## COUNCIL FAVORS EXEMPTING NEW WOOD FACTORY

The city fathers held a lengthy ses-  
sion last evening, the full board be-  
ing in attendance.

The application of J. B. Christopher  
for a one inch water service pipe to  
his residence was referred to the Water  
and Sewerage committee.

A communication was read from J.  
& D. A. Harquail asking for exemp-  
tion from taxation for a period of  
fifteen years, a bonus of \$5,000, and  
water for steam boiler and fire protec-  
tion at a nominal figure, in the event  
of their rebuilding their factory. The  
matter was referred to the Finance  
committee to report forthwith.

The School Board requested an as-  
sessment of \$5,000 for school purposes.  
W. J. Christie applied for license to  
conduct plumbing business, and Thos.  
Ellsworth for trucking license for two  
horses.

A number of accounts were passed.  
Conn. Miller brought up the mat-  
ter of J. & D. A. Harquail's applica-  
tion for exemption from taxation, and  
Conn. McLean thought that  
Messrs. Harquail should receive some  
encouragement from the town. He  
was in favor of granting exemption  
from taxation for fifteen years, and  
water at say \$10.00 a year.  
Conn. McLean was in favor of  
granting \$1,000 bonus as well as the  
other concessions.

Conn. Richards thought the exemp-  
tion from taxation and water at a  
nominal sum should be granted only  
on condition that Messrs. Harquail re-

build on the site at the lower end of  
the town.

Conn. Andrew endorsed Conn. Rich-  
ards' views on the matter.

After some further discussion the  
matter was left in the hands of the  
Finance committee to confer with  
Messrs. Harquail in regard to the site  
of the proposed building.  
Conn. Miller from the Finance com-  
mittee reported recommending that of-  
fices be at once fitted up for the Town  
Clerk and Treasurer, and that in addi-  
tion to the duties now required of the  
Town Clerk he be on duty and have  
specified office hours as may be de-  
termined upon, that he have charge  
of purchasing of all supplies under  
direction of the several departments,  
that he act as secretary to the mayor  
and all committees of council, that he  
be paid \$50.00 per month salary and a  
commission of 10 per cent. on all li-  
censes issued by him, his next duties  
to commence the 15th of June.  
Motion was carried unanimously.  
It was decided to issue \$60,000  
worth of Water and Light debentures  
in denominations of \$1,000, to run 20  
years, bearing interest at five per cent.  
to pay for the new water main. Ten-  
dents will be called for said debentures  
at once.

A. E. McKenzie was appointed  
a member of the Board of School  
Trustees in place of John McAlister  
whose term of office had expired.  
On motion it was decided to ask  
the Lieutenant-Governor in Council to

appoint Robert Crawford, Town Mar-  
shal, Liquor License Inspector for the  
town.

Mayor Murray announced that As-  
sessor for Ward Two and Three had  
failed to qualify within the ten days  
consequently offices were vacant.

Archibald Henderson was appointed  
Assessor from Ward Three.  
The Street Committee were author-  
ized to have sidewalk in front of John  
Cameron's residence raised to his satis-  
faction at once.  
Council adjourned.
