DALHOUSIE

FRIDAY.

There was considerable excitement last evening over a fire alarm sounded at J. C. Barberie's residence. The people responded promptly to the call, but it resulted in no damage being done. It was just a chimney fire. We are informed that the Dalhousie Lumber Co. is putting in a few camps this winter. This news will be gladly received by merchants and all concerned. Many of the men are leaving daily for the woods. Our water system is now about completed and many of the private residences are getting taps put in. Chas. Morrissey of Newcastle spent Sunday in town. Extensive repairs will be made shortly on the I. C. R. station here. W. G. Mawhinney of Charlottetown has been in town. Many of the farmers are bringing in oats and provisions. Prices range from 45 to 50 cents per bushel. We note the return of H. Ullman to resume his old duties as brakeman on the branch train. The Royal Bank of Canada has lately made considerable improvements to its interior. Miss Muriel McNaughton is the guest of Mrs. G. H. LeBlond. She intends remaining a month. Arthur McGregor of Lewis, P. Q., paid us a flying visit. He was accompanied by his wife who remains at her father-in-law's. He returned by the Maritime this morning. Mrs. Dea of Boston and Miss Stella Troy of Dalhousie left here today, the latter intending to resume her nursing duties at Framingham, Mass. Patrick Troy arrived Sunday from Cape Cove. The sisters made \$230 at their bazaar. Our new chief of police and Scott Act Inspector Lawson appears to be the right man in the right place. It is not only putting the fear of the law into the whiskey dealers, but he is exercising a wholesome and much needed supervision over a number of minor evils which have been prevalent in town and which had been winked at by former incumbents. He appears to be a fearless officer and beyond suspicion of being bribed or otherwise tampered with, and the town council deserves much commendation for the choice it has made. The Rev. Fathers of the Redemptionist order are to hold a mission here next week, and as the subject of temperance is one of the leading features in their proposed program, it is expected that much success along these lines may be achieved. At a meeting of the Chatham Curling Club held Wednesday evening it was decided to make the dues this season \$10, the extra \$2 per member to be set aside as a fund for the purchase of a lot if a suitable location can be had. The Club hopes to have a new rink in the very near future. The DesBrisay property, corner Church and Henderson streets was sold at auction today noon. Bidding commenced at \$1500 and the property was knocked down to Mrs. Frank Hawkes, Chatham station at \$2,115. The scramble of apples announced by V. A. Danville to take place at his store Wednesday evening at 5 o'clock attracted between two and three hundred boys. The boys commenced to gather immediately school was dismissed and at 4:30 there was a regular babel. They blocked the sidewalks, street and store doors all around, shouted, threw each other into the mud and did the boy act generally. At five o'clock Messrs.
