SANFORD AT SHILOH,

Is Much Refreshed by Trip
to Miramichi Woods,

MANSLAUGHTER CASE

Will Probably Come up This
Week. Baptist Minister
Will be Witness.

AUBURN, Me., May 18.—The Rev. Frank W. Sandford of Shiloh, Dur-
ham, was here today in consultation
with his attorneys, the Hon. H. W.
Oakes and H. E. Coolidge of Lisbon
Falls. Their talk concerned principally
Mr. Sandford's approaching trial for
manslaughter at Farmington. He
appears refreshed as a result of his
recent outing in the Miramichi region.
Messrs. Coolidge and Oakes laugh at
the suggestion put forth that Mr.
Sandford was out of the state to avoid
answering the manslaughter indict-
ment.

"It would be the height of folly for
him to default the case," said Attorney
Coolidge. "His sureties would have to
pay, and he would be liable to arrest
on the indictment just the same if he
ever appeared in this state again."

Mr. Sandford was closeted with his
counsel about two hours, after which
he returned to Shiloh, and attorneys
called on Justice Spear of the Supreme
Court, who has yet to hand down his
written decree in the Dunlap case. He
has merely formally confirmed the
decrees of the lower court up to this
time.

It is expected that the manslaughter
case will come up for trial at Farming-
ton the last of next week.

Avon, May 18.—The Rev. N. H.
Harriman, of the Baptist church here
this town, whose exposure of affairs at
Shiloh (Me.), and the influence of
"Elijah" Sandford have resulted in
repeated sensations recently,
has issued a statement to his parish-
ioners in this district, in which he
tells how he became a Sandford
devotee and correct some impressions
which might be formed from the testi-
mony given at the Dunlap trial.

He says he never whipped his boy
"until the blood came," as has gone
abroad, and while loyal to the faith
during his residence there, he is glad
that he can say that whatever of sev-
erity was practised, he did not do this
thing. On this he says:

"All true Shilohites are severe, and
some are cruel. They apply strictly all
teachings about 'exact righteousness,'
and being 'fair and clear and terrible,'
especially 'terrible,' and about 'ruining
one's house,' and such teachings seem
very plausible in the severe atmos-
phere of Shiloh. I do not doubt that
I was severe with the rest, for I was
'loyal.' But I am glad that I never
did that thing. Other men, no doubt
as good as I did, but I am thankful
that I never did."

Mr. Harriman says he will be a
witness at the trial of Sandford for
manslaughter next week and that he
has been in communication with the
county attorney in regard to sum-
moning witnesses for prosecution. He
expresses the belief that Shiloh will
eventually fall, and that he is deter-
mined to continue his exposures until
that result is obtained.

"I am satisfied," said Mr. Harriman
"that new teaching has been given the
people of Shiloh regarding lying.
Sandford taught always, up to the
time that we left, to tell the truth or
somebody would go to hell, but some-
body is manufacturing lies up there
now. They have changed tactics and
seem no longer afraid to falsify. He
must have taught them that they will
be excused if they protect him, and
that would be sufficient for them."

Other features of Mr. Harriman's
statement, issued to-day are as follows:
"I got into Sandfordism through
what I now know to have been some-
what fanatical pursuit of ideal Christi-
anity. I sacrificed everything for this.
For 4 years I was engaged in inde-
pendent work on the Pacific coast,
and I left denominational work that I
might get nearer the standard of what
I considered an ideal church. I had

just enough fanaticism in this work
to make me an easy prey of Sandford.
He came to my city, Tacoma, at my
invitation, I took him for 10 cents on
the dollar. I gave him my implicit
confidence, believed everything he
said about himself and believed his
purpose was true. I went to Shiloh
to spend three months and study his.
At the end of three months, I was
so far enslaved and so fearful of mak-
ing a mistake if I left him, that I con-
tinued until I had fathomed the thing
to the bottom.

