FEDERAL ELECTIONS NOW BOOKED FOR LAST OF OCTOBER

Ottawa Despatches Say They Will Be Held This Fall Although the Exact Date Has Not Yet Been Set.

(Special News Service) **OTTAWA, Wednesday**—There is every possible likelihood that the general elections will be held on Wednesday, the twenty eighth day of October, if the poll is not taken up on that day. It is almost certain to be taken on Thursday, the twenty ninth or Tuesday the third day of November. If preparations can be made for the twenty eighth, that date will be selected, if it is found impossible to hold the election by the third of November there is every likelihood that the taking of the poll will be deferred until the end of that month.

DATE OF ELECTIONS NOT YET SET BY GOVERNMENT AT OTTAWA

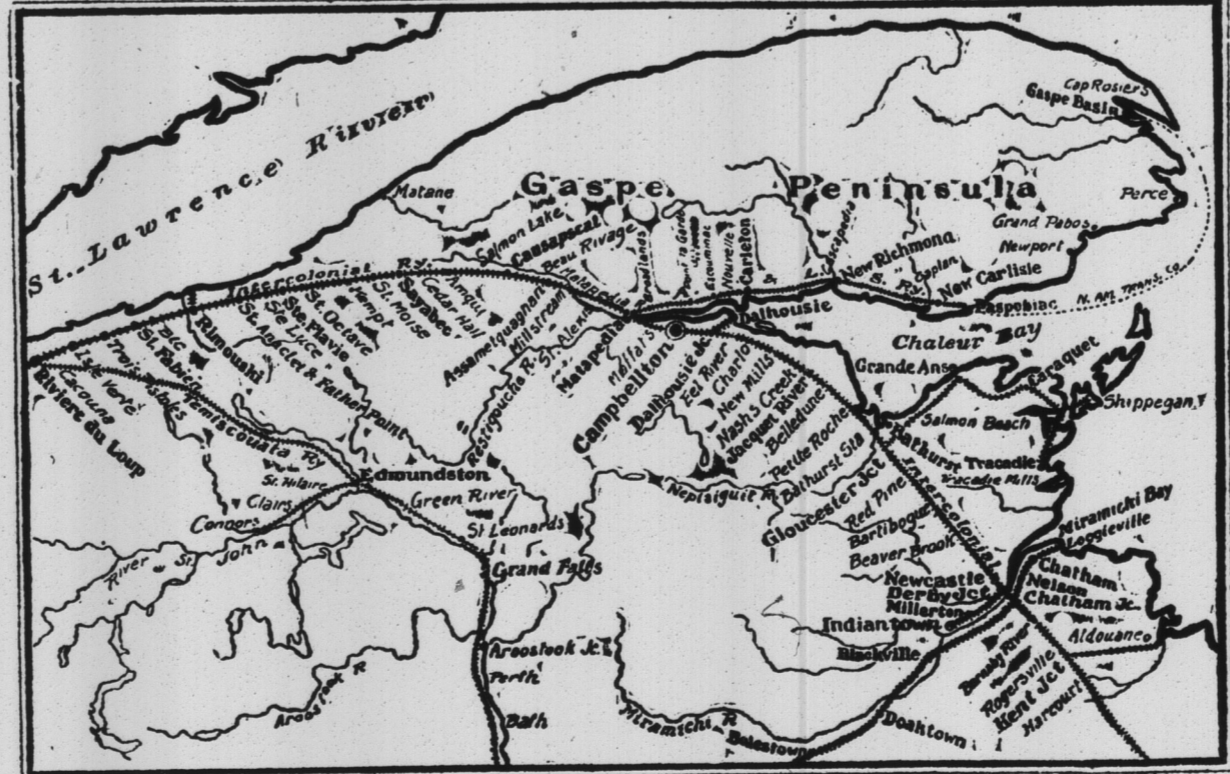
