Mr. D. T. Black, the newly appointed engineer of the Water and Sewerage department of the town, arrived Thursday morning and is busily engaged examining the plans of the Water and Sewerage systems and inspecting the several paths of the works, in company with the retiring engineer, Mr. Williams. In order to become thoroughly acquainted with the details of the work entrusted to him, Mr. Black was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he received his literary education, as well as his engineering training. He studied Civil and Sanitary engineering and surveying in the University of Edinburgh, and has since had an extensive experience in surveying, drafting, water and sewerage installations, municipal and sanitary plumbing and house drainage and he holds a first class certificate in all these branches, from colleges and engineering schools, as well as master Plumber's Association, both in Scotland and Canada. He has been in the employ of a Montreal firm for the past year. He also holds testimonials of excellent character and industrious habits from leading firms where he had been employed. Out of upwards of 60 applications for the vacant position of engineer of the water and sewerage department, we believe the committee have selected just the kind of a man the town requires, as in addition to the work of the department with which he is particularly connected, he will also be competent to act as inspector of plumbing, and the town surveying, lay out new streets, etc., and do all the work of a municipal engineer generally, thus saving the additional expense annually incurred by these extra services.

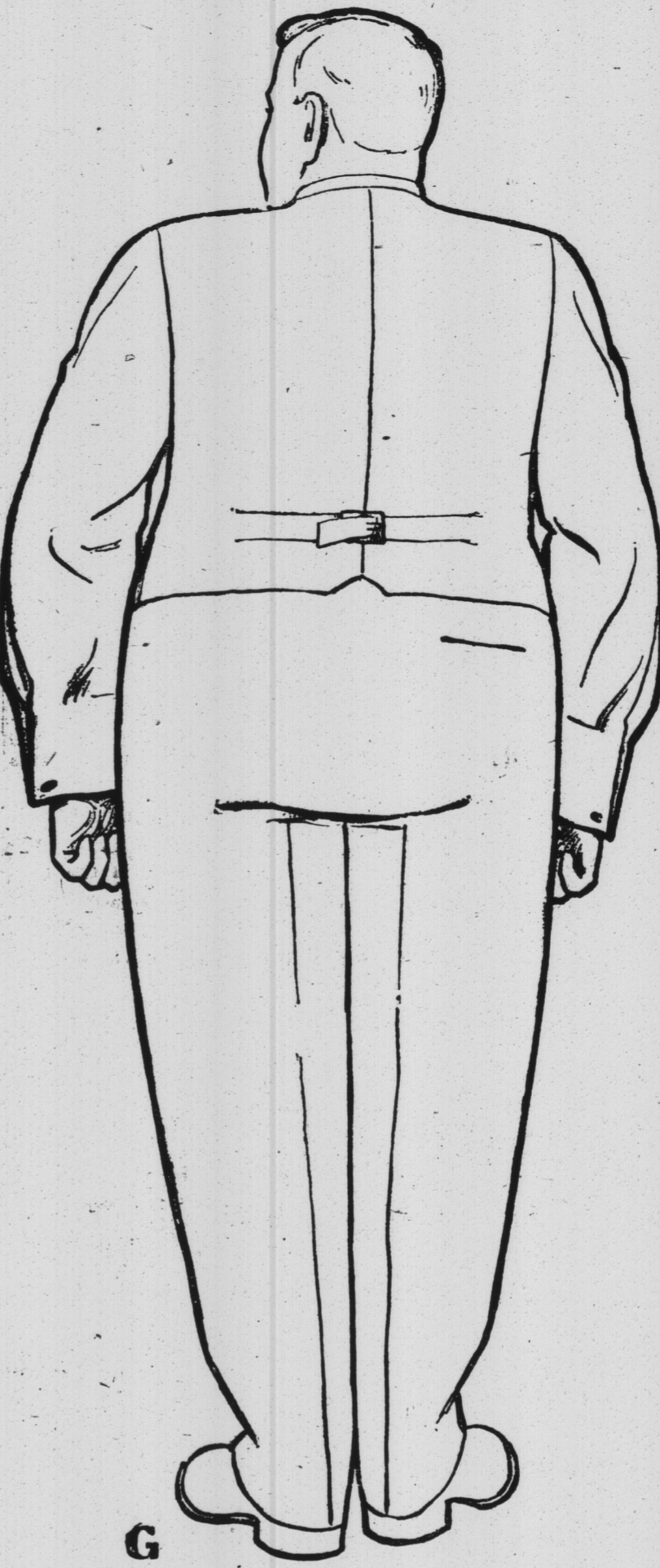

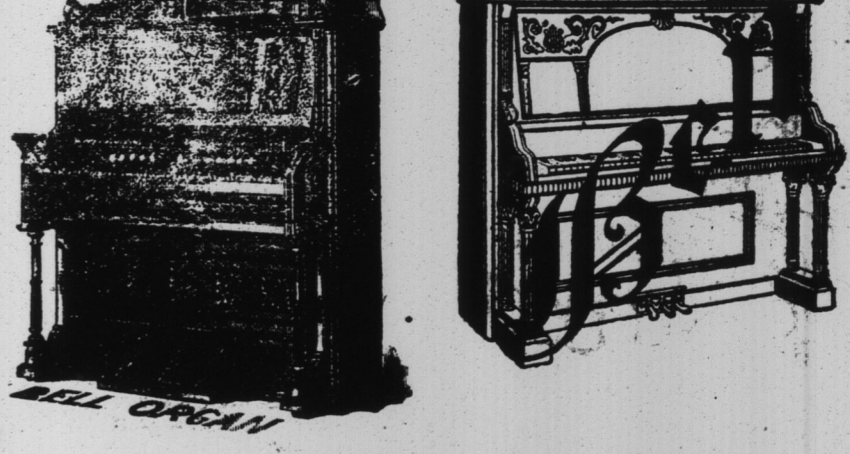
