

LOCAL NEWS.

CHARTER EXTENDED.—The House of Commons has passed a bill extending the charter of the Peoples Bank of this city.

ACCIDENT.—Byron Pickard, the little son of Harry Pickard, of Gibson, fell and fractured his collar bone Monday morning. Dr. Coulthard was called.

COLORED MINISTERS AT MARYVILLE.—The Celestial Colored Ministers showed at Maryville on Monday evening. The entertainment was a good one, and highly satisfactory to the large audience present.

TRANSFER OF PROPERTY.—Councillor Burt, of Keewick, has purchased the Hogge property on Queen street, next above the Hoop, and opened a grocery. He disposed of his property at Keewick to Harvey Lawrence.

FIFTY DOLLARS AS COST.—Judgment was given by the Police Magistrate on Tuesday in the case of John McCoy, for violation of the Scott Act. The defendant was adjudged guilty and the usual fine of \$50 and costs imposed.

CHALLENGE FROM ST. STEPHEN.—The St. Stephen curfew laws challenged before the Police Magistrate on Tuesday, for a challenge to a match, four rinks a side to be played at St. Stephen on the 18th or 19th inst. The St. Stephen boys agree to come to Frederickton later on.

SOCIAL.—A very pleasant and successful ball was given by Mrs. Montgomery Campbell at her residence, Queen street, on Tuesday evening. There was a large number of guests present and a most admirable programme was satisfactorily carried out.

ST. JOHN LIQUOR CASES.—The St. John liquor cases were called before the Police Magistrate on Tuesday. They all turn upon the question whether or not the Scott Act, which was in force in Portland before the union of the cities, but not in St. John, is in force in Portland since the union.

ROBBERY.—Some boys belonging to town broke into the Charlotte Street School, and besides disturbing the desks and blackboards and destroying several books, stole some articles belonging to the teachers. Some of the stolen goods have been recovered. The police have the matter in hand.

WATER RATES AT WOODSTOCK.—The New Brunswick Railway will be required after the first of April to pay the following rate for water at Woodstock: 25 cents per 1,000 gallons for the first 500,000 gallons; 20 cents per 1,000 for the next 500,000 gallons; and 15 cents per 1,000 gallons for all over 1,000,000 gallons.

WILL NOT PAY TAXES ON THE BRIDGE.—In the Supreme Court on Monday it was decided by the full court that the Frederickton and St. Mary's Railway Bridge Company was a railway company within the meaning of the local Act of Assembly, 33 vic. chap. 46, affecting such companies, and that as such is entitled to be exempted from taxation on all property used for railway purposes. The bridge therefore will not be taxed.

They have passed a long and happy life, and are surrounded by children—grand and great-grand children. Death of Col. Robinson. Lieut. Col. John Robinson died this (Saturday) morning at his residence in this city. The deceased was a well-known figure about town, and though not given to indiscriminate friendships was much liked by those who knew him. Of recent years he has lived a retired life, but his younger days were passed amid scenes of excitement and danger. He served with distinction in the Crimean war, and no doubt the disease which finally took him off was contracted in the first place in the trenches before that stronghold. Col. Robinson also took part in the suppression of the Indian mutiny, and was in the Chinese war when the celebrated assault was made upon the Taku Forts, in which he distinguished himself by the Victoria Cross, the British, French, Turkish and Sardinian medals for service in the Crimea; the India medal and the China medal.

Election Petitions Filed. A protest has been filed in the Supreme Court against the return of Messrs. Blair, Wilson, Anderson and Bellamy, as members for York county. One William McKay's name is used as a petitioner. Messrs. Charles H. W. Blair and John Beadle Gunter are sureties for the petitioner's costs in the matter. He has not been in good health for some time, and his illness has recently been increased by the illness of Mrs. Miles, in addition to the falling health for several months of his son Lewis.
