AROUND THE WORLD

The Week's Events in Brief—The Cream of our Exchanges. Mr. Wm. Richards' mill at Chatham, closed for the season on Saturday last. Bets are freely offered at ten to six that Cleveland will carry the presidential election.

The imperial government has issued an order prohibiting the importation of five Canadian cattle. Up to date 42,000 barrels of apples have been shipped from Kings Co., N. S., to the English market.

The death of Robert Grant, professor of astronomy in the university of Glasgow, at the age of 78, is announced. Hon. Edward Blake has left Toronto for New York, whence he sailed to England to remain for the session of the imperial parliament.

A barrel of live eels in salt water, from G. W. Mitchell, Arichat, C. B., was shipped through last night by the Canadian Express Co., for England, per S. S. Danara. Osman Digna, who has been reported dead some times, has reappeared in the Sudan with a number of followers, has occupied Sinkt and has raised close to Sudan.

For the first time in the history of Dalhousie college, an application for admission has been received from a colored student. The young man, William Johnston, belongs to Halifax. Detective John J. Casey, of New York, was shot and instantly killed Thursday night by James D. Blanchard, a Chicago crook, whom Casey attempted to arrest. Blanchard was finally locked up.

Twenty persons living on a farm at Groitay, Poland, have been poisoned by eating the flesh of a cow which had suffered with cattle plague. The poisoned persons died after suffering great agony. Fred Shultz, the escaped convict from the Manitoba penitentiary, was arrested at Drayton, Dak., Thursday morning, and will be held for extradition. This the Ottawa authorities have applied for.

Phillip Cox of the Grammar school staff is now in the general public hospital undergoing treatment for a severe abscess of the neck. His place in the school is being temporarily supplied by Mr. Manning. The New York Times says it is learned from a trustworthy source that a cable despatch was received in that city yesterday from Lord Dunraven stating there will be no race for 'America's' cup next season.

Three masked men rode to the bank of Spearville, Kansas, Wednesday, two of whom dismounted and went inside the bank. At the point of which they swung the cashiers to hand over \$10,000. They easily made their escape. John Allen, employed in a mill at Brazil lake, Digby, N. S., had his eyesight destroyed this evening. While he was attending the melting of some metal a portion of the molten brass splattered in his face, with the result above mentioned.

The printing outfit of the Toronto Sun, the proposed association organ, which is very satisfactory, as it is not pleased to think that a man holding the position of premier of a province of the dominion should be guilty of such acts as were charged against him. John Jackson, editor and owner of the Calais Advertiser since its foundation, over fifty years ago, died at his home in Calais Thursday night. The paper has been consistently republican from its first issue, and its aged proprietor was one of the best known and most highly respected citizens of Calais.

At the Conservative meeting held in Segge's Hall, St. John's, a few nights ago one of the speakers said that an effort was to be made to give work to the people in order to stop the exodus. Five car loads of exodians went out the evening before who will not share in the coming benefits. On the night of Saturday last one of the public school houses in the town of Newcastle was discovered to be on fire, and although every effort was made to save it, the building was burned to the ground. There is every reason to believe that the fire was the work of an incendiary.

The Baptists of Harland, Carleton county, who were expelled from the church some time ago on account of the sanctification question, and who afterwards organized a reformed Baptist church, have erected a handsome little church, which is to be opened for divine worship on Sunday, November 6th. The C. P. R. train bearing the Pacific marines reached Moncton on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. The train consisted of twelve cars, and carried 420 men. It took less than seven days to cross the continent. The men go aboard the troop-car 'Tyne' at Halifax. The blue jackets to replace these reached Halifax on Friday.

A search for the articles proved fruitless until one of the attendants heard a ringing which seemed to come from the inside of the man. Investigation showed that the lunatic had swallowed those three articles. He eats as usual and seems to suffer no inconvenience from the assortment of hardware which he so strangely secreted.
