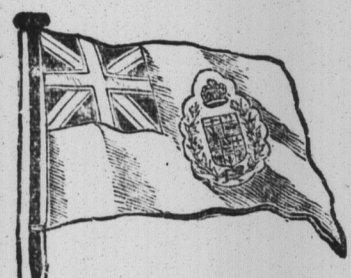

IN THE WORLD'S OPEN MARKET
From the articles in some of the
Conservative papers, especially those
of the high protectionist wing, it may
be supposed that the Laurier Govern-
ment had entirely neglected the de-
velopment of manufacturing in Can-
ada, and that in effect Liberalism on
its economic side was hostile to in-
dustrial development. This census
statistics prove how absurd this sug-
gestion is. There is however an even
better standard of measurement and
that is provided by the books of the
Customs department, which show how
the manufacturers of Canada can care
for themselves against all comers in
the world's open markets. The export
statistics of manufactured products
tell the story. The Conserva-

tives were in power from 1878 till
1896. In 1878 Canada sent into the
world's markets manufactured articles
to the value of \$4,127,000. Eighteen
years later in 1896, the total was a
trifle more than doubled—\$9,365,000.
Then the terrible Grits came in, who
were to close the factories. In ten
years the export of manufactured pro-
ducts had risen to \$24,561,000, and the
variety was much greater than in Con-
servative times. Take iron and steel
and machinery, for example. We sent
\$3,000,000 worth in 1878, including \$500,000
of machinery. In the final year end-
ing June 1906, which is taken because
the date of ending the country's trade
year was changed in 1907, we exported
iron and steel of manufacture to the
value of \$1,293,000. Here are some other items of manufactured
goods exported:—

Table with 2 columns: Item and Value. Items include Cottons, Paper, Boots and shoes, Leather, Agricultural implements, Medical instruments, Hams, Wood pulp, Whiskey, and Pig Lead.

These schedules show that, generally
speaking, the metal and mineral in-
dustries have greatly flourished under
Liberal rule, and that free cotton trade
has also done very well. In such
lines as the manufacture of bacon, of
agricultural implements, of machinery
of paper and of other products in
which Canadian workmen and capital-
ists are specially interested, there has
been enormous expansion. The truth
is that with the sole exception of the
woollen trade all sections of the in-
dustries of Canada have done more
business and made more money under
the moderate Freeing tariff than un-
der the boasted National policy. That
is why the factory workers and factory
owners will vote for Laurier and Tar-
iff Stability.

On Thursday the Canadian Manu-
facturers' Association unanimously ad-
opted a report by the pulp and paper
section recommending that the gov-
ernment should be requested to pro-
tect the forests and conserve the
pulpwood of the country by prohib-
iting the exportation of pulpwood from
Canada. Exported in that form it is
only worth to Canada about a sixth
of what it would be were it manu-
factured into paper in the country and
restrictive legislation would thus di-
rectly benefit an important national
industry. Every consideration makes
for a policy that promotes the utiliza-
tion of our national resources by our
own people and besides the present
importance that Canadian forests be
not unduly depleted for the advantage
of United States manufacturers.

Legislation along this line has a
good precedent in the shape of the
new British patent law. That act was
expressly passed in the interests of
British labor, since it compels all
patented processes and articles to be
operated and produced within the
United Kingdom under penalty of for-
feiture of the grants. There is no
essential difference in point of prin-
ciple between a measure of this na-
ture and legislation encouraging the
establishment of the manufacturing
of Canada's raw material. And re-
strictive legislation is all the more
necessary when the pulpwood of the
United States is rapidly being ex-
hausted, and when as a result in-
creasing drains will be made on Can-
adian forests.

At Appleton, Wisconsin, the other
day before the congressional invest-
igation committee. Mr. R. M. Jones
of Bangor, Me., manager of Katahdin

Pulp and Paper Co. at Lincoln, Me.,
said that unless we get our mat-
erial as cheaply as the Canadian
mills do we would have to quit busi-
ness for we could not compete with
them. Later in his examination he
said that in the middle west, espe-
cially in Wisconsin, Michigan and
Minnesota, where most of the paper
mills are located, the manufacturers
will soon be obliged to procure their
pulpwood from Canada. He favored
the making of a treaty with Canada
whereby the tariff on wood pulp
would be cut off if the United States
mills were allowed to purchase pulp-
wood in Canada at the same price as
Canadian mills do. This agreement
shows what a splendid opportunity
is afforded for the encouragement of
Canadian paper manufacture, and it
also shows the danger to which the
 Dominion's rich pulpwood resources,
both on account of the impost it will
give to Canadian industry and the
necessity of protecting Canadian
forest resources it is advisable that
the recommendation of the Canadian
Manufacturers' Association should be
accepted by the federal government.

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.
The people have in the new scheme
of rural mail delivery of the post-
office an excellent example of the
superiority of public ownership in
its significant phases, namely, that
public ownership ensures absolute
freedom to the state or municipality
to do whatever it likes whenever it
likes with the utility concerned.

Where private ownership of a pub-
lic utility prevails there is no such
freedom. The state or municipali-
ty has signed away its freedom to a
private company.

Let us illustrate:
The Canadian postal system is
owned and controlled by the nation.
Here are some statistics as brought
out by Postmaster-General Lemaire
in his speech at Niagara Falls: He
showed that the surplus last year
was \$1,000,000; that there has been
no deficit since 1903; that as reduc-
tions were made in the postal rates
the service was improved and cheap-
ened, and what is still more signifi-
cant, that the earnings increased
with reduced rates, and changed
former deficits to surpluses.

He showed that the state had been
able to effect the following improve-
ments:
Postal Rates—Before 1896 Since 1896
Canadian letters 3c 2c
U. S. letters 3c 2c
British letters 5c 2c
Drop city letters 2c 1c
Papers from Britain (lb) 8c 5c
All these things the postmaster
general did for his own part, under the
law of parliament, whenever he
thought the time opportune.

And now that he has a surplus as-
sured the postmaster general an-
nounces that he will forthwith take
up the question of rural delivery and
so still further increase the service
that the national postal system gives
the public. He is absolutely free to
do this. He does not need to con-
sult any railway or express company,
he is not tied up by "a solemn agree-
ment," nor is he open to the charge

of "interfering with vested interest"
and "wrecking the edifice and the or-
ganism," whose savings are all in
some private company doing a pos-
sible business. And so he goes on with
the good work of improving the pos-
tal service at every turn, and fol-
lowing the lines of progress set by
other nations. The only place today
where the postmaster general of Can-
ada is antagonized in his freedom
to serve the people is in the case of
parcel post and postal money orders
where the express companies (rail-
ways) are "constantly lobbying a-
gainst cheaper express rates by the
state in its parcel post and agais:
cheaper postal orders as against theirs.

And you can see this in the fact that
though the postmaster general has
power by law now to improve and
cheapen the parcel post (like in
Great Britain and Germany—he can,
only do it in the face of the threats
and hostilities of the Grand Trunk
and the Canadian Pacific. In other
words, if the express business and
the transfer of mail amounts of mon-
ey had been kept a state monopoly
great improvements in these direc-
tions would have been made long ago.
