His contract is for three million feet of lumber.

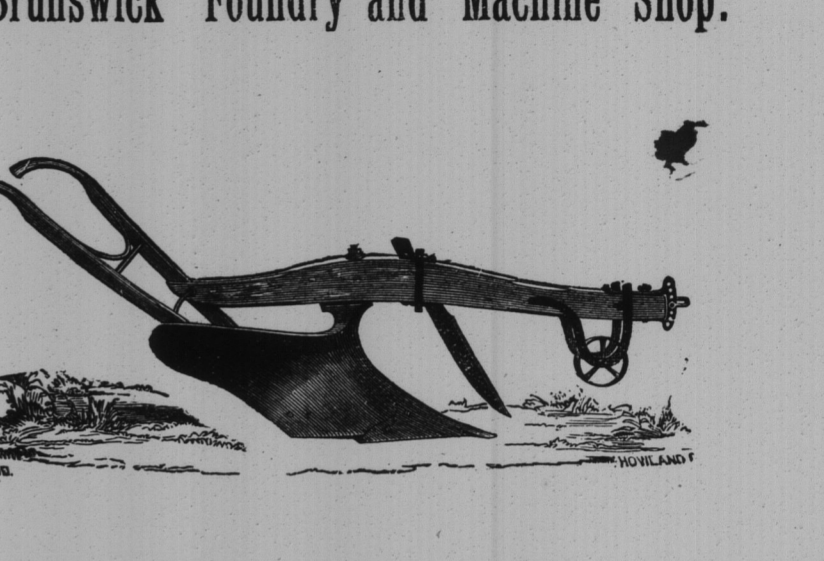