"Further, in reference to one's en-
slavement, it must not be forgotten
that Sandford's strange claims of be-
ing 'Elijah' and 'David,' and the first
two witnesses' and 'Ismeh,' the
branch and his stranger conduct in the
time of the epidemic of smallpox, when
the Bartlett boy died, and his son,
James Sandford, fasted three days—all
this occurred after my complete en-
slavement, as it was the report of the
wild doings coming to us in Jerusalem
that opened my eyes. It should fur-
ther be remembered that one's will is
not subdued in a day, but step by step,
by nicely adjusted graduation, with
the cunning of a madam, and with
the skill of a master.

"At the end of three years, without
expecting ever again to be independent
of Sandford's authority, God suddenly
opened my eyes to see that the man
was either a trickster or insane, or
both. And, braving all his threats, that
mean very much to one who had be-
come his slave, I left him, or his party
in Jerusalem and returned to America,
solely pledged to God, who had
delivered me, that I would do every
legitimate thing that I could to deliver
those who are enslaved as I was and
prevent others from joining them.
This I have been doing as occasion
offered, and expect to continue to do as
long as there is anything I can do,
disagreeable and humiliating as it is.

Portland, Me., May 17.—The Rev. F.
W. Sandford's "Night Wanderer," which
left Portland Harbor Sunday night,
has returned. Late this afternoon two
men and a woman, heavily laden with
baggage, arrived at the wharf nearest
the Wanderer's berth, signalled her,
and a small boat was sent ashore and
took them out to the yacht.

P. E. I. TUNNEL

ENGLAND'S NAVY

Big Battleship Launched—
Turbine Engines To Be
Adopted

London, May 20.—The first
class battleship Africa of 16,340
tons, was launched at Chatham
dockyard to-day. She is of the
King Edward VII type.

Glasgow, May 21.—The British
Admiralty has invited engineering
firms here to make tenders for the
construction of turbine engines in-
tended for the new battleships to
be built in the government dock-
yard. The specifications demand
that the engines develop 2,300
horse-power.

CANADA'S ARTILLERY

PLANS OF REORGANIZATION.

OTTAWA, May 18.—The artil-
lery branch of the Canadian mil-
itia is to be reorganized. A Gaz-
ette issued to-day gives the details.
A number of batteries will be
added. These and the established
batteries are grouped into brigades.
ammunition columns are added to
the various batteries for the first
time, and an ammunition park is
to be organized at Montreal. This
all concerns field artillery. The
changes in the Garrison artillery
branch are not so great. They
consist chiefly in the conversion
of small companies into larger ones
and placing the garrison artillery
generally on a higher establishment.
The field artillery will be organized
in two.

(a) Batteries comprising two sec-
tions of two subsections each.

(b) Brigades comprising three
batteries and an ammunition col-
umn.

The organization of additional
batteries is authorized; 14th bat-
tery in Nova Scotia; 19th battery
in St. John, N. B.; 16th battery in
Quebec military district No. 7; 22nd
battery in Montreal; 23rd
battery in Eastern townships; 23rd
battery in Ottawa; 24th battery in
Peterboro, Ont.

Military district No 8 is going
to be 4th field artillery brigade,
consisting of 10th Woodstock and
the 12th Newcastle field batteries,
with an ammunition column. No.
16, St. John battery, is unbrigaded.
The ultimate purpose is to add
batteries until ten of the field ar-
tillery brigades have three of them.

3rd Regt. G. A. at St. John, Nos.
1, 2, 3 and 4 companies, will be
merged into three companies on
the higher establishment garrison
artillery; 4th Regt. C. A., Char-
lottetown, Nos 1 and 2 companies,
will become No 1 company; 3 and
4, No 2; 5 and 6, No 3 company.
The present company headquarters
of Nos 5 and 6 companies becoming
half company headquarters, all
allowances to be payable to
half company commanders. The
company establishments will be
that of garrison artillery, higher
establishment.
