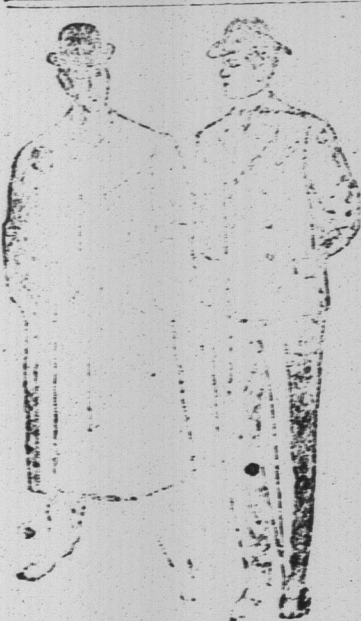

## HAZEN STANDARD BEARERS ELECTED IN THE MAJORITY OF NEW BRUNSWICK CONSTITUENCIES YESTERDAY

Large Number of Liberals Supported Opposition—Four Ministers Met Defeat

### THERE WERE MANY SURPRISES

ST. JOHN, N. B., Tuesday. — The Robinson government was snuffed under today. The liberal majority of 25 seats in the legislature being turned into a majority for the conservatives of 19 with 7 independents who will undoubtedly support the new administration.

**Great Blow to Dr. Pugsley.**  
The result is a great blow to the Minister of Public Works who has been in the province for the last week speaking several times. Hundreds of old time liberals voted with the opposition claiming that they are still liberals for far as Federal issues are concerned, but that they are disgusted with the local government policy in re maintenance of highways and school books. The rapid increase in the provincial debt also laid against the government.

**Feeling of Discontent.**  
Notwithstanding Premier Robinson's declaration that he would repeal the highway act so unpopular among the farmers of the country and would have school books supplied free to the lower grades, the feeling of discontent was so strong that all efforts to overcome it and influence the "silent" vote proved fruitless. The secret ballot had much to do with Hazen's victory and from the first, gave the government leaders considerable worry.

**Greater Than Expected.**  
Although Hazen stated last night that he would carry the province by a majority of 25 it is doubtful if his most sanguine supporters expected any such landslide as occurred today. Premier Robinson and his ticket were elected in Westmorland County and Attorney-General McKeown succeeded in being returned in St. John County, but four members of the cabinet went down to defeat.

**The Defeated Four.**  
These are L. P. Farris, commissioner of Agriculture, Queens; E. H. Allen, provincial secretary, York; W. E. Jones, solicitor-general, Carleton; and D. J. Pardy, member without portfolio, St. John. Speaker Osman and his colleague were hopelessly beaten in Albert County which was probably the greatest surprise of the campaign.

**Sears' Defeat a Surprise.**  
Another surprise was the defeat of Mayor Sears in St. John City. He was considered by the government to be probably the strongest candidate in the field. The ship laborers told against him, however.

Hon. L. P. Farris has been the government representative in Queens county for thirty years and his defeat today came as a great surprise by 1500 majority.

**Result in Kings.**  
In Kings County, Dr. Pugsley's old constituency, the government made every effort to win. It is said that thousands of dollars were spent there but with one exception their ticket was a weak one.

The Sun will say that the disaster which overtook the province cannot materially affect the future of the province. The forests and the rich soil are still here, and while the progress may not be so swift under Mr. Hazen, the continuation of the government's policies as respecting and agriculture are expected as Mr. Hazen has in his platform offered no substitute.

## MESSRS. LABILLOIS AND CURRIE ARE RETURNED FOR RESTIGOUCHE CO. BY HANDSOME MAJORITIES

Government Supporters in This County Led in Almost Every Parish Yesterday

### GOOD VOTE WAS POLLED

(From Wednesday's Graphic)  
The election in this county passed off very quietly. In town there was a little excitement during the closing hours of the fight, but very little drunkenness was noticeable. The first returns were those of Campbellton, of course, and the figures were about as expected by the liberals here. Considering that the weather was rather disagreeable and that a new polling district had been formed, taking off a number of votes from the town, a fairly large vote was polled. The first returns from the county came from Flatlands, here being the government ticket's majority. Flatlands moral still further increased the majority, and when Dalhousie and Durham returns came in it was quite evident that Messrs. Labilloy and Currie were elected.

Perhaps the most surprising feature of the contest was the vote of Durham, where it was expected that the opposition candidates would roll up a big majority.

In the evening the joint committee engaged the Opera House where it was proposed to receive the returns and it was a merry and jolly crowd that assembled there.

The liberals were rejoicing over their victory in Restigouche and the conservatives were rejoicing over the news of the defeat of the government which by this time was being circulated on the streets.

The returns as they came in were flashed upon the canvass by means of a magic lantern and each side cheered their respective parties as each bulletin was shown.

After it became clear that the government was defeated there were calls for Currie and Mott, and both these gentlemen appeared upon the platform.

Mr. Currie briefly addressed the audience, thanking the electors for the handsome vote he and his colleague, Mr. Labilloy, had received. He, of course, regretted the defeat of the government as he believed they were trying to secure the interests of the people, but he would have to bow to the will of the people and take his seat in the cold shades of the opposition. He had wished to fight another contest on account of some of the canvasses used against him in his first campaign, and he felt satisfied with the victory achieved today. He would still endeavor to serve the interests of all classes, whether they had given him their support or not. He had received a message from Mr. Labilloy asking him to express thanks on his behalf for the way the people of Campbellton had stood by the ticket. Mr. Currie was loudly cheered as he took his seat.

Mr. Mott then came forward and addressed the gathering. He expressed regret that Messrs. Stewart and Culligan were not present, owing to their being in a distant part of the county during the day, and thanked the electors for their support on their behalf. Although defeated in the local contest there was considerable satisfaction in the returns from the province at large. He felt that Mr. Hazen had no superior in the public life of the province today, and that he had men around him upon whom to call in the selection of his cabinet that would make a strong government. The credit of the people had been given and it but reinforced the truth that the people were the real rulers.

Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie was called for and made a brief address. He thought that the people of Restigouche had learned how to take defeat. Although the campaign had been fought hard on both sides, he could say that he had no hard feelings against anyone and as far as he knew he would have any ill-feeling against him.

Each speaker was loudly applauded and the best of good feeling prevailed throughout the evening.

The same business was at work in Kings where the whole government ticket was defeated. The result in York perhaps more than that in any other constituency was due to the campaign of slander and misrepresentation waged by the opposition. Here no canvass could be far enough from the truth to suit the opposition speakers and newspapers. The government candidates in Northumberland put up a good fight in the face of all sorts of difficulties—difficulties which we venture to say will not be so much in evidence four years hence. It is somewhat consolatory to us in the election of Messrs. Labilloy and Currie was never in doubt, but it is gratifying to learn that they made the excellent showing they did in one or two parishes where the opposition candidates claimed they would make a clean sweep in. It is greatly to be regretted, however, that Mr. Labilloy is compelled to relinquish the portfolio of public works. He has given twenty-five years of his life to the service of the people of this province. No man has ever occupied a public position in this province who was more energetic,
