BECOMING A FARCE

Are the people of this country opposed to capital punishment? We are inclined to believe that the majority are. It is the rule nowadays in this country when a murderer is condemned to death to circulate a petition among the people which has for its object the commutation of his sentence to life imprisonment. A petition of this kind, in, as a rule, almost universally signed and in due course forwarded to the authorities at Ottawa who in most cases accept it at its face value, which is very little. Unless strong reason can be shown for executive clemency the law is allowed to take its course. And why shouldn't it? If a man is convicted of wilful murder, and the penalty for wilful murder is death, then let it be death. If we are not in sympathy with the law of capital punishment let us do away with it, but so long as it is a law, let us respect it and see that it is carried out, instead of trying to make a farce of it by circulating and signing petitions praying for the commutation of a murderer's death sentence to life imprisonment or by trying to work at the eleventh hour, the played-out gag that he is insane. If there is insufficient evidence to establish his guilt he should be liberated; if there is sufficient evidence to establish his guilt he should receive the punishment the law imposes.

CAN'T BACK IT UP.

The Chatham World says that it would be much to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's credit were he to ask for Sir Frederick Borden's resignation. Why? Will the World be good enough to tell us why? Yes, what has Sir Frederick Borden done or left undone that he should be asked to tender his resignation as a minister of the crown? If the World believes the story about Sir Frederick published recently by a Winnipeg paper and repeated by an English journal and bases its remarks on that story, why doesn't the World publish it, too, and attempt to give its readers some sort of a reason for saying that it would reflect credit upon Sir Wilfrid to ask for Sir Frederick's resignation? The reason why the World doesn't is quite obvious. It fears the result of a libel suit, and its fear is based on a doubt of the truth of the story. Sir Frederick should resign when it is scarcely possible to say why he should resign.
