PRaises Troops
Czar Pays Tribute to the Defenders of Port Arthur
RUSSIAN PRESS
Still Hopeful—Russian Cavalry Retreat in Disorder

St Petersburg Jan 14.—Emperor Nicholas has addressed the following rescript to the army and navy:
"Port Arthur has passed into the hands of the enemy. During eleven months the fight has been going on in its defence. More than seven months its noble defenders had been cut off from the rest of the world. Without any positive assurance of relief they continued to fight and did everything in their power to check the progress of the enemy's attack. Neither life nor heart's blood to uphold the honor of the Russian people."
Russia, with pride and admiration followed each move in the contest. The whole world was astonished at their gallantry, but daily their ranks were thinned, their powers of resistance diminished, and under repeated attacks by the enemy, they were obliged to give away.

"Peace, honor and undying memory was the portion of our Russians who have fallen in the defence of Port Arthur. Far from home you have laid your bodies upon alien soil, a sacrifice to the distastes of your own honor and the commands of your emperor."
"Peace and honor be your portion, Always will you be so held in our hearts and memory."
"Honor to the living, may God restore you to health and strength and give you patience to face this disaster with which you are confronted."
"My gallant troops and sailors, do not let this sorrow dismay you. Our enemy is strong and daring. This fight against them occurs 7,000 miles from our home, but Russia is powerful. In the thousand years of its existence there have been heavier trials worse and more threatening dangers but Russia ever arose from trial with renewed force and strength. Do not let your souls be troubled by lack of success and heavy losses. Russian strength grows with adversity."
"With all Russia I join in the belief that the time is coming when God will give strength to our glorious army and navy to arise and break the force of the enemy."

St Petersburg Jan 14.—New Year reviews by the various papers admit frankly that the Japanese have had the better of the war so far, but the whole tone of the press is summed up in the following statement in the Russ: "They have done well but not well enough. They have entrenched themselves in Korea as though they were at home; have captured Port Arthur and made conquest of most of Southern Manchuria. They are face to face to a Russian army of equal numbers and they are checked. The New Year will show the Russian flag raised again under the jords of the warm water."
The Novoe Vremya alone, comments on the Russian reports regarding Chinese neutrality and says it reveals a serious statement in the Secretary Hay's diplomacy, well conceived at the beginning of the war for the limitation of the field of hostilities has broken down under the test of actual retreat and made conquest of most of China cannot or will not preserve her neutrality and Russia has been confronted time and again, the article says, by the way in which Wei Hai Wei and Chee Poo have been used as Japanese bases. In conclusion the Novoe Vremya says it is a situation wherein Russia must no longer rely upon international diplomacy, but must take steps for her own protection.

Tokio Jan 14.—An additional report from the Japanese headquarters state that the Russian cavalry which was defeated in the neighborhood of Yinkow Wednesday retreated in disorderly condition to North Takonkan south of New Chwang, leaving 62 killed and 6 wounded behind. Many abandoned their arms and accoutrements in their flight. It is believed that the Russian casualties exceeded 200. The Japanese routed the Russians near Chwang Friday.

Conservatives Unanimous
OTTAWA, Jan. 14.—Mr R. L. Borden met the conservative members in caucus this morning and consented to continue in the leadership. There was a large attendance of conservative members. They were practically unanimous in their request to Mr.

Borden to continue leader. Any rival aspirants saw the tide running so strongly for Mr. Borden that they did not spring their movement. Mr Borden accepted the leadership and the offer of Mr. Edward Kid to give him Carleton County. Mr. Kidd will call a meeting of his followers to obtain their consent to this. It is probable a convention of Carleton County electors will be held immediately.

FIRE AT SYDNEY
Fine Business Block Guttled
Sydney, N. S. Jan 14.—Shortly before twelve o'clock to-day fire broke out in the Ross block, on Charlotte Street, one of the principal business blocks in the city and some ten minutes later the fire was eating its way up the elevator shaft with huge tongues of flame shooting out of the front of the building and immense volumes of smoke pouring out in all directions. The fire department reached the scene a few minutes after the alarm, but so suddenly did the fire spread that it was nearly an hour before they got it under control.
The fire started in Redden's store by one of the employes tramp'ing on a safety match, which ignited some inflammable material lying about. The spread of the fire was remarkably quick. The occupants of several offices in the building had a narrow escape in making their way out having to resort to fire escapes and firemen's ladders. Coming from the third story even this means was attended with great danger.
Little or nothing of the contents was saved from most of these offices. The damage to the building will be about \$15,000 and loss to occupants will probably amount to over \$30,000, making total losses of some \$45,000. Ross & McLeod had about the finest stock library in the city, all of which is destroyed. Rev Mr. Greenless had rooms adjoining his office; he looses practically everything.
The fire was under complete control shortly after one o'clock.—Globe

