OBITUARY

MR JOHN R THOMPSON. At Dalhousie Jct Feb 17th John R. Thompson passed peacefully to his rest, in the 64th year of his age, after a lingering illness. He was a member of the Presbyterian church for a number of years, and was highly respected by all who knew him. By his death he leaves a sorrowing wife, two sons and one daughter to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and loving father, also three brothers and two sisters. Deceased was an old and faithful employee of the I. C. R. for a number of years. Much sorrow is felt for the sorrowing family in their bereavement. MR ALEXANDER CURRIE. Mr Alexander Currie, native of Point LaNim, County of Restigouche, N. B., died at Rio Vista Solano County California on January 21st 1905 at the age of 64 years 2 mos and 22 days. He was buried on January 21st in his family plot in the Masonic and Oddfellows Cemetery at Rio Vista. The funeral service being conducted by the Rev Herbert Livingston of the Congregational church and the Masonic services by his Brethren of Rio Vista Lodge 208 of which he was a devoted member. The deceased came to Rio Vista in the 60's and located in what is known as the Montezuma Hills on a ranch of 150 acres about seven miles west of Rio Vista together with his father and mother and two sisters. Another sister Mrs. Thos Menzies with her husband and family living at that time on an adjoining ranch, this sister having departed this life some years later her family removed to other parts of the state. The two sisters who came here with Mr. Currie and his parents both married a few years after coming to California one became the wife of Daniel Stewart and died in the year 1875, the other is Mrs: Chas Howard of San Jose Cal.
