DOMAVENTURE COUNTY COUNCIL.

A general meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure, was held at the Town Hall, New Carlisle, on Wednesday, March 11.

There were present: Messrs. John Clement, Mayor of Pass-Biac, A. Beaulieu, Mayor of Dereche, Mayor of Pass-Biac, H. Gauthier, Mayor of Bonaventure, A. Dugas, Mayor of St. Jean, J. Doherty, Mayor of Escomin, John S. Mill, Mayor of St. Jean, John P. L. L. Mayor of New Richmond, E. LeGallais, Mayor of Hopewell, Thomas Busted, Mayor of Mann, R. O. Styles, Mayor of Matapedia, F. J. Chapados, Mayor of Pass-Biac, and Pro-Vardos of the County of Bonaventure, J. Richard, Mayor of St. Alexis, James Hall, Mayor of New Carlisle, Napoleon Garant, Mayor of Caplan, L. Roy, Mayor of Nouvelle, forming a quorum under the Provisions of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec.

Messrs. L. J. Riopel, T. A. Blanchet, and Edward Mill, advocates of the County, and Messrs. J. Kelly, A. O. Wilson, H. Bedard and many others attended the meeting. The Secretary Treasurer, L. P. LeBel upon Mr. John Clement, Mayor of Pass-Biac, and Pro-Vardos of the County of Bonaventure, acting as chairman of the meeting, in view of the absence of Mr. Robert Noble, Mayor of Restigouche, and Warden of the County, the entry of the same should be in the last meeting of the County Council.

The minutes were duly adopted as read by the secretary treasurer, and the Mayor of Pass-Biac, A. Beaulieu, seconded by Mayor Fallow, the first item of business disposed of by the Council was the nomination of the Warden of the County, as provided in the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec.

Mayor Fallow therefore proposed, seconded by Mayor Garant, that Mr. Thomas Busted, Mayor of Mann, be nominated Warden of the County for the current year.

Proposed in amendment by Mayor McPherson, seconded by Mayor Dereche, that Mayor Chapados be nominated Warden of the County for the current year.

For the amendment: Mayors Roy, Dereche, Gauthier, Dugas, Roy, Hall, LeGallais, McPherson, Richard. Against the amendment: Mayors Garant, Fallow, Mill, Doherty, Styles. The amendment being carried, the motion was declared lost. Mayor Chapados in a separate book as Warden for the County for the current year, making a few appropriate remarks upon the honour conferred him.

Mr. Mayor Chapados duly took the oath of office as the Warden of the County, being sworn in by Mayor Styles. Mayor Basted thereupon drew the attention of the Council to the fact that the entry of the same should be in the Minute Book of the Council both under the provisions of the Municipal Code as well as under a past resolution of the Council, apart from an entry in a separate book for the purpose of such oaths. After discussion the secretary treasurer was instructed to enter the Warden's oath of office in the Minute Book of the Council and that the Warden-elect should sign the same.

A vote of thanks, unanimously adopted by the Council, upon the motion of Mayor LeGallais, seconded by Mayor Styles, for the past services rendered as such.

A report of the local council of St. Alphonse, of Caplan, to the Council of the County of Bonaventure, with the object of declaring what is known as the Dion and Dubé Road, connecting the said Municipality with that of St. Charles of Caplan, as a local road at the charges of the parties interested, instead of a county road, at the charges of the Municipality of St. Alphonse, as heretofore decided by this Council by resolution of 1914. Mr. J. Riopel advocate, acting for the Municipality of St. Charles, and Mr. Blanchet for the Municipality of St. Alphonse. After a long and legal discussion of the whole, and after adjournment for the dinner hour, it was finally resolved upon the motion of Mayor LeGallais, seconded by Mayor Basted that the resolution of this Council, passed in 1914, declaring the Dion and Dubé Road a county road, and under the conditions therein mentioned, be adopted and confirmed. Moved in amendment by Mayor Roy, seconded by Mayor Dereche, that the resolution of 1914 in question, be annulled, and that the said Road be declared a Local Road, at the equal charges of the Municipalities interested.

For the amendment, Mayors Roy, Dereche, Dugas, Beaulieu, McPherson. Against the amendment: Mayors Clement, Mill, Gauthier, Styles, Doherty, Garant, Busted, LeGallais, Richard, Fallow.

The amendment being lost, the main motion was declared carried. The questions relative to the Insane Tax were then fully entered into by the Council, and finally decided by it that all receipts of the Council should be deposited in La Banque Nationale at New Carlisle, and paid out according to the resolutions of the Council.
