PUGSLEY WILL CARRY PROVINCE

(Windsor, Free Press.) James Robinson, a former member of the Dominion House, is a guest at the Royal Alexandra Hotel, and leaves with a party of friends for Regina tonight to attend the auction sale of western lands which is to take place there from Oct. 12 to 17.

Mr. Robinson when asked by a reporter in respect to the coming election in New Brunswick, replied that he felt sure that the Hon. Wm. Pugsley would carry the province for the Laurier government, probably with ten Liberals to three Conservatives. When asked how he accounted for Premier Hazen's victory in the provincial election, Mr. Robinson replied that Premier Hazen did not appeal to the people on party lines.

A SHAMEFUL ROORBACK.

If there was anything wanting to make the people of this country distrust the Conservative gentlemen who are now busily trying to woo them, it surely is to be found in the attempt which has been traced to them to wreck public faith in the new Transcontinental Railway.

Of course, it has been well known that the Conservative party has no love for this great enterprise, but it is almost beyond conception that they should go to such lengths in their antagonism and in their desire to capture the administration as has become evident in the last few days.

On Wednesday last a despatch was sent out from New York that the Grand Trunk was about to abandon its bargain with the government, and have no more to do with the Transcontinental project. The despatch, on the face of it, was suspicious.

HEALTH COUNCIL WILL PURCHASE LAND

(From Wednesday's Graphic.) A meeting of the town council was held last evening, the full board in attendance.

The report of Police Magistrate Matheson for six months, ending Sept. 30, was submitted. Fines collected amounted to \$621.00 and costs \$154.00. Coun. McDonald submitted a report recommending the purchase of six acres of land from A. F. Chamberlain, on the Tobique road for an ambulance, for the sum of \$1,000. Coun. McDonald stated that he and the commissioner had looked over several sites and had come to the conclusion that the Chamberlain property was the best property. It was beautifully situated and was close to the new water main.

After some discussion the report was adopted.

A number of accounts were passed. Coun. Andrews from the water and sewerage committee, submitted a report recommending that the claims of H. S. Alexander and Thos. St. Onge, for alleged damages from overflow from sewers, be not entertained.

Coun. Andrew stated that legal advisers had said that Messrs. Alexander and St. Onge had no claim. He also stated that the engineer intended to make use of an old box drain in that locality, to relieve the pressure this fall and have a new outlet put in in the spring.

The report was adopted.

The council, after some discussion, decided to offer Mr. E. L. Duncan two cents per square foot for several sites through his land to the reservoir, containing 750,000 square feet.

Council adjourned.

On all sides are heard expressions of the good work done by Mr. Hays for the county; of the broken promises of the Hazen government and of the certainty of victory for the Liberals.

PASSES AS A MAN

Miss Mary Johnson was too Unprosperous to get along as a Woman

NEW YORK, Tuesday.—The Ellis Island immigration authorities, who had detained Miss Mary Johnson, a Canadian woman, when she arrived here on the American liner New York under the assumed name of "Frank Wood Hall," and wearing men's clothing, today decided to allow her to proceed to her destination, New Orleans still garbed in masculine attire.

Miss Johnson, fifty years old, and of masculine appearance, had declared to the authorities that, having been born unprosperous as a woman, she had found herself practically shut out from earning a living and that only as a man had she been able during the past sixteen years to earn a regular income as a book agent and maintain her respectability.

THE HARMSWORTH'S.

Purchase 150 Sections of Timber Limit on Vancouver Island.

VICTORIA, B. C., Monday.—The Harmsworths, of London, publishers of the Daily Mail and other newspapers, are buying 150 sections of timber limit on Vancouver Island. 35 sections have already been bought in the Quilich district, and options on 25 more are being "crushed" which will be bought if satisfactory.

This is their first investment in British Columbia, though they have large holdings of pulp wood lands in New Brunswick and New Brunswick, and contemplate entering into active competition with the paper trust.

Mr. Leigh Hunt, a former financier of Seattle, is also acquiring 14 sections of timber on Vancouver Island.

ANGERED AT NEWS ITEM MARSHALL SHOT EDITOR.

SABETHA, Kan., Thursday.—Angered because of a news item printed in the Merrill News item, Pray Royer, marshal of Merrill, Kansas, shot and killed W. H. Schmeucker, editor of the News, and committed suicide. The shooting occurred on Main street.

MONTREAL, Que., Thursday.—By docking this morning at Quebec at 4 o'clock, this afternoon, the steamer Empress of Ireland, has captured the westbound record from the Empress of Britain, beating the latter's time by three hours.

NEW YORK, Thursday.—In the greatest and most exciting ball game played in America for many years, Chicago today defeated New York four to two, thereby winning the much coveted National League pennant.
