**NOTICE**

**PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.**  
Municipality of New Richmond.

At a general session of the Municipal Council of the Municipality of New Richmond, aforesaid, held in Campbell's hall on Monday, the second day of March, nineteen hundred and eight, in conformity with the provisions of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec, at which were present John Fallow, Esq., Mayor, and Messrs. John P. Gauthier, Wm. C. Campbell, Thomas Fairbrother, Alphonse Bossinault, Napoleon Cyr, and Edmond Gilles, Councillors, forming a quorum under the presidency of the mayor.

It was resolved by By-Law No. 111, upon the motion of John P. Gauthier, seconded by Napoleon Cyr, that this corporation be and in virtue of the powers on it, conferred by Article 561 of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec, do prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in any quantity whatsoever, and the granting of licenses therefor, within the limits of this Municipality and on the territories which are dependencies of this Municipality, saving always the provisions of Article 56 of the Quebec Liquor Law.

That this By-Law will have force and effect only in its having been approved by the electors being proprietors of practical real estate within the limits of this Municipality as the whole is by law provided.

That the present By-Law will come into force and effect from the first day of the month of May following its promulgation provided always that before such period an authentic copy thereof has been sent to the Collector of Provincial Revenue for the County of Bonaventure.
