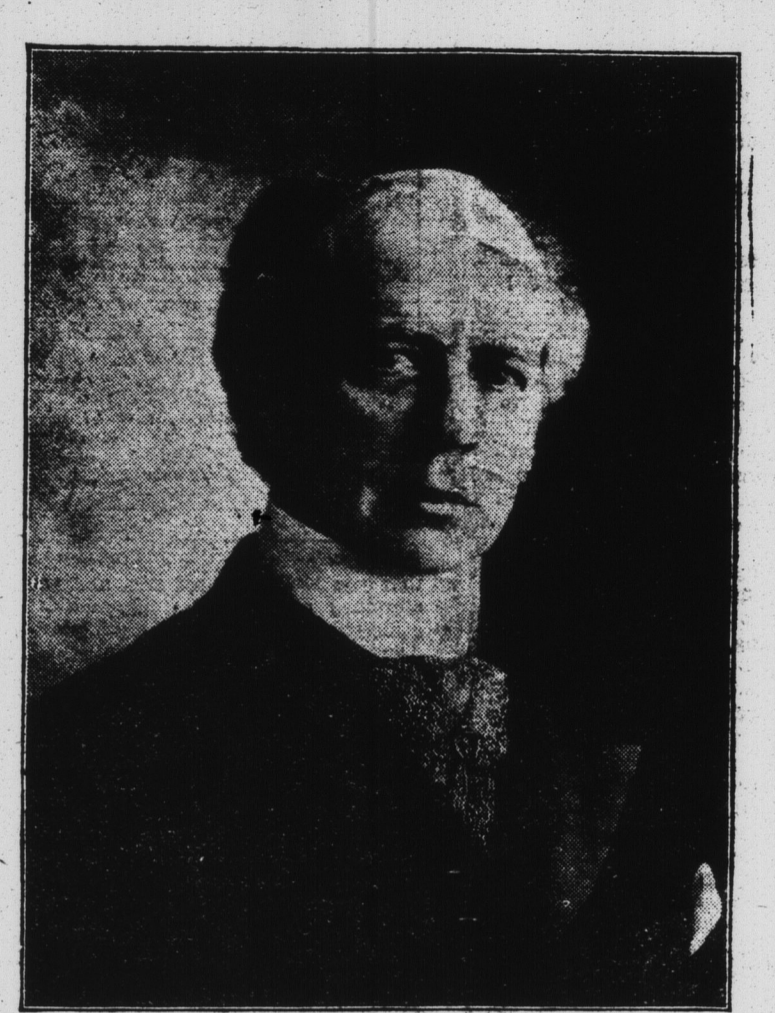

PRINCE OF WALES HAS SET SAIL

A FAST WARSHIP

(Special News Service) LONDON, Wednesday.—The Prince of Wales and suite sailed from Portsmouth on board the Indomitable, Great Britain's newest battleship, for the coming fete at Quebec. The Earl of Dudley and Sir Francis Bannerman are travelling with the Prince. Sir Francis represents the Colonial offices, while Dudley represents Australia. The departure of the Indomitable was without formality beyond the firing of salutes from the old flagship, Victoria. There has been some talk of the Indomitable which is capable of twenty seven knots an hour trying to give the transatlantic liners new record to emulate, but if anything in this direction is attempted it will be on the return journey.
