are owing to the congested traffic, especially in New York State, made use of.

It is the intention of the I. C. R. to get the American roads to load for shipment with traffic coming to the provinces, all I. C. R. cars and thus have them reach the home lines again.—Transcript.

TURKEY THREATENS

Powers Send Fleet to Turkish Waters.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24.—The Porte's reply to the demands of the powers is not only a categorical rejection of their demands, but contains thinly veiled threats that the pressure of Europe will possibly excite the Turkish population to reprisals on the Christians. The note declares that the Ottoman government loyally introduced the reforms demanded by the powers and says if those did not entirely succeed the fault was in the hatred dividing the nationalists in Macedonia and in the government from abroad.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The commanders of the allied fleet at Pireus held a further conference yesterday on the Austrian cruiser St. George, as a result of which it is expected the fleet will sail today to seize the customs house on the island of Mytilene.

PARIS, Nov. 24.—It is stated in official quarters here that the exchange of communications between the powers concerning Turkey's answer to their ultimatum has resulted in the practical determination not to consider the answer as postponing the naval demonstration which will proceed without further parley. It is understood that the warships of the powers are already moving from Pireus. The objective is not yet definitely stated but the island of Mytilene still appears to be the only objective applicable to the situation.

CONSTANTINOPLE, via Sofia, Nov. 25.—The ambassadors of the powers in a conference just held decided to proceed with the naval demonstration as the best reply to the Porte's note. There is absolutely no sign among the Musselmans of Constantinople that they are in the least way disturbed concerning the question of the financial control of Macedonia. The majority are not aware that such a question exists. The aspect of the city is perfectly normal and there appears to be no chance of any anti-Christian movement unless the word is given from high quarters.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—The Foreign Office emphatically denies that Turkey's attitude is due to German influence. So far from this being true, it is said that the Sultan is actually angry at Germany because the foreign office has repeatedly advised him to accept the powers.

SEVASTAPOL, Nov. 25.—The sailors of this port and the Brest regiments have mutined and joined the workmen who are holding a meeting under the red flag. The city is in a state of siege.

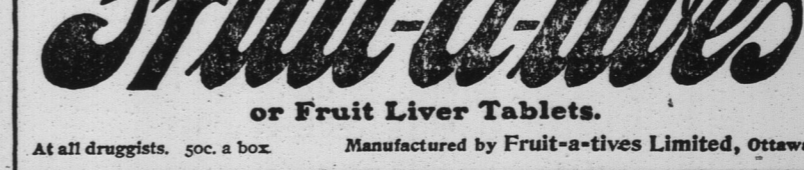

of their herds of both the Beef and the Dairy breeds. The contention that there is always a demand for good animals at handsome prices is fully borne out. A good animal costs no more to feed than an inferior one and more and more the farmer becoming convinced of the fact that although the initial cost of the introduction of a pure bred sire into a herd may be large that the improvement resulting justifies the price paid in the corresponding increase in the herd value. Not only are breeders of established herds introducing new blood but foundations for new herds are being laid by men not hitherto considered breeders of pure bred stock. At two recent sales of Shorthorns 100 head brought \$35,123.00 an average of \$351.23 each. At the Flatt sale at Hamilton 64 cattle were sold for \$27,303.00 an average of \$426.61. This lot included a dozen or more calves under six months of age. The highest price paid for a sire was \$2,100 and for a dam \$1,600, amounts paid ranged from these down to \$110. At the Attrill sale at London 36 head realized \$7,780 an average price of \$216. The highest price at this sale was \$650. At the hunter sale of

Ayrshires at Maxville 47 animals realized \$9,255 an average price of about 200. One bull brought \$700 and one cow \$575. In this lot was included a number of calves under two months of age. These prices are probably the highest ever received for animals of the Ayrshire breed. That the teachings of the Farmers Institutes, the Live Stock Associations and the work of the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture is bearing results is apparent from the above facts.

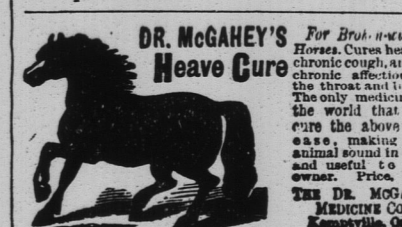

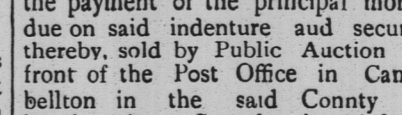
