Twenty Thousand Farm Laborers Needed For Harvest and Some for R. R. Work.

MANY MEN ARRIVING

WINNIPEG, Wednesday—Provincial Immigration Agent Burke announces that at least twenty thousand men are required alone for harvest. He adds there is no excuse for men being idle. "If you are not fit to go for the willing hands and we are offering good wages," he says, "we can send 10,000 men for railroad work right away. The town of Virden is looking for two thousand men to supply the requirements of that direction. Men are going forward at the rate of 200 per day already."

CUSTOMS OF CANADA AFTER CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY

***Have Entered Action To Recover
Duty on Material Im-
ported.***

AMOUNT EMBEZZLED

OTTAWA, Wednesday—The department of customs has taken action against the C. P. R. company for \$222,000. The action is taken in Montreal on the basis of a writ issued by Justice David Hodge, the Customs agent of the C. P. R. who is now serving a term in the penitentiary. Hobbs took funds with which he is supposed to have bribed the customs agent on the railroad, the dispute is over the amount the government failed to receive. Of 17 amounts that he received there is less than fifty thousand dollars made up of claims for Customs duties. The remainder of the \$222,000 is the penalties. STOLE WATCH AND MONEY

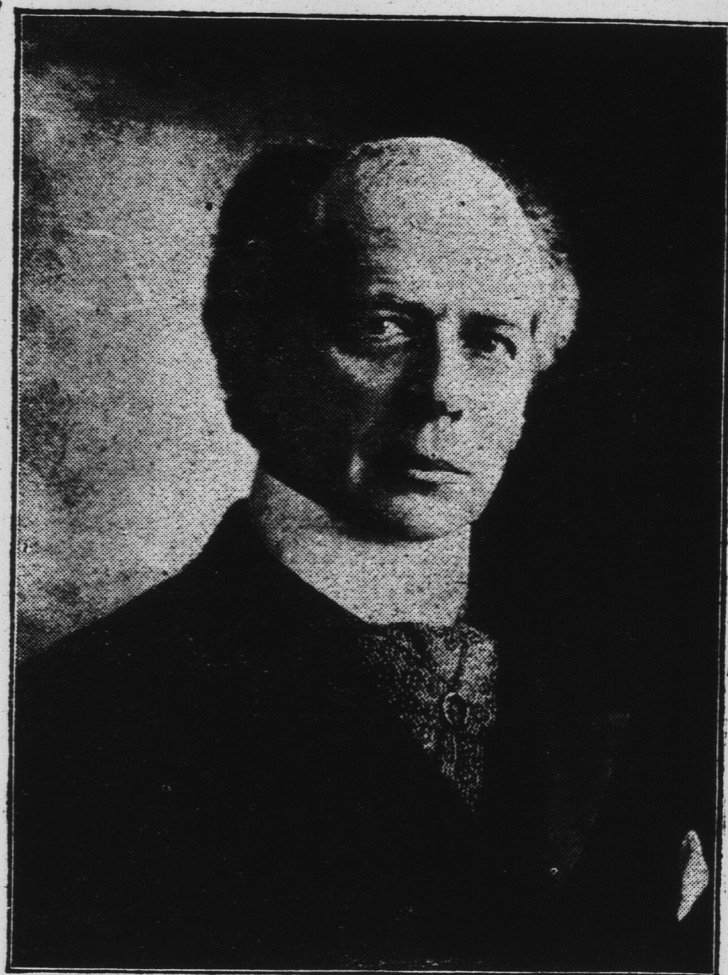

The review this morning was a great success. The troops looked well and I was much impressed with the precision order and organization and discipline. There were about 12,000 men under arms and there was no hitch anywhere. Canada appears to me to be dealing adequately with the problems affecting her Militia and with care and improved organization to be building up a very useful force.'

STRANDED LINER HAS BEEN FLOATED ONCE MORE

*Was Pulled off the Rocks Yesterday
Morning---Badly Damaged and
Making Water.*

NO LOSS OF LIFE

QUÉBEC, Wednesday—The Dominion Line Steamer Southwind, which stranded three miles southwest of Point Amour, near Port-Bay, in the straits of Belle Isle, at midnight on Monday, was successfully floated this morning at nine o'clock. The extent of her damage has not yet been ascertained but she is making good headway. She has not received serious damage to her bottom.

The ship is being examined and if the extent of her damage is not too great she will undertake the return voyage to Quebec tonight. Not a single loss of life or even accident of any kind has been reported and beyond the injuries will undergo the return voyage no distress of any kind. The passengers were safely transferred to the Ottawa of the same line and passage was made for them on the first available Donaldson.

BOARD OF TRADE NOW MAKING A MOVE IN THE TOWN'S WELFARE

Strong Resolution Passed at Meeting of the Council Yesterday Afternoon in Reference to Railway Improvements.

MR. REID, M. P. PRESENT

The Council of the Board of Trade met in the Secretary's office yesterday afternoon. Nearly all the members of the Council were present as well as Mr. James Reid, M. P., who kindly came at the request of the Board to talk over matters with I. C. R. improvements.

George G. McKenzie in opening expressed the appreciation of the Board for Mr. Reid's interest and attendance at the meeting.

