

ST. JOHN MAN KILLED IN WEST

Chas Kennedy Was Accidentally Killed At Monroe, Washington, August 12th.

NO PARTICULARS

(Special News Service) ST. JOHN, Monday. — Mr. Roger Kennedy of North End, received word of the death of his son Charles, which occurred at Monroe, Washington, on or about August 12th. News came in a letter from a fellow employee of the deceased, which stated that death had been accidental, but did not give any particulars.

INDIAN NATIVE GAVE EVIDENCE

Other Prisoners Against Whom He Testified Procured Revolvers And Shot Him.

WONDERFUL CONSPIRACY

CALCUTTA, Monday. — Gossans, a native, who was arrested with thirty others for complicity in the recent bomb outrage and who turned King's evidence was today killed by two fellow prisoners in a cell at Allpur jail. The evidence given by Gossans revealed a widespread rebellious conspiracy which included plans to assassinate Viceroy Lord Minto, and other high officials. Two revolvers with which the man was killed were smuggled into the prison by relatives of the other prisoners.

TWO KILLED AND OTHERS INJURED

Two Freights in Collision at Kengore, Neb., Sunday. Stockmen in Caboose Suffer.

MEN WERE ASLEEP.

(Special News Service) VALENTINE, Neb., Monday. — Geo. Kennedy and Foster Spear were killed outright, Malcolm H. Hawkins, fatally injured, and F. S. Betover suffered burns and bruises as the result of a rear end collision between two freight trains at Kengore today. All four were stockmen of Wyoming and were riding in the caboose of a stock train which was entering a siding when the fast freight plunged into it. The men were all asleep when the accident occurred.

LABORER INSTANTLY KILLED ON THE INTERNATIONAL RAILWAY

Stanley Arsenault, of Petit Rocher, Killed By Falling Tree at Frog Brook.

NO INQUEST NECESSARY

Stanley Arsenault, single, 24, was instantly killed yesterday by a falling tree at Frog Brook on the International Railway. The unfortunate young man was a chopper and was one of a gang engaged in felling trees when the accident occurred. As a particularly large tree was about to fall, the foreman, Mr. Roy, shouted a warning to his men, but young Arsenault becoming confused ran directly in front of the falling timber. He was struck upon the head and died immediately. Dr. Doherty was called to view the remains but decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The body will be taken tomorrow to Petit Rocher for burial.

TWO MEN ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH ST. EUSTACHE ROBBERY

CONSERVATIVES DECIDE ON CANDIDATE

Prominent Members of Party Met At Dalhousie Last Wednesday Evening And Offer Nomination to Dalhousie Man.

WILL LIKELY ACCEPT.

It has been decided among the leaders of the Conservative party of the County of Restigouche and provincial leaders that Mayor Montgomery of Dalhousie will be the next Conservative candidate. On Wednesday evening a number of leading provincial conservatives, among whom were Hon. J. D. Hazen, O. S. Crocket, M. P., Albert Mott, ex-M. P., P. P. Sheriff Stewart, met at Dalhousie and discussed the matter of placing a Conservative in the field to oppose James Reid, M. P. The whole matter was talked over very fully, and every available man in the Conservative ranks in the county considered. Finally it was decided to offer the nomination to Mayor Montgomery of Dalhousie. A convention will be called later to officially choose the candidate. As matters stand among Restigouche Conservatives Mr. Montgomery is their strongest man, and will doubtless put up a good fight, but will not have a ghost of a chance of winning.

