The regular annual meeting of the Town Council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray and Councillors—Messrs. McEwen, Maclean, Andrew, McDonald and Richards being present.

The first matter of business taken up was the appointment of town officers, which resulted as follows:—Deputy Mayor—Coun. Maclean. Ex officio County Councillor—Coun. Mowat.

Town Clerk—J. T. Reid. Treasurer—S. H. Langley. Solicitor—Trueman & McKenzie. Auditor—Walter J. Miller.

Assistant Auditor—John T. Nelson. Auditors School Accounts—R. M. Hope and R. S. Chandler.

Assessors—Angus McKenzie, M. G. Mann and Chas. A. Goss. Revisors—Arch. Ferguson and Edw. Alexander.

Board of Health—George Vermette, David Ferguson, John White and A. M. G. McDonald.

Poor Commissioner—Angus McKenzie. Chief of Fire Brigade—J. D. Morrison. Engineer of Fire Engine—W. J. Appleton.

Fireman of Fire Engine—Jas. Sargent. Manager Electric Light System—H. G. V. Farrer.

Firemen—E. L. System—Chas. B. Scott and James Cantwell. Policemen—Harry Jones and Sanford Fleming.

In addition to these were the usual list of constables, poundkeepers and cattle reeves, weighers of hay and grain, measures of fuel, surveyors of lumber, nearly all the old officials being reappointed.

The appointment of street commissioner, building inspector, inspector of plumbing, caretaker of town houses, engineer of water and sewerage departments and town marshalls were laid over until next meeting.

A communication was read from W. A. Mott, Norwegian Vice Consul in re investigation against late Chief of Police Gray.

Coun. McLennan thought that if Norway had a grievance against our late chief of police the courts were open to him, while as regards the evidence it was on file in the clerk's office.

Coun. McDonald said the committee had done perfectly right in conducting the enquiry behind closed doors and the council could not prevent any official from resigning. Mr. Mott still had the privilege of taking any action he might consider necessary in the courts and thought there was too much fuss made over the matter.

The letter was however referred to the town solicitor. Shives Lumber Co. made request for an acre of land at foot of Ritchie street. Referred to Electric Light Committee.

L. T. Joudry, R. S. Chandler and C. A. LeBlanc made application for auctioneer's license.

W. Dow, George and Adam LeBlanc applied for trucking license. J. D. Morrison for pool table license and Percy G. Chaytor for livery.

Policeman Harry Jones was granted \$500 monthly increase of salary dating from May 1st.

Coun. McLennan from the Police and License Committee reported recommending that the prayer of petition in re appointment of C. B. Gray as town marshalls be not entertained.

On motion the matter was laid over until next meeting. In speaking on the question Coun. Maclean said that the petition was signed by a large number of the leading business men of the town and thought there should be some notice taken of it. He felt that Mr. Gray made a good officer but like most men had made a mistake and that he probably had learned a lesson. He was in favor of his appointment.

Coun. McDonald wished more information in regard to the investigation and moved the matter be laid over, which was seconded and carried.

On motion Donald T. Black of Montreal was appointed municipal engineer for the town at a salary of \$1000.00 a year, payable monthly.

The commissioner of the poor was voted a salary of \$500 per month, after some appreciative words about the way the duties had been performed by that official last year.

The chief of the fire brigade was voted \$250 per year. The clerk was directed to call for tenders for the supply of 16,200 feet of 16-inch cast iron pipe, 10,000 lb. of Campbellton, tested to 200 lb. pressure said tenders to be received up to May 21st, 1908.

LETTERS TO EDITOR

To the Editor of the Morning Graphic: As I understand there is to be another expenditure of public money to recall the past.

It will be remembered by Mr. La-Billio and others that I took strong objection to it, first, because it would not stand second, because it was an unnecessary expenditure and foolish waste of public money. It was only a few years until the crib work was completely demolished. Then a man was sent here from Albert County to superintend the job, and a much more expensive class of work was done on it—every one far and near was hauling stone, and Mr. So-and-so was going to do a job that would defy all the powers of nature. I happened to meet this gentleman in Mr. Jas. Reid's store in Charlottetown one evening.

This matter came up again, and I took the same ground as at first. Not necessary, nor would it stand the action of the sea. Both Mr. Reid and this gentleman took issue against me, both as regards the necessity and durability of the work. I finally said I was willing to bide my time as I considered I would not have long to wait. Most of that costly work is now destroyed. It must be understood that I am now speaking of the bar, not any portion of land east or south of it. In case of wear and tear of land east of the bar, I would be a question of cribbing or shifting the road back. In my opinion it would be better to buy the land and move the road back.

I wish now to deal with the bar proper, its nature and formation, also with all other formations similar in character. First, I would say that I believe the bar is only in its infancy. I can remember when it was not more than two-thirds the size it is today. It is the natural deposit for all the waste rock from the mouth of Charlottetown Bay—that is, if left as nature would have it. It is easy to see how the parts not cribbed have grown, while the cribbed parts have wasted. This is quite natural. If the wear is altered, come in in its own way, it will leave a deposit every time as it thins down and recedes slowly, but give it something to butt against then the undertow is so strong that it will take away more than it gives. Then an undermining process begins, that is precisely the way it has acted with the Bel River Bar where cribbing has been done. Certainly if it was excavated down to solid rock, and a concrete core put in it would stand, but the expense would be enormous. To show that I am not only in my infancy, we will take for example similar formations, and they are legion. It will suffice to mention a few of them in the province of Quebec. At New Richmond, in the Bay of Fundy, there is a bar, a base at the south end of one mile and gives pasture to numerous herds of cattle, sheep and horses, and is the home of our native sea birds. There is no trace yet of the last year's work, which has been missing over 45 hours.

we come to Malbaie. Here we have the Shebrooke Lumber Company and several other small mills, and fishing stations. The bar is a deposit of rock for all the waste sand and rock from the mill and sawdust of the mills and many places the banks are several hundred feet high. Here you will see a mountain of rock half washed away, showing the remaining half facing the sea. This gives the promise of lots of waste to increase the sand bar. We will again mention the Grand Pabos which I think is a very old formation. It is better wooded than any I have seen. Let me say a word about Port Daniel. When I first saw the bar there, there was just a few old fish snacks and drying apparatus and several patches of potatoes. Now you can see the sand bar of the Bel River. The large store of the C. Robin Coles Co., some hotels and a continuous row of dwelling houses. It is not necessary to say anything further to prove my contention along the lines I have mentioned. Let me say leave Bel River Bar alone, let it gather all the logs, stumps, brush, seaweed, shells and sand—nature's own furnishing—and a thousand years hence it will have more than double its size. There is no more reason to think that Bel River Bar would be washed away than any other formation of the same kind, or that nature would change its inevitable laws. It certainly was a stupid thing on the part of the government to ever begin it, but to trust you will give this place in your valuable paper.
