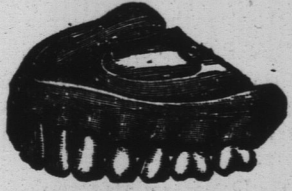

## BATHURST HORSE

Won at Moncton Races Last Week

OWNED BY F. GOODWIN.

Captured 2.30 Event in Three Straight Heats

The Transcript has the following in reference to the 2.30 trot and pace on the Moncton Speedway on Friday—Storm King had the pole in the first heat of the 2.30 trot and pace. Storm King took the lead on the first turn with Kinkora second. The Summerside horse broke and dropped back, but Storm King held his head and was well ahead at the half with Parker L. pulling up the back stretch they went and on the last turn Parker L. began to pull up. It was a pretty race down the stretch and they shot under the wire with Parker L's nose in Storm King's stutty. Alice H. went out at the first turn. Harding's mare driven by Reckford, formerly of Moncton was acting badly all the time and went in the air at the start. Time 2.23 1/4. By quarters 35 1/4, 1.46 1/4, 2.23 1/4.

There was very little between Storm King and Parker L. in this heat. The pole horse Storm King took the lead at the start and at the first turn Parker L. pulled into second place and drew away from the bunch at the half, Parker L's nose was once more at Storm King's bike and then at the three mark Etta Mac pulled out from the bunch and began to race for second place. Parker L. had 100 much of a lead and when the horses turned into the stretch Storm King, Parker L. and Etta Mac were in the order named with less than a length between each. It was a nice race for the wire but there was no change in the positions. Just inside the distance flag, Little Tom fell pitching the driver over the horse's head. The driver almost miraculously alighted on his feet and neither horse nor driver were injured.

Time—2.21. By quarters 35 1/4, 1.46 1/4, 2.21

There was nothing but Storm King in this heat, and Parker seemed to be the only horse who could give the chestnut a race. The Bathurst horse took the lead at the first turn, and followed by Parker L. drew away from the bunch by several lengths. The positions were unchanged at the half, but at the three quarter Parker L. pulled up a little. Storm King was not being driven very hard and won without a touch of the whip, with Parker L. half a length behind in second place. Will Patch had been drawn before this heat, as well as Little Tom. His best mark yesterday was 2.21, but he was not called upon for faster work.

### DISASTROUS FIRE.

A disastrous fire entirely swept out of existence the lower end of Albert village Albert County on Friday between three o'clock in the afternoon and seven in the evening. It was only by the almost superhuman efforts of the heroic people who organized a bucket brigade and made a stand at the Baptist church that the entire village was not destroyed. As it was, twenty-two buildings were burned, causing a loss of between \$30,000 and \$40,000, with every insurance. A south-west gale scattered the burning embers in every direction and even set fire to buildings on both sides as far as the sympathy of all will be extended to the people of the enterprising village.

Albert, Albert Co., July 8.—A south-west gale was blowing on Friday afternoon, when a fire from some unknown cause, broke out in Brewster's and Co's carriage and woodworking factory on Bridge Street on both sides as far as the McNulty buildings was in flames. Under the pressure of the still gale the burning embers were carried enormous distances, and several buildings outside of the district named were set afire during the afternoon and early evening, but fortunately were suppressed. Clouds of smoke arose bearing the burning embers and scattering the same even as far away as Riverside at more than one mile away several fires were started but fortunately put out without serious damage. Coleman Starratt's barn, half a mile back of the village caught from an ember but the fire was quickly master.

The fire swept up Bridge Street until the Baptist church was reached. This caught several times, but the bucket brigade made an heroic stand and by saving the church, it is believed saved the rest of the village from destruction. It had been overcome by the flames, the fire would have leaped the gap and destroyed the rest of the village. Within four hours, that is between 3.30 p. m., twenty-two houses and buildings were razed to the ground; nearly \$40,000 loss sustained with very little insurance. The village has suffered a severe blow. There were no means of stopping the progress of the flames. Men, woman and children worked to save their homes, and it was only by heroic efforts that the houses which remained were saved from the flames. There is no water system of fire apparatus of any kind in Albert, and the only manner in which the flames were fought by a bucket brigade.—Transcript.

About five o'clock the races were started but only two had been run when a sudden thunder shower came and nobody being prepared it was spreading confusion all around but Mr Steele appearing on the scene kindly offered the use of his house for the rest of the day, this generous offer was speedily accepted. Refreshments were served out on the front verandah by some of the members who volunteered their services, chief amongst whom was Mr Gordon Robertson who made for his business a rather one wanted for anything.

Everybody having ate heartily and the shower being over a three legged race was run, the first prize was won by Gordon Robertson and Hughie Johnston the former belonging to Little Cascadia and the latter to B. Cape. The second prize was won by Edie Howatson and Jeffrey McKenzie both of Black Cape. The boys were well satisfied with their prizes being much heavier than they expected. No more races were ran as the ground was inclined to be slippery, then every body came into the house where the game of "Hot Potato" and other well known parlor games was played until seven o'clock.

When the boys who had teams and single rigs took the girls with them and went for a drive as far as Rousseau LeBlanc and back again. The head drivers had their rigs decorated with flags so the hind ones who did not have any did not. On the whole it looked more like some grand wedding than anything else.

Much praise should be given to Mrs J. C. Fair and Miss I. Fair who were the leading spirits of the day and it was owing to their united efforts that the picnic proved such a grand success and it will likely lead to a large number of members joining in the near future.

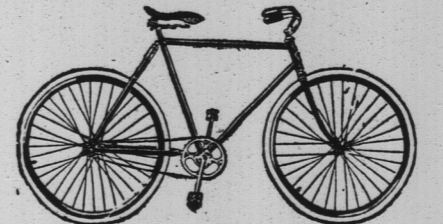
