I. C. R. MEN REINSTATED

They Were Suspended on Account of the Beaver Brook Accident

I. C. R. Conductor John F. Doyle and Locomotive Engineer Harry C. Cameron, who has been under suspension for several months on account of the Beaver Brook disaster, have both been re-instated. Mr. R. Harry Smith, I. C. R. legal investigator, who conducted the enquiry at Campbellton, made a lengthy and exhaustive report of the case from the evidence adduced and gave it as his legal opinion that the conductor and engineer were working on the order and were not guilty of any wrong doing or neglect of duty, and recommended their re-instatement. Deputy Minister Butler, to whom the report was forwarded, sustained Mr. Smith's decision by ordering the re-instatement of both the suspended employes. Mr. Cameron will run on specials east and west, and Conductor Doyle will resume his old position on the northern division.

Mr. Smith when asked about the matter this morning said, "I am glad that the men have been re-instated in their old positions, and believe the decision of the department is right."

GENERAL BOTHA'S RECEPTION.

The lionization of General Botha, the noted Boer leader, who is now prime minister of the Transvaal has been the feature of the gathering of the colonial premiers in London. All classes, from ministerial and other dignitaries downward have vied in their welcome to him, and his reception, compared with that of the other colonial guest, suggest the joy of the angels—over the sinner that repenteth. While the "just persons," represented by the other premiers, met with hearty plaudits from the people in the street, when they were driving to the Guild Hall, an enthusiastic mob greeted the head of the new Transvaal Government throughout the route to General Botha's evident, though, modest, satisfaction.

ion, and to the unceasing delight of his sister and daughter who accompanied him. His reception within the Guild Hall was equally striking. He was first presented to the Lord Mayor, who awaited the guest surrounded by the ministers, ex-ministers, generals and other personages. A fanfare of trumpets heralded General Botha's appearance immediately after which a military band played, "See the Conquering Hero Comes." After momentary hesitation, as if questioning himself whether all the fuss was really intended for him, he accepted the situation and advanced amid cheers to receive the Lord Mayor's greetings. A few minutes later he was exchanging salutations with Field Marshal Lord Roberts, who nearly embraced him in his manifest joy at meeting him in such altered circumstances. Field Marshal Sir Geo. White, the defender of Ladysmith, joined General Botha and Lord Roberts, and three chatted enthusiastically, to the delight of the lookers on.

At a banquet given by the eighty Club to the Prime Ministers to-night, General Botha received further attentions. Mr. Haldane, secretary of state for war, said in the course of a speech: "I welcome a new general among us, a very great general, too, with whom the pleasure of conferring in reference to mutual defence of the Empire. Subsequently General Botha made a brief speech, in which he said: "The manly, courageous confidence shown by the British to the people of the Transvaal is the best seed ever sown in South Africa. We will prove by our acts that we are worthy of this confidence. Our Government is as jealous of the honor of the British flag as any other colony of the Empire. The message from the Transvaal is that she wants to strengthen the bonds of co-operation and love and unity of the empire."

ENGLAND NO LONGER A 'DRINKING' NATION

London, April 18. Englishmen get more sober every year. Statistics published annually show that the quantity of intoxicating liquor consumed in this country is an ever-decreasing amount.

In the Board of Trade report on "Alcoholic Beverages, 1905," it is shown that in that year the amount of beer drunk in the United Kingdom was 1,167,023,000 gallons, or 27.7 gallons per head of population, compared with 1,328,703,060 gallons, or 32.9 gallons drunk in 1899.

The United States now produces more than England, although it was formerly last of the three great brewing countries. England brewed in 1905 1,219,000,000 gallons, compared with the American output of 1,413,000,000 gallons, and Germany's 1,601,000,000.

In the consumption of both wine and spirits there has been a steady decrease in England. In 1905 the average Briton drank 0.19 gallons of spirits compared with 1.11 gallons in 1906, and 0.27 gallons of wine, compared with 0.41 in 1899.

Newspaper Costs \$2.58 Per Copy.

A copy of the Yukon Sun newspaper sent to a Montictonian makes very interesting reading. Newspapers are worth money in the city of ice and frost. The Sun reports that on account of the dog-carrying trail teams not arriving with printing paper ordered over a year ago by the Sun, that the Editor is indebted to "Arizona Abe" for the loan of all the white wrapping paper in Abe's restaurant. For his kindness and his generosity in a time of trouble, the Editor commends Abe to the general public, as being an up-to-date citizen with a heart as big as a leather valise. The price of the Sun printed on the white wrapping paper is \$2.58 per copy, and the request is made by the Editor to hand the Sun into Abe

A. G. BLAIR LEFT ESTATE OF \$200,000

St. John, Friday, April 18.—When Andrew G. Blair died so suddenly a few months ago, the general impression was that he was a poor man. Scarcely anyone, even among his near friends, believed that he was possessed of more than ten or fifteen thousand dollars worth of property, the idea being that the principal amount of his wealth was invested in the New Brunswick Telephone Company. Hence it comes as a great surprise to all to learn that Mr. Blair left an estate valued at not less than two hundred thousand dollars. This is the information which cannot yet be authoritatively announced, but which reaches here from a good source. Mr. Blair's will has been entered for probate, in the probate court at Ottawa, and the draft inventory fixes the amount at about two hundred thousand, a considerable portion of which is in life insurance. It is learned here that the will has not yet been admitted to probate because of a disagreement in regard to the succession tax to be paid to the provincial government of Ontario. This has been

the cause of the delay, but it is anticipated that a settlement will very shortly be reached. It is understood that the bulk of Mr. Blair's estate goes to the members of his family.

Canned Salmon Was Poisonous.

Seizure in Montreal of 50,000 Tins Just as They Were Being Sold.

Montreal April 20.—That half of Montreal's population was not poisoned is not the fault of certain dealers in canned salmon at present unknown. There were 50,000 tins shipped to Montreal from Toronto for sale at auction. Ald. Gallery was told they were bad and he informed the food inspector who found the fish was decomposed and every can was poisonous. Had 50,000 cans of fish been put into as many homes at least 200,000 people would have been poisoned.