NEWCASTLE PROMINENT CAMPBELLTON CITIZEN PASSED PEACEFULLY AWAY MONDAY

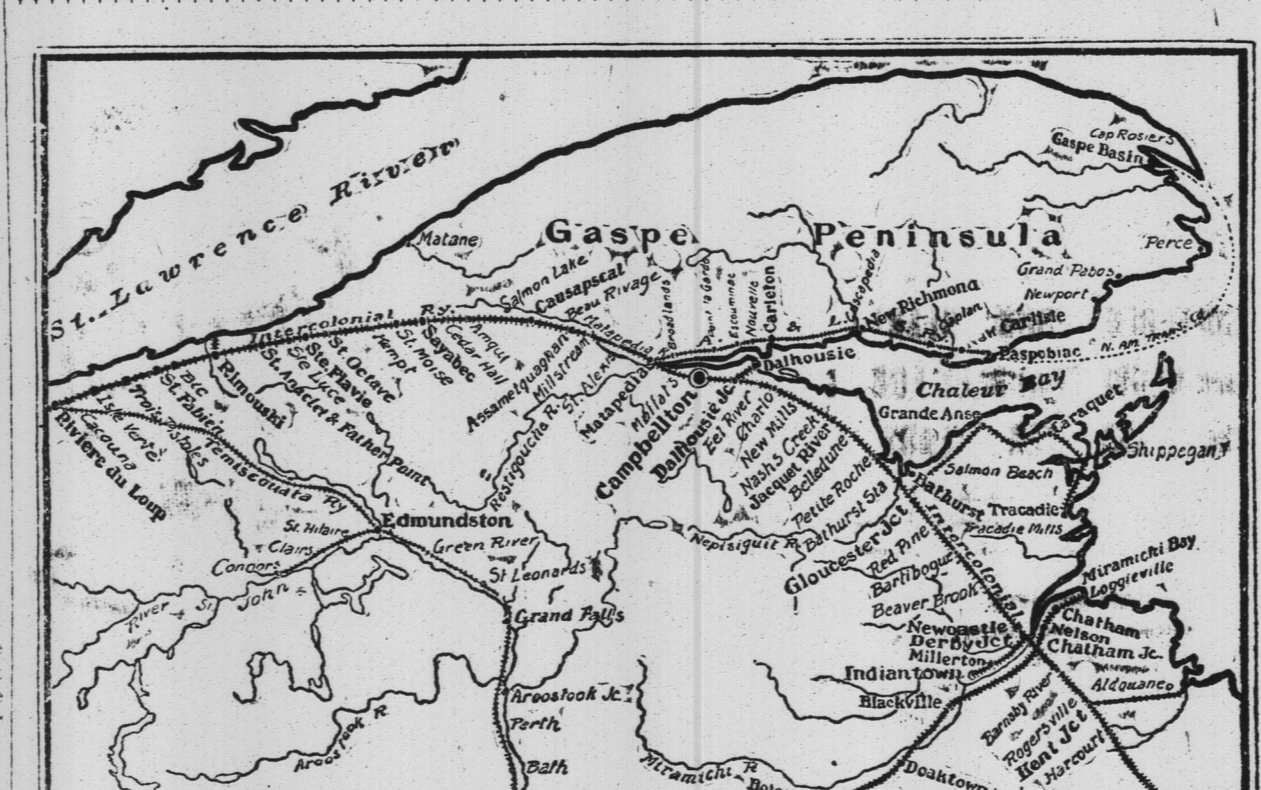

WILLIAM ANDREW DIED AFTER A BRIEF ILLNESS AT HIS HOME HERE, WAS NATIVE OF CAMPBELLTON.

(Special News Service) CAMPBELLTON, Monday. — William Andrew, one of Campbellton's most prominent and highly respected citizens died early yesterday morning after a remarkably short illness. Although he had been ailing for some time, his death came as a severe shock to his wife and family who had believed his illness was but a temporary indisposition. William Andrew was one of the oldest residents of this town being born in Campbellton in 1824. He was the son of Allan Andrew of Kilmarnock, Scotland, who came to this country in the early part of the last century. He received his education in the schools of this town and filled several public offices among them being those of town treasurer, secretary of the school Board and assessors and collector of taxes which latter office he held until his death. He was also very prominent in church circles, being secretary of trustees of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. As a man and a public servant Mr. Andrew was held in high esteem by the business men and officials of the town of Campbellton, who deeply mourn the sudden taking-off of so valuable a citizen. His life was part of the history of the town. Born at a time when Confederation was but the vision of a dreamer he lived to watch a united Canada emerge from the chaos of unblended trails and scattered homesteads into the splendid nation it is today. Besides a devoted wife, Mr. Andrew leaves behind him seven children, two sons and five daughters to mourn the loss of a loving husband and father. The funeral will take place on Wednesday.