PROFESSIONAL EATERS.
Indiana Employ Substitutes to Consume Food For Them.
One of the most striking customs of the past that are preserved by the Indians of today is found among the tribes on the Devil's Lake reservation in North Dakota. An official of the Indian service gives the following account of this peculiar practice:
"From time immemorial the Devil's Lake Sioux have adhered to an old custom in regard to the treatment of a guest. According to their etiquette, it is the bounden duty of the host to supply his guest with all the food he may desire, and as a rule the appropriation set before the visiting Indian is much in excess of the capacity of a single man."
"But by the same custom the guest is obliged to eat all that is placed before him, else he grossly insults his entertainer. It was found that this practice would work a hardship, but instead of dispensing with the custom the Indian method of reasoning was applied, and what is known as the professional eater was brought to the front."
"While the guest is supposed to eat all that is placed before him, it seems the same purpose of his neighbor as to sit beside them through a meal and eat what the guest leaves. The professional eaters are never looked upon in the light of guests, but more as traveling companions with a particular duty to perform."
"These eaters receive from \$1 to \$2 and even \$3 for each meal where they assist. It is stated by the agent of the professional eaters that one of the professional eaters has been known to dispose of seventeen pounds of beef at a single table, and more capable of eating an almost fabulous amount I myself can testify."

"SLEEPY" WOODCHUCK.
The Little Animals Are Far More Alert Than They Appear.
If there is any one of our native animals that looks slow, clumsy, lazy and generally unfit to survive in the struggle for existence it is the woodchuck. After he has built, or rather excavated, his burrow, he is to all the truth, he does in a rapid and businesslike way—he does nothing but eat and sleep. Yet any one who sizes him up as an incompetent is likely to get fooled, for he is a source of continual surprises.
When your garden is not far from the woods you may be awakened in the middle of the night by a series of most startling yells, which are occasioned by some hungry woodchuck that has come for a nocturnal visit to the cabbage patch and met with a warm reception from your dogs. The woodchuck usually gets away apparently unharmed, while the dogs are left to nurse their scratched noses and fore paws. The woodchuck, in fact, has plenty of courage, yet will always fight in preference to running away.
Throughout the summer this little "wood pig" spends most of his time in the vicinity of his burrow, coming out early in the morning to take his breakfast, returning to his nest for a morning nap, appearing again at noon and late in the afternoon for his dinner and supper, only to return again for another nap. Occasionally he makes a visit to some neighboring orchard or garden. By Oct. 1, when he is fat, he retires into his subterranean home for a long sleep, until, as we are led to believe, the proverbial "ground hog" day.—County Life in America.

A COUNTERFEIT BILL
Very Dangerous \$10 Bill Was Passed this Morning
A city merchant to-day had passed off on him a \$10 counterfeit bill of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Fortunately an early discovery was made, and as the merchant knew the party from whom he got the bill, the matter was straightened out. The merchant is satisfied the man from whom he took the bill was himself taken in on it and had no intention of wrongdoing. The counterfeit is said to be one of the most dangerous in existence, and in the bank counterfeit detectors the following description is given: It is signed Wm McMaster, president, and W. Cook, cashier; is dated May 1st 1871. The color of the blue numbers is a trifle lighter than those of the genuine. The vignette in the centre coarser than in the genuine, particularly the head of the lion. In counterfeit the bases of the letter A in the dollar are connected in one line, while in the genuine there is a distinct opening. The staff or perpendicular line of the letter P in word president in counterfeit extends below the line upon which the word president is written; in genuine it terminates directly on the line. There are five shades lines under the word ten dollars in counterfeit and only four in genuine. Shading of the title, Mandrake and Butterbur, is peculiar, coarse and scratchy, lathe work excellent, but slightly defective. Back of note color of green ink lighter than on the genuine, and lathe work defective. The paper is thinner than that of the genuine. The counterfeit is of an issue withdrawn from circulation some years ago and of which there are very few notes now outstanding.
The detector does not give the number of the bill, but this particular one was numbered 301,366. Persons holding ten dollars bills of the Canadian Bank of Commerce issue of 1871, want to compare them carefully with the above description, and they will then see whether or not any more of these counterfeits are in circulation hereabouts.—Globe


HOODOO ENGINE
