On Tuesday afternoon, Sheriff Sterling, at the court house, declared the result of the poll in York, and speeches were made by the candidates. Mr. Allen, Messrs. Finder, Hove and Pitt made what their friends call speeches, although with Mr. Hove's log rolling, and Mr. Allen's unlimited thanks, there was very little to interest anyone. Mr. Finder had not got fairly started when the name of Lucy caused him to quietly subside.

When the Hon. A. G. Blair rose to speak, it was instantly seen where the affections of the people were placed, and the cheers that time and again caused him to stop speaking were but a response from hearts that knew the great leader as a man and as a statesman. It was no fulsome flattery, but a just tribute to worth.

He reminded them that it had been his endeavor night and day to devote his best energies to the interests of York. He stood before them defeated, but not humiliated. This county had rejected him, but in every other section of the province there was a feeling that he had deserved better treatment at the hands of York than he had received. Some of the opposition candidates appeared to feel keenly the statements he had made in the city hall and elsewhere that they did not fitly represent the intelligence of the county. The best proof that this statement was justified, was that the public mind to-day was not satisfied with the selection it had made. (Applause.) The feeling of the county now was one of extreme regret, that they had allowed themselves to be carried away by a

Whirlwind of Religious Passion. He referred to some length to the infamous circulars and canvases used against the government ticket in the campaign. The charge that he was simply a tool in the hands of the church of Rome, and that he was opposed to equal rights, was an atrocious falsehood and a grievous wrong to the Catholic people. At every polling station in the county, men were found denouncing the government because he had written letters to Catholic priests, saying that if he got the Catholic vote he would guarantee them separate schools. A more diabolical falsehood never emanated from a political opponent. He wished to say that never from his entry into public life, until now, had a Roman Catholic priest or layman suggested that any privileges should be conferred upon them, as distinguished from other citizens. He did not believe they wanted any such privilege, and they had sense enough to know that he would not agree to

only any such concession. The only action ever taken by the government, at the instance of the Catholic people, as regards the school law, was taken by the King government seventeen years ago. That regulation was made in good faith to secure harmony between the two classes of people, and was the present government to be held responsible because they would not record it?

Mr. Blair then referred to the lying report in the Sun, that in the very hour of his defeat he had been hunting around for a new constituency. He trusted that he

Received their Support. It is needless to say that no such letter was ever written by me.

Another important influence was the apathy that prevailed among our friends. No one thought it possible that this county would choose four men of the description of the opposition candidates to represent the county in the legislature, and it was impossible to make any friend of ours believe that there was any ground for anxiety as to the result. As very conclusive evidence of the existence of the apathy, I would refer to what I have referred to, the fact that there were polled in the neighborhood of a thousand votes less than in either of the last two elections. The absentees were certainly not those who were opposed to the government. I might also say that the ordinary influences which appear to enter quite freely into elections nowadays were applied with more than the usual force in this contest. I am satisfied that the reforms I carried out, including the abolition of government house, and of the legislative council, so far as this constituency is concerned, have been a source of weakness rather than of strength.

Purely Local and Exceptional. There was very little discussion in the county during the campaign. The opposition candidates, for obvious reasons, did not do much talking. What they did say, personally some four or five meetings, and was absent from the county a considerable portion of the time. I am free to realize that I could not foresee the possibility of York county selecting the opposition candidates on either personal or political grounds in preference to the government ticket. I am thoroughly satisfied that the result has followed upon one of those spasms of public feeling which occasionally spring up with great suddenness, and which when they have passed away, leave a good many regrets behind them, even on the part of those who have been subject to their influence.

"What do you think of the verdict throughout the province?"

"It is a source of great personal gratification to me, and is quite a consolation in my mind, to realize that the country has so heartily and universally endorsed the administration, and answered with such emphasis, those who predicted defeat as the result of my appeal to the county."

"Are you willing to state in line of action you will now likely take, yourself?"

"I have really not turned the matter over in my mind as yet. The question as to what I myself might do does not appear to be a very material question, since the government has been

so handsomely sustained. There can be no doubt but that the crew will be able to navigate the ship, even though the captain has dropped anchor. I think there is in the ranks of the government party, as returned, all the skill and ability required, and certainly as much as can be found in the opposition, to say the least."

"It is stated that efforts have already been made to induce you to sit for another constituency?"

"It is true that there have been friends who have already expressed their willingness to vacate their seats if I desired to offer, for any other constituency, but the only notice I have yet taken of any of these offers has been to express my heartfelt appreciation of the kind spirit which has prompted those who make them. What course I may decide upon taking, will, of course, in a great measure, depend upon the views and wishes of the friends and supporters of the party throughout the province. I shall not take any hasty action, however, either as to my future location or as to my movements in a political way."

OTHER COUNTIES. Saturday's result has been a sweeping victory for the government. Although strong men were out on the opposition tickets yet a beggarly twelve show themselves as having been elected. Charlotte, Carleton, and York, are the only counties in which the opposition has succeeded.

St. John's. The result in this county was a triumph for the government. The opposition was defeated by a large majority. The result in the different counties with the vote for each candidate is as follows:

Restigouche. The government got a strong support in this county, Hon. C. H. Labllois and W. A. Mott having an easy victory over Murray, a voter, and J. C. Barabie. The vote stood:

A FEW PRESS OPINIONS. Privilege and Honor. If York is anxious to follow the banner of the opposition leader (and it will lead them in some strange places) there are other counties in the province that would feel it a privilege and an honor to be represented by a man of such attainments as Hon. Mr. Blair.

Will Accept a Seat (Albert Maple Leaf). The defeat of Mr. Blair in York has called forth a general expression of regret, and some six seats have been placed at his disposal. Will he accept the attorney-general's plea we cannot at present state; it seems altogether probable however that he will accept a seat and give to the government the advantages of his excellent abilities and long experience.

There is a gang of repeaters who have succeeded in York and St. John and also tried it in Kings with varying success. The only way to end such a disreputable business is to disfranchise the district in which it is done. And the present is a good time to commence.
