

# TOWN TOPICS

Three new steel spans arrived here Saturday for the I. N. R. One was taken out of the line, Monday, and just as it is placed in position the others will be taken out.

The beavers have built a dam at Smith's Lake about three or four feet from where the town intends to build one. The beaver dam has already raised the water in the lake at least four feet.

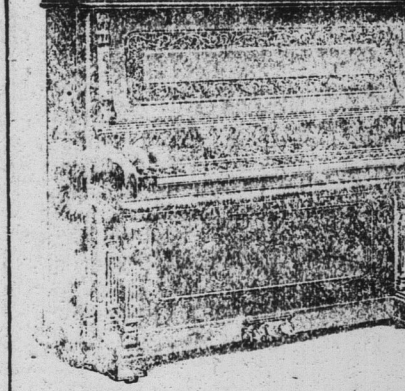
