**CROWN LAND BILL.**

Government Measure Presented to Legislature.

**TO PROTECT CLAM BEDS**

Government to Have Power to Deal With all Boom Companies.

Fredericton, Mar. 15.—By far the most important bill brought before the House to-day—in some ways the most important of the session—was that having to do with the crown timber lands. This was introduced and explained by the Provincial Secretary. Under its provisions a sub-committee of the Executive Council will act in conjunction with Surveyor General Sweeney in carrying out the Government's newly formulated policy in regard to these timber lands. Mr. Sweeney and this sub-committee will first place at work a corps of competent men—provincialists if possible, but competent men at all events—to make a careful and complete survey of the lands, divide them into suitable districts, and run the base line, which, as generally known, are of prime importance. These men will also be required to classify the lands and prepare a thorough report relative to them. This report will not only deal with the lands and the timber on them, but also with the various streams in the districts, how they may be made more accessible where access to them is now a matter of difficulty, and how steps may best be taken to make log driving a possibility even during the dry season when the water, in the course of nature, would be expected to be so low as to preclude the carrying on of driving operations. The Premier, as he stated on a previous occasion, is confident that men of practical knowledge can perfect plans to render the driving possible at all seasons.

Another duty of these men will be to describe and locate the tracts

of crown lands suitable for agricultural purposes. Where it is feasible to do so these agricultural tracts will be divided into one hundred acre lots. The lands on which the timber is underzoned and of suitable growth and the relative value of the timber lands in the different sections of the province, will likely be reported upon. As Mr Tweedie stated, the need of more exact knowledge of the relative value of the several tracts of provincial timber lands has been apparent for some time. "When this knowledge is obtained the absurdity of putting all the lands up at the same upset price need no longer exist. Under the bill accurate maps of the lands will be prepared after the survey work is completed."

The bill also authorizes the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to take certain action. Perhaps the most important power given His Honor in Council is that of enacting regulations dealing with boom companies. These companies will be required to charge only such tolls as the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may deem proper and fair, and in their methods of management the companies must conform to the idea of what is reasonable in the opinion of the Governor-in-Council. Commissions to inquire into charges against Boom Companies may also be made by the Governor-in-Council, and steps taken for the further protection of the forests from fire and for the improvement of the streams for driving purposes. Another important section of the bill makes provision for the New Brunswick authorities to confer with those of Quebec and Maine respectively with a view to improving and regulating log-driving on the St John River. Any agreement in this regard entered into by the provincial government must be ratified by the legislature.

A provincial forestry convention is also provided for, and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council is empowered to enact regulations re the cutting of stunted timber, further protection of the forests from fire, the removal from the woods of hemlock trees from which the bark has been stripped, and the special protection of the lands about the headwaters of the rivers.

The whole cost of the surveys, etc., is roughly estimated by the Premier at from ten to twenty thousand dollars.

Some persons may sneer at the claim. There are those who looking with distrust upon its cousin the oyster, do not think highly of the ordinary, every day clam. But the clam has a dietetic, and consequently a commercial value. Hence it is reasonable that the government should take steps to protect the clam beds of the province. In the bill referred to immediately above it is provided that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may put into force regulations for the protection of these beds. Surveys are to be made and leases of the beds may be given. These leases are not to be for a period of longer than ten years, but are to be renewable for a second term of not longer than a decade.—Globe.

**A COMPLETE FARCE**

Radicals Practically Shut out of Voting in Russia

**GOV'T INTERFERED**

Attitude of workmen—Troops and Police at the Polls—A Reign of Terror

ST. PETERSBURG, March 19.—As the elections proceed there is more and more evidence of the virtual exclusion from participation of the radical elements of the population. The preliminary stages of the elections will rob the national assembly of much of its national character. Its authority to speak will be abolutely denied by the proletariat organizations, which bore the brunt of the fight for liberty. Complaints of interference and duress in the county districts are increasing. Many flagrant instances are cited of the terrorism of local officials in preventing a free expression of the peasants and often practically compelling the selection of Priests and of village elders. The seeming apathy of the small land owners' assemblies, to which an average of only ten per cent, of the voters were present, is explainable by the feeling that they were not free to choose. The most serious phase of the situation, however, is the attitude of the workmen in the cities, who constitute politically the most developed and most radical faction of the masses of the population.

In spite of repression, wholesale arrests and frequently the exile of their leaders, since the strike disorders many workmen are inclined to reject the advice of the socialists to boycott the elections. The authorities, instead of taking advantage of this sentiment and inducing the workmen as a class to participate, have with fatuous blindness openly discouraged their participation where the radical elements are in the majority, thus deliberately playing the game of the boycotters and driving the whole working class into revolt. This was apparent at the workmen's elections in St. Petersburg yesterday.

