Take notice that there will be sold at Public Auction, in front of the Post Office in the Town of Campbellton, in the said County of Restigouche on TUESDAY, the FIRST day of September, A. D. 1903, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, under and by virtue of a power of sale, contained in a certain Indenture of Mortgage bearing date the fifth day of August, A. D. 1902, made between the said Archibald K. "You must tell me something about this 'Old Woman' he had implied of the boy, after a momentary suspension of his story, he said:

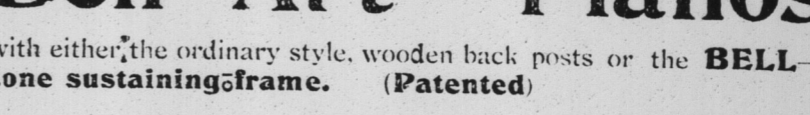
