The Men who are the Unanimous Choice of the Convention.

MR. BLAIR ADDRESSES THE REPRESENTATIVES.

A Congratulatory Motion.

The convention called by the friends of the local government on Thursday was largely attended, their being delegates from every parish of the county, all of them being representative men.

The hon. attorney general addressed the convention. He said: "You are no doubt aware that the present term of government might have continued to March 1884. The election that took place in Jan., 1880, under the law gave to the representatives then chosen a term of four years and three months. It was a consideration with the government whether to continue to the end of the term or to terminate the life of the hon. members of the government."

After speeches from the candidates thanking the convention for its support and pledging themselves anew to work in the interests of the province and York the convention adjourned sine die. This was the largest convention ever gathered in the interests of a local government within this city and all parts of the county were represented by men who carry with them the assurance that the night of the 22nd will see their nominees the choice of the whole people.

MURDERED.

Fred. Titus of Gibson Fatally Shot.

A Negro Barber His Dastardly Assailant.

Never perhaps in the history of the city and vicinity has such a shock been felt as on Wednesday night at half past eight when it was learned that Frederick Titus, of Gibson, had been killed at St. Mary's by a shot from a gun fired by either Oliver McMichael or his son Charles.

It appears from the many confused reports that there had been quarrelling during the week of shooting a ticket, and the convention adjourned to meet at two o'clock. Many who had not reached the city in the morning were present after dinner and when Thos. Barker, chairman of the committee, handed in the following names: WILLIAM WILSON, THOMAS BARKER, JOHN ANDERSON, as their unanimous choice, there was a burst of applause that carried with it conviction that York was still in sympathy with the government and the four men who had represented that county during the past.

With Deep Regret.

The St. Andrew's Beacon, speaking of the death of Miss Annie Moore, of St. Marys says: "The readers of the Beacon will remember Miss Moore as one who taught the primary school a few years ago, and while in that position she was ever regarded as faithful and painstaking in every way. We regret to chronicle her death at such an early age. Her earnest christian work for her sister has doubtless won that eternal life which is more than the fleeting shadows of earth."

The funeral will be conducted under the auspices of the Orange order, taking place from the residence of deceased, Gibson, at two o'clock on Sunday afternoon, the interment to be at Sunny Bank.

The prisoners were brought from the jail to the police court on Thursday morning when they were remanded till this morning. Many comments are made on streets as to the right which a man has to take life, some contending that a person should not protect himself even to taking the life of his assailant. His honor, Mr. Marsh, has on several occasions stated that very few cases arise in which a man is justified, only when he cannot retreat and save that his life or another. A person assaulted has the law to defend him and must appeal to that, he cannot take the law into his own hands.

The inquest took place before Coroner Dr. Coulthard at the office of the Clerk of the Peace, occupying Thursday and Friday nights. The jurors were Walter Broderick, Isaac Barlow, W. H. E. Duffie, Geo. Hayward, Geo. Golding and Charles Brown of Gibson.

The evidence showed that the deceased and Alex. Atchison were in the barbershop most of the afternoon, that a wrestling match took place between deceased and the old man when the boy interfered, that the fight turned to anger and that after Titus and Atchison went out to see the fight changed on both sides. It was also shown that the boy came to the door and deliberately fired the shot that killed Titus. That there were a number standing round and did not attempt to stop the fight, although some two or three had interfered when the fight was in progress and tried to make peace.

The jury was out three hours and brought in a verdict of manslaughter against the boy. They also severely censured the magistrates of St. Marys for gross negligence of their duty. No charge was made against the old man. Other who was not at liberty this morning.

York will return its old representatives, Messrs. Blair, Colter, Wilson and Anderson. No opposition has yet been announced. Charlottetown will harmonize its interests in the persons of provincial secretary Mitchell and hon. Geo. F. Hill with a strong ticket.

In Albert bon. H. E. Remmon and Dr. Lewis will combine forces and give a good representative in the government interests.

A. D. Richard of Dorchester, A. E. Killam of Moncton, J. W. V. Smith of Moncton and Geo. Copp of Bato Verle will contest Westmorland in the government interests.

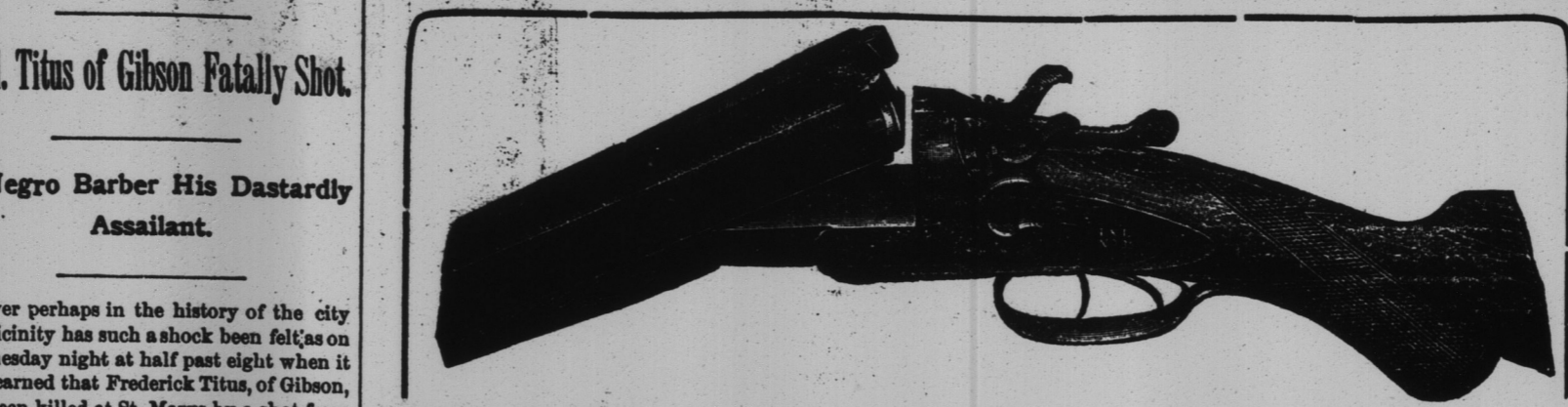
