### DAIRY SCHOOL

The Twelfth Session Opens at Sussex on the 28th inst

The announcement of the 1905 session of the provincial dairy school at Sussex under the direction of Hon L. P. Farris, commissioner for Agriculture is to hand. The Creamery course opens on the 28th Feb and closes March 10 and the Cheese course begins March 13th and closes March 23rd. Teaching will be free to all students from Maritime provinces, the number being limited to thirty in each course.

The application for admission to the school shall be made upon a blank, a copy of which will be sent on demand, in which the pupil will state how long he has been working either as a maker or a helper.

All applications should be sent in as soon as possible, addressed to Superintendent of the Dairy School, Sussex, N. B.

### ILLUSTRATION ORCHARDS

Hon. Mr. Farris Announces Location of New Ones

Hon L. P. Farris, commissioner of agriculture, who is at the Royal, announces the following as the places where illustration orchards will be set out by his department next spring:

Madawaska—At Thos. Clair's, M. P. P., Clair Station; R. R. Violet's, St Leonard's.

Victoria county—F. E. Henderson's Andover; Wm. Johnston's, New Denmark.

York county—Barry I. Whitehead's Queensbury.

Gloucester county P. J. power's, North Tetagouche.

Northumberland county—R. A. Murdoch's, Chatham; Wm. Murray's Doaktown.

St John county—Wm. R. McFate's, Golden Grove.

Queen's county—Senator King's Chipman.

These with the eight set out last year in Kent, Kings, St John, Charlotte, Carleton, Queen's and Sunbury counties, will make 19 illustration orchards and in the counties not named orchards will be set out next year. The fruit set out comprises apples of nine varieties and plums of four varieties.

Hon. Mr Farris said that the orchards set out last year have been very successful, very few of the trees have failed and the people upon whose places the orchards have been planted have followed well the instructions of the experts.

### ASSASSINATED

Procurator-General of Finland Shot Dead

#### IN HIS RESIDENCE

Stranger in Officers Uniform Gained Access and Fired Four Bullets

Helsingfors, Finland Feb 6.—Soisalon Soisalon, procurator general at Finland, who before he was ennobled was known by the name of Johnson, was assassinated to-day by a young man, whose identity up to the present time has not been determined. The assassin and Soisalon's son were both wounded in a revolver duel following the killing. The motive of the crime apparently was purely political, the slain official being a prominent member of the government party.

The murderer appeared at the procurator's residence at 11 o'clock to-day and sent in a card bearing in French the name of Alexander Gadd, who is in the Russian service. The young man who was smartly dressed in an officer's uniform, was promptly admitted to the official's private study and on his entrance fired four shots from a revolver, one of the bullets piercing the breast of the procurator, who expired almost immediately.

His 16 year old son, hearing the shots, rushed in from adjoining room and fired three or four shots at his father's assassin whose right leg was broken below the knee by bullets. He was also slightly wounded in the shoulder and in a finger of the left hand. The assassin fired the one bullet remaining in his revolver at Soisalon's son wounding him slightly in the calf of his right leg. He then endeavored to escape but fell unconscious to the floor in the ante-room where he was seized.

Dr. Wasastjens was called out and found the procurator beyond need of his service.

The assassin was removed to the surgical hospital. He lies guarded by police, answering no questions and evidently unconscious. The man's recovery however, is thought to be certain. Up to the present the authorities have been unable to identify him. He is of dark complexion and apparently between 25 and 30 years of age. Soisalon was born in 1858 and practiced at the Finnish bar.

He was highly esteemed, and had held various government appointments including that of provincial judge. He was appointed procurator of the senate in 1901, and in the same year was made procurator general of the Duchy of Finland. Soisalon was regarded as a wise and patriotic official. It is understood that it was at his initiative that the Fins exiled by Governor General Bobrikoff was allowed to return to Finland.

Helsingfors, Finland, Feb 7.—The assassin of Soisalon Soisalon, procurator general of Finland, who was shot and killed yesterday at his residence by a young man dressed in an officer's uniform, has been identified as Karl Lenard Hohenthal, formerly a student at the Imperial Alexander University here. Hohenthal, who latterly had lived in Stockholm, returned to Finland Jan 1. He maintains obstinate silence under examination. Senator Akerman, who has assumed the duties of procurator, of the Senate, is directing the investigation of the crime. The wounds inflicted on the assassin by the son of Soisalon are not of a dangerous character.

### TOWN COUNCIL

Meeting Held on Friday Evening

#### ACCOUNTS PASSED

Same Old Bill from Provincial Lunatic Asylum Presented

A meeting of the town council was held on Friday evening with full council in attendance.

A bill from the Provincial Lunatic Asylum was read by the clerk for care of two patients for a number of years past. This is the same old bill that is now looked upon as a regular visitor to the council chamber every year, and has been the subject of many interviews with the government officials in the past. It has been repeatedly pointed out that the town is not liable and there the matter stands until a new bill comes in. The amount in question has now about reached the sum of \$1,500. The bill was referred to Finance Com.

A communication was received from the Mayor of Toronto on a recent decision of the Privy Council giving power to Bill Telephone Co. to extend their system in any municipality or corporation without their consent. A copy of a petition to the Parliament of Canada asking for amendments to the company's charter making it compulsory to secure the consent of the corporation or municipality in such cases accompanied the communication which the Mayor, Town Clerk and Treasurer were authorized to sign.

A communication was received from Mr. F. M. Murray Secy of the Board of Trade, asking the town council to direct the attention of the I. C. R. authorities to the need of proper signals at railway crossings within the town limits in the interests of public safety.

### POSTPONED

Governor Jette Extends Time for Opening of Quebec House

Quebec, Feb 6.—Lieut. Gov. Sir Louis Jette has granted the request made by the cabinet on Saturday for permission to postpone the opening of the legislature called for the 9th instant, until March, in order to afford the premier time to reconstruct his cabinet and replace three ministers who resigned.

Friends of Hon. Mr. Turgeon state that among the reasons why the lieutenant governor granted Premier Parent's request for postponement was on account of his physical condition.

In respect to the reconstruction of his cabinet the premier said today that he had called a meeting of the government in caucus for Wednesday when he would give them all a voice in the matter of choosing the three new ministers to replace Hon. Messrs. Gouin, Turgeon and Weir and also nominate the candidate for the speakership.

Hon. Mr Parent's friends say that the lieutenant governor's decision is a victory for the premier over his political opponents, but the impression prevails that Mr. Parent's term of office will not be long, that he will of his own accord retire from active politics in the course of a few months. His health demands such a course, but he will not be forced out if he can help it.
