THE GOVERNMENT

WILL WIN.

A Good Majority for Legere Assured.

A ROUSING RECEPTION AT BUCTOUCE.

The Government Carry Everything at the Nomination Proceedings.

The political meeting held at Buctouche last Friday night was one of the grandest political occasions ever tendered any public man in this country, and from the minute the meeting opened all doubt as to the result of the campaign, if such indeed there had been, vanished, and every body had but one feeling, to wit, that Legere would be elected by a handsome majority. The temperance hall, in which the meeting was held, was packed to the doors, and the enthusiasm was intense when hon. A. G. Blair, accompanied by hon. C. H. Lablillou, M.P. for Restigouche, Auguste Legere, the government candidate, J. A. McQueen, M.P. for Westmorland, C. J. Sayre of Richibucto, and hon. O. J. LeBlanc entered the hall. At three o'clock the speaker for the attorney general and the government candidate, John C. Ross, the chairman, read the address of welcome to Mr. Blair, to which the attorney general made a fitting reply.

Auguste Legere, the government candidate, was the first speaker. He spoke in the French language and was loudly cheered as he told his audience how he had taken a hand in favor of the government and ridiculed the idea of Mr. Goguen, posing as an independent candidate, while he was controlled by Messrs. Phinney, Stockton and Alward, the rankest opponents in the province to Mr. Blair. Mr. Legere denied that he was a turn coat, as Mr. Phinney had stated, and pointed from Phinney's speech to show that he (Phinney) had been elected to support Blair, and was here to-day to support Blair, and was here to-day to support Blair, and was here to-day to support Blair.

Mr. Legere is a fine looking young man, an excellent speaker, and will make a good representative.

Hon. A. G. Blair was received with thundering applause. He defended the position of the government, and in language that brought the round after round of applause showed up the political career of Messrs. Hanington, Stockton and Alward. He challenged the opposition to prove that the province was in a bad financial condition as they claimed. It never stood better. He exposed Mr. Powell's attitude in connection with the whitewash bill. Mr. Blair's speech was the greatest ever delivered in Kent; for over three hours he held his audience spell bound.

Other Speakers.—Hon. C. H. Lablillou, of Restigouche, made an eloquent speech. Mr. McQueen, M.P., of Westmorland, was called for and made a happy speech. He defended premier Blair and made an appeal for Legere and good government.

C. J. Sayre, of Richibucto, made a telling speech in favor of the government candidate and held up the leader of the opposition to great ridicule. Comparing him to the man who stole Smith's pig, and when challenged as to why he had done so, he said: "Well, I have nothing against Mr. Smith but I like his pig." Hanington was in the same position.

The meeting was a grand success for Blair. Premier Blair was afterwards banqueted at the Bay View house, and it was daylight in the morning when the greatest political gathering ever known in Kent broke up.

Nomination at Richibucto.—The nomination proceedings at 2:30 Auguste E. Legere and John Goguen having been nominated, Mr. Legere, amid calls from the large assembly present, began to address the electors. In 1890 he was not in full sympathy with the government, but since then they had removed the only grievance he entertained against them. They had reduced the stumpage and favored colonization. He was every canvas started against him in the county by Messrs. Stockton, Powell and Phinney. The white wash bill, Northumberland deal and the financial problem were all splendidly handled amid the cheers and laughter of the very large majority of the attendance. He discussed Mr. Phinney's attitude on the stumpage and railway subsidy questions. He carried the crowd as he recalled home his points. He had invited Mr. Stockton to meet him here, but Mr. Stockton had not come to time. Mr. Blair's speech knocked the last peg from under the opposition cause in Kent.

Mr. Phinney then came forward, but gave way for Dr. Legere, M. P., who amid cries from the crowd, "Why are you not at Ottawa?" struggled along for about twenty minutes in a weak attempt to explain his attitude in this election. He made a slanderous attack on Mr. Lablillou, who, at the close of Dr. Legere's speech, was called by the audience to reply. Mr. Phinney wanted to be heard, but the crowd was determined to give Mr. Lablillou fair play, and on Mr. Phinney insisting on being heard, the government supporters, about three-quarters of all present, left the court house grounds and heard Mr. Lablillou from another platform. Mr. Phinney, finding only about fifty left to listen to him, spoke only five minutes and then gave up.

Mr. Wilson then addressed the audience and for an hour delighted them with a spicy and powerful speech, reading the public accounts committee report to refute Mr. Powell's charges. He made a grand impression, and terminated the day's proceedings by calling for three cheers for Blair, which were given and the nomination was over. The government stand to win by a handsome majority, and Legere's stock went up fifty per cent.

St. Stephen Races.—The circuit races at St. Stephen Thursday were a great success, being attended by about 1,200 people. All the events were interesting. In the 245 class, Louis J. A. horse owned by John Gibson, Woodstock, won in three straight heats. Geo. Carvell's Speculation captured the 232 class.

A BLUENOSE SARATOGA. A Trip to St. Andrews, the Saratoga of New Brunswick.

It is to be regretted that the pleasure trip to St. Andrews via the C. P. R. last Saturday so roster patronized, has been one of the finest trips to be had, as it passes through a large portion of the best cultivated land in the province. Leaving Fredrickton by the 7.15 train, we speed along the Irons between Fredrickton and Fredrickton Junction, past farm houses of thrifty farmers, who may be observed taking advantage of the momentary suspension of fine weather (about the nearest they can get to it now-a-days) by starting into their harvesting which has been so delayed by the heavy rains. Towards the last named place the clearings become more pronounced and arriving at the village itself with a rush and a roar, we land at the station, there to await the St. John train. At McAdam, where we again change cars, the C. P. R. train from the west is two hours late, which involves that much delay, during which time we visit the extensive railway works. At this point we bid farewell to a great many passengers who have been our companions from Fredrickton, but who are now on their way to St. John, and very soon after, the larger majority, going from their native homes to earn their living in that country. Our train arrives at last, and we seat ourselves for a pleasant ride on the fastest train on the road—no doubt, the fastest in the world. After a ride of about two hours, we arrive at Watt Junction where we again change cars for St. Andrews. The scenery along this line, from Watt Junction to the sea, is very beautiful, and the lakes that abound are large and present a fine appearance. About twelve o'clock we arrive at St. Andrews and stop at the well-known and excellent hotel, the Grand Hotel. The arrangements for the comfort of the guests are perfect. We visit the numerous places of interest, such as the Algonquin and Argyle hotels, the Fort, etc. The grand cathedral, in its very best style, called the Emergency band, which is parading the streets. The band was composed of musicians from Calais and St. Stephen, who have been camping on the island opposite St. Andrews for some time. After a late breakfast next morning, we take the Sunday excursion boat for Eastport, and enjoy an excellent view of St. Andrews harbor and the surroundings. On arriving at Eastport, the principal feature that attracts the attention is the large number of sardine factories, which line the wharves. The steamer here connects with the New Brunswick, from New York to St. John, and very little time is allowed for visiting the town. However, we take a run through the principal street, the extreme irregularity of it and its companion streets attracting much unfavorable comment, as well as the dirty appearance of them. On returning to St. Andrews, a number of the party disembark, but the remainder proceed as far as St. Stephen and Calais. Arriving at the latter named place, particular notice is attracted to the large amount of shipping on the American side compared with that of the Canadian. During the evening we visit the principal points of interest in Calais, and passing over the toll bridge arrive at St. Stephen. Next morning we arise at 5.30, having barely time to swallow a hasty bite and catch the train. At Watt Junction we meet the rest of our party, and speed home house wains modernizing a good deal to bring it up to the requirements of travellers.