After considerable discussion from Mr. McKenzie the Board was unanimously of opinion that there was great need for improvement in the I. C. R. facilities, the following results:

Whereas the business of the Town of Campbellton is rapidly increasing year by year and said town has won a place amongst the most progressive in the Maritime Provinces of the Intercolonial Railway;

And whereas the said town now ranks as the third largest contributor to the revenue of the Province of the said Intercolonial Railway;

And whereas the town is destined to become an important railway centre in the near future, being one of the terminal points of the Intercolonial Railway which is soon to be completed to St. Leonards and the St. John river affording direct communication with the Province of New Brunswick and also in all likelihood to become the terminus of a line of railway running to Gaspe in the Province of Quebec, to be connected therewith by a railway and highway bridge to be built across the Restigouche at Campbellton, which a subsidy of \$160,000 has already been granted;

And whereas, nearly ten months has elapsed since the freight shed was destroyed by fire, and the lack of means to have mounted a loss of money to the detriment of our business firms is not being able to procure prompt delivery of goods, parcels and other articles of perishable nature, as well as great inconvenience and annoyance in the handling of freight;

Be it therefore resolved that in the opinion of this Council of the Board of Trade the following be the basis of the whole matter of the I. C. R. improvements in the way of shipping facilities: Freight shed, station, shops, shingles and also the proper offices for which tenders have been called, should be got into carefully before any large expenditure is made, with the view of laying out the general plan of reconstruction of the buildings of each building, as will best serve future needs and prospects, bearing in mind the convenience and satisfaction of the community and therefore the said general plan of reconstruction by the railway department be submitted to this Board of Trade for approval.

And further resolved that this Council of the Board of Trade is of opinion that the placing of additional tracks across Victoria street at the east end of the railway yard is a matter of importance, and that the traffic on said street, and this Council is of opinion that the matter of laying said tracks be reconsidered, with the view that they be placed in some other location at the west end of the yard, so that they would not be so great and heavy interests would not suffer any loss;

And still further resolved that a committee be appointed to be presided over by Mr. James Reid, M. P., to be present to that he will bring on claims to the attention of the railway department in such a way as will meet with approval.

Mr. Reid said that he had been to Moncton and had been promised by Mr. Burpee that it would be of advantage to the town if he could be concerned at once in the matter, and he intended to attend at once. Then some more needed improvements. He felt that the importance of the said shops and tenders was of the greatest importance. And as his time had been largely taken up with necessary railway improvements, those other I. C. R. matters should have received his attention. They should be given attention they to assist the Board in all ways possible in carrying out the wishes of the community.

Some of the matters in connection with the I. C. R. shops and station were brought to Mr. Reid's attention.

In closing Mr. Reid was thanked for his interest and assistance and courtesy at the meeting.

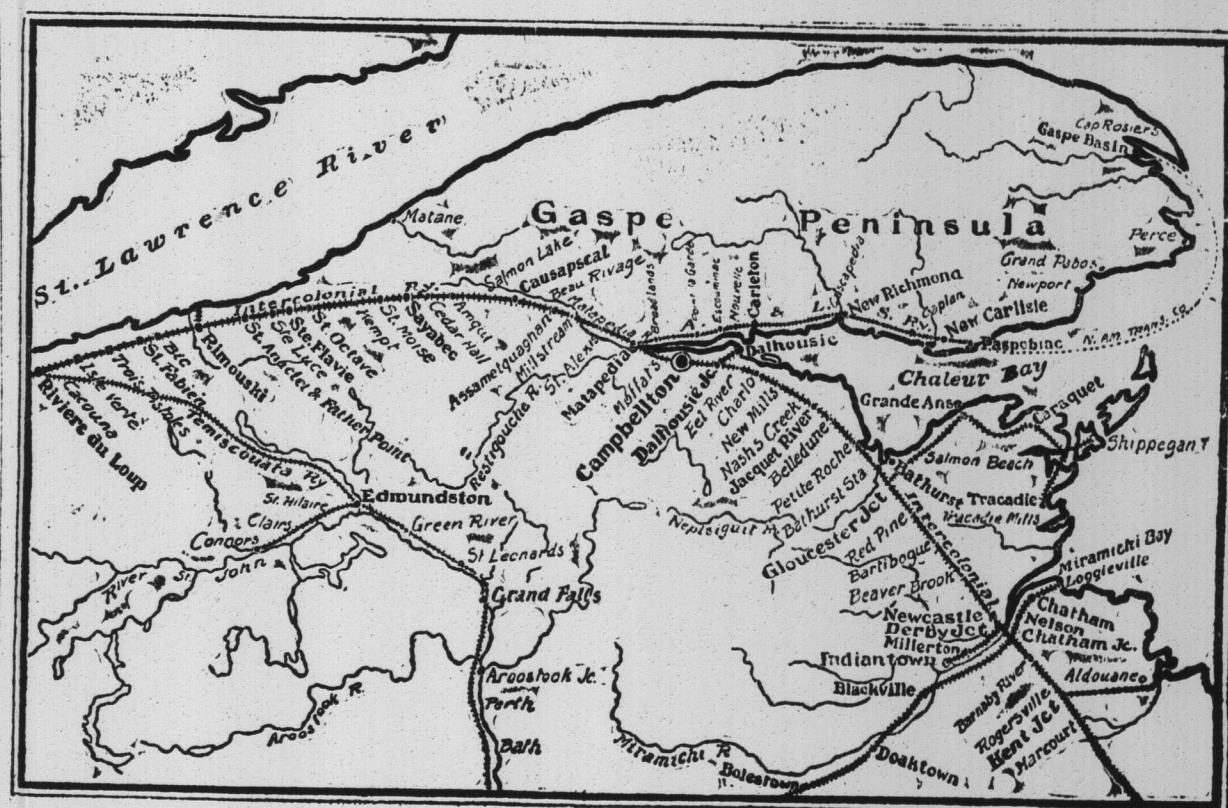
