WHAT OF THE FUTURE?

It has been said that the present may be the last session of Parliament before an appeal is made to the people. If this be the case, then the people would do well to reflect upon the record of the two political parties. Governments cannot proceed in the dark. Everything done is in the light of day and duly incorporated in blue books. For many years Canada maintained an adverse struggle against hard conditions set up by a Conservative government. It was not a government for one year, but for many years.

In 1896 the Conservative had been in power eighteen years. Eighteen miserable trying years to the people of Canada, during which there was every kind of political chicanery known to a corrupt party. Their money had been squandered, their birthright given away, their franchise stolen, their trade ruined, and after all this the people were left with a burden of millions of debt that discounted the future for years yet to come. Will Canada again trust the Conservative party after such bitter experiences? A burnt child dreads the fire, so will the people of Canada think twice before putting in power the party that was responsible for so much adversity and so many iniquities during eighteen dark years. Much rather will reasonable men compare the last eleven years with the eighteen that went before. It hardly seems the same country, that figures don't reflect the truth when comparing them year by year with Conservative times. What would have happened had the Conservatives been allowed to have their way the past ten years? Every enactment for the benefit of the people has been opposed tooth and nail. The Grand Trunk Pacific would never have been built had the Conservative ideas prevailed. The farmers of the West would be trying in vain for transportation facilities had the Conservatives gained their point. The great West would still remain a desolate wilderness had the Conservatives been successful in their opposition to the government policy. The coal lands of the West would be divided among the capitalists and monopolists had the Conservative policy been continued. The timber lands would be going to political favorites for nothing, as heretofore had the Liberals not been in power, and inaugurated a system of public competition. Contracts would be given to the highest instead of the lowest tenderer had not the people placed the Liberals in power, thus protecting their own interests. The treasury would be looted, as of old, grafters would flourish, middle men would be working the big rackets, political heelers would be piling up a corruption fund at the expense of the people had this not all been stopped by the advent into power of a Liberal government. The finger can scarcely be placed upon one spot on the commercial map of Canada and not find progress, substantial, permanent prosperity, and healthy vigorous growth. The government not far to seek. The cause is the Liberal in power, this has been all that could be desired, and the results prove this contention. What have the Conservatives done during the past few sessions to justify any claim they may put forward to be entrusted with the government of the country.

W. G. T. U. ASKS GOVT TO STOP CIGARETTE MFG.

OTTAWA, Tuesday.—A deputation of about thirty ladies of the Dominion W. G. T. U., representing Quebec, Maritime Provinces and Ontario, and the West, today asked the government for legislation prohibiting the manufacture, sale or importation of cigarettes, or at least an act modeled after the Scott Act, and of local application. Mrs. Watters, of Hamilton; Mrs. Wright, of London, and Mrs. Stephens of Toronto were the principal speakers. Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed his personal sympathy with the movement, but said the government had not yet seen its way to enact such drastic legislation. The suggestion, however, for an act like the Scott Act was a new one and would be fully considered.

Will Clear Two Thousand Acres For 220,000. (Special to the Morning Graphic.) VANCOUVER, Tuesday.—Contracts have been awarded by the G. T. Pacific for clearing two thousand acres of lands at Prince Rupert for \$220,000. This is preparatory to the sale of townsite lots.

FREDERICTON, Tuesday.—The local government met in session here this evening, the full executive being present. The only matter considered was the fixing of the bond for the undertaking entered into by the Grand Falls Power Company. Mr. Sanford accompanied by Messrs. Changer and McLaughlin asked that the bond be placed at a reasonable amount. Col. McLean on behalf of the Grand Falls Power Company argued that the amount be placed at \$500,000 in order to protect his clients. Further consideration of the whole matter was adjourned until to-morrow morning, when the town of Grand Falls has asked to be heard in connection with the question. It is understood that the matter of dissolving the house was not referred to.

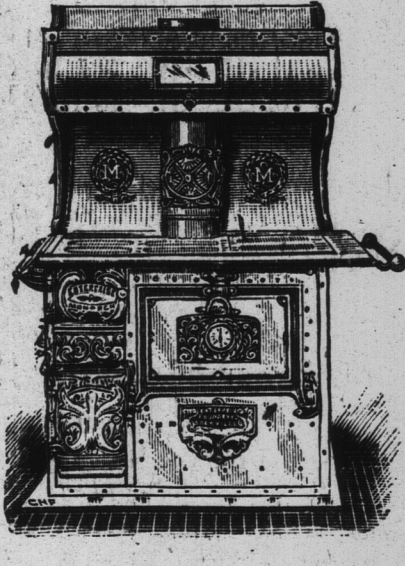