Carefully collected information from the outlying industrial districts to-day shows that the elections were a complete farce. Not only eleven out of the thirty-nine working groups entitled to participate elected twenty out of fifty, seven delegates to the convention which would represent the representatives for the city to the national assembly. In reality the number of workmen participating was very small. Where the elections were ostensibly held only 500 out of 21,780 workmen voted, and they almost invariably chose reactionaries.

There was an overwhelming display of troops and police in the precincts and places where the men assembled. Some of the men held meetings and discussed the advisability of participating, but the great mass simply withdrew, declaring that during the present reign of terror the designation of their real choice was equivalent to turning over a man to police.

In the big Okhta and Moscow districts not a single man has been seen since the 18th inst. The men have refused to vote until the imprisoned members of their organization are released from jail.

**PORT DANIEL**

An examination of No. 2 School was held by the Chairman and Commissioners on Thursday the 8th inst. there being 53 pupils present, among whom are a great many grown up scholars. The Commissioners expressed their entire satisfaction at the progress of the school and commended the teacher Mrs N Dow, very highly for her energy, and successful work.

A very interesting feature of the examination was a young man attending said school, who had his right hand accidentally taken off in a threshing machine in November last, and not having received much education in boyhood, is now endeavoring to qualify himself for a position to earn his living. It is remarkable to see the progress he is making, in learning to write and figure with his left hand.

The Commissioners report was as follows:—"At an examination of School No 2 held at Port Daniel West this eight day of March 1906, at which the Chairman and Commissioners were present, we find that the scholars attending said school have made good progress, which we attribute to the industry and energy of their teacher Mrs N Dow."

**TERRIFIC BATTLE.**

MANILA, Mar. 9.—An important action between American forces and hostile Moros has taken place near Jolo. Fifteen enlisted men were killed, a commissioned officer was wounded, four enlisted men were wounded and a naval contingent operating with the military sustained thirty-two casualties. The Moros lost 600 men killed.

Major-General Leonard Wood, commander of the division of the Philippines, reports as follows from Jolo, capital of the Sulu Islands:—"A severe action between troops, a naval detachment and constabulary and hostile Moros, has taken place at Mount Dajo, near Jolo. The engagement opened during the afternoon of March 6 and ended in the morning of March 8. The action involved the capture of Mount Dajo, a lava cone, 2,100 feet high, with a crater at its summit and extremely steep. The last 100 feet were at an angle of sixty degrees and there were fifty perpendicular ridges covered with a growth of timber and strongly fortified and defended by an invisible force of Moros."

"The army casualties were fifteen enlisted men killed, a commissioned officer and four enlisted men wounded. The naval casualties numbered 32. Ensign H. D. Cooke Jr., of the United States Steamer Pam Panga was severely wounded in the elbow.

"The constabulary casualties were Captain John R. White, wounded in the thigh severely, three

enlisted men killed and thirteen wounded. Captain Tyree Rivers sustained a slight flesh wound in the thigh. Lieut. Gordon was slightly wounded in the right hand. Lieut. Wylie T. Conway, of the Sixth Infantry, was slightly wounded in the left eye. All the wounded are doing well.

"Col Joseph W. Duncan, of the Sixth Infantry, directed the operations. All the defenders of the Moro stronghold were killed. Six hundred bodies were found on the field.

"The action resulted in the extinction of a band of outlaws who, recognizing no chief, has been raiding friendly Moros and who, owing to their defiance of the American authority, had stirred up a dangerous condition of affairs."

Another account of the fight near Jolo states that 600 outlaw Moros were killed in the crater of the precipitous volcano, five miles from Jolo.

The attack was under the immediate command of Col Duncan of the Sixth Infantry. The fighting lasted two days among the lava ridges which had been strongly fortified by the Moros. Artillery had to be hoisted by means of ropes up the last 500 feet at an angle of sixty degrees.

General Wood highly commends the work of the troops.

**GRANT FOR EXHIBITION**

**Government Favorable says Premier, But not Officially Decided**

"I rather think we shall give a grant for the St John exhibition this year," said Premier Tweedie last evening in response to a question by a representative of The Telegraph on the subject "You can say," he added, "that the members of the government are favorable to it, but the matter has not yet been decided on officially."

The offer to lease the Central railway was referred to, and Mr Tweedie was asked if anything had transpired since the vote on the question was taken in the legislature. He replied that he had notified Messrs Green-shields, of Montreal, through whom the offer was made, that the proposal they made would not be accepted. Speaking of the new forestry act, the Premier said all questions of detail would be left to the committee who would be appointed to confer with the surveyor-general.

He thought that, talking into consideration the thorough survey of the province which would have to be made, it might be a year and a half or possibly longer before the work would be completed. In this he included the building of dams at the head waters for storing the water so as to overcome the lumbermen's difficulties in dry season.

In referring to the work of the session, which he mentioned would probably terminate on Thursday, the Premier said the business transacted had been of unusual importance and he believed it would be generally conceded that the legislative policy of the government had been in the interests of the province.
