A large number of our young gentlemen are leaving us daily for the summer work in Campbellton mills.

THE TRAIN SERVICE.

As the time for the change of timetable for the I. C. R. draw near it behooves the citizens of Campbellton to make up their minds as to what they wish to do and endeavor to obtain more satisfactory service.

For years we have patiently put up with a state of affairs which would not have been permitted by any progressive community.

Look at our service here of Campbellton today. Here we have three trains leaving between 4:45 and 7:45, all bound east, and not another passenger train in the same direction until the night freight at 7 o'clock in the evening.

Mails arriving here during the night cannot be despatched until the following night. If a business man has an engagement at 10 o'clock, and he wishes to get out of town he cannot leave unless he takes the night freight, until 4:35.

By the first of July we will have the Ocean Limited leaving here shortly after 9 o'clock, which will make four trains east chasing one another within a few hours.

What should insist upon is a local train carrying mails to leave here about 11 o'clock, running through to Moncton, making connections with the night trains for St. John.

This matter should be easy to arrange, especially during the summer months. The Maritime express could pick up any traffic for points east of Moncton.

This is a matter of considerable importance to Campbellton and should be dealt with at once.

The ice in the Restigouche broke up Saturday afternoon and commenced to run about four o'clock and by yesterday afternoon the river was nearly all clear of ice.

Logs Go Out. About two thousand pieces of lumber belonging to W. H. Miller, which were swept off a landing by the ice jam up river went out in the ice and will be carried to sea.

The steamer which has been at Dalhousie for some days is expected to come up today or Tuesday.

The L. E. Bisset will arrive here Tuesday and will leave Wednesday on her regular trips. She has already delivered one full cargo of freight for points down the coast and sailed Sunday afternoon with nearly a full cargo, which was loaded at Dalhousie. There is at the freight shed here a full cargo and cars of freight are arriving daily.

Mr. Thomas J. Gorman has taken over the Sharpe building and work of fitting it up as the Minto Hotel is being finished. P. J. Smith of the Northern Telephone Company, Toronto, is installing telephones in the rooms. The house contains forty-seven nice large bed rooms with five first class sample rooms attached. The building adjoining the main building on Water street, consisting of F. W. Carr's plumbing shop, Thos. LeBlanc's barber shop and Miss Blake's dressmaking establishment, will be removed and a five three-story building will be erected which will add twenty-five rooms, five of which will contain private baths. A large hall suitable for receptions, dances, etc., will also be a feature of this new section. In the basement there will be four large sample rooms. When finished this hotel will rank as one of the best on the North Shore.

Mr. Gorman expects to open the main house for business on or about the 17th. Work on the other building will be commenced at once.

Mr. Gorman is a first class hotel man and no doubt will receive a large share of the public's patronage.

(From Saturday's Graphic) One of the most disastrous fires which has ever scorched this town was discovered at Harquail's wood-working factory this morning shortly after midnight and the entire plant, together with lumber was destroyed as well as some of the surrounding property.

The Alarm. At 12:40 citizens were startled by hearing the factory whistle give its alarm. This continued for some minutes when it ceased. Not until five minutes later did the power house sound a general alarm which was immediately responded to by the fire company and citizens generally.

The fire fighting apparatus was promptly on the scene and several good streams were soon playing on the fire, but with little effect, as the flames had gained rapid headway among the dry material.

Caught in Boiler Room. The fire appeared to have caught in or about the boiler and engine room, and rapidly spread to the wood-working shop, dry kilns and warehouses.

In the dry kilns and warehouses were piled large quantities of dry material which made good food for the flames and it was not many minutes until this fine establishment was a prey to the fire.

A Gallant Fight. The firemen made a gallant fight to save the adjoining property and with reckless daring succeeded in doing good work, despite the danger from falling smokestacks and burning timber.

One Man Injured. Early in the fight Monte Cantwell, one of the fire company was seriously injured by a falling smokestack. He was carried to the house of I. C. R. Inspector Duncan Nobis, when Dr. Pinault was speedily summoned. Other members of the fire company had narrow escapes.

Little Wind. The south easterly wind which was gently blowing carried the burning embers up through the business and residential centres of the town and for a time there was danger of a general conflagration. Happily it had rained quite heavily in the evening, and was raining slightly during the fire which reduced the danger from embers to a minimum.

A Noble Fight. The firemen made a noble fight to save the residence of Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail, and just when it was thought they were successful the fire themselves out liability for damage building caught fire inside and it was only after it was flooded with water that the blaze was extinguished.

The residence further up Queen st. occupied by Mr. Ernest Blair, and owned by Mr. D. H. Sheals, was early doomed. Mr. Blair removed his household effects to a vacant lot in a much damaged condition. This property was valued at \$2000.00 and is insured for \$1200.

Fires were started on the roofs of numerous other buildings, but were extinguished before they had grown to dangerous proportions.

A number of cars loaded with lumber were in the factory yard, but they were removed.

A Clean Sweep. At the present time all that remains of this fine establishment is a few of the lumber piles to the rear of the factory site, where also were situated two warehouses.

The loss is estimated at \$60000.00, on which Messrs. Harquail have \$20000.00 insurance on the whole property.

Robert Smith's property on the corner of King and Queen streets was totally destroyed. It is valued at \$40,000.00, on which there is \$10000.00 insurance.

The Latest. As we go to press the fire is under control. The firemen are to be complimented in the manner in which they have proved that it was simple. In the early stage of the fire the steam engine was coupled to a hydrant on Water street and forced two powerful streams through long lines of hose.
