**LOCAL NEWS.**

**Cook.**—Several good hauls of cusk have been made since the river closed.

**To Lecture.**—Prof. Stockley, of the University, is to lecture for St. Matthew's Guild, Halifax, Dec. 18th; subject, The Women of Shakespeare.

**Taken to the Asylum.**—Joseph E. Colter had to be taken to the lunatic asylum on Tuesday afternoon. It is hoped that he may soon recover.

**Exams.**—Examinations have been in progress during the week at the normal and collegiate schools. The test at the former institution admits to higher classes.

**Fined.**—A farmer, of Douglas, was fined on Monday for trotting across the bridge when ordered by Mr. Miles not to do so. His honor imposed a tax of seven dollars.

**Insurance.**—The cost of the fire appliances has brought up the question of insurance, and a special committee was appointed at Tuesday night's meeting of the city council to investigate the matter.

**Storm and Calm.**—After the storm comes the calm, so it appears, particularly with respect to aldermanic affairs. All the topic last week, the calm has come this week; what is to follow, whether gentleephyr or hurricane is not forecast.

**Last Blocks.**—Parrott Brothers, of Millville, are making extensive preparations for the manufacture of last blocks near Canterbury station. They have set up a twenty horse power engine on land owned by E. Depew, and have a large quantity already sawed.

**The Last Act.**—The last act in the Kelly-Scott tragedy at Andover was performed on Monday night when Kelly cut a hole through the jail, close to the door, and escaped across the line. It is thought he has gone to Washington territory.

**The Sunbory North.**—William and Harry Chestnut left on Wednesday for Florida where they intend to spend the winter. They have taken a complete camping outfit and will add to their already large knowledge of natural history in the fowling state.

**The Curve.**—It is expected that trains will be able to reach this city before Xmas last in the woods on Maryland hill. The greater part of the road-bed is completed, and tracklaying will be rushed. Should the snow hold off a little longer the work will be done in a fortnight.

**McInerney Elected.**—The election in Kent county on Tuesday last to fill the vacancy in the house of commons caused by the death of Dr. Legere, M. P., resulted in the victory of George McInerney, conservative, by a large majority. The returns are: McInerney, 1,082; Johnson, 601; LeBlanc, 783.

**Made a Night of It.**—Harold Babbitt and two companions took a tramp on Sunday last in the woods on Maryland hill. On their return they became confused, and had prepared to make a night of it when they were found about midnight. They were pretty well tired out, hungry and cold.

**Frozen Over.**—On Monday night the river opposite this city was frozen over. Owing to the very heavy wind which drove the ice, there are many large openings in the field, but one night hard frost will complete the work. The river has been open later this season than for the past fifteen years.

**The Late Fair.**—The accounts connected with the late exhibition have been audited and a very fair showing is made. The ex-works successful financially, and district agricultural society, No. 24, under whose auspices it was held, have determined on holding an annual fair. They have purchased the sheds on the fair grounds at a cost of \$600, and are negotiating a lease of the grounds for nineteen years.

**Under Fire.**—The infantry school men still continue to cause more or less excitement. There is a court martial going on most of the time for some irregularity, but all misdemeanors are petty in their nature. This week private Kiddy, who deserted about two years since, has been under fire. Corp'l Richardson, who acted as a volunteer on Sunday last, is confined to the cells, and will have his turn in a few days.

**Lumbering.**—The lumbermen to haul into Deer Lake this winter are John N. Grant, Peter Dunham, Hill and sons, and several smaller crews. John B. Merrithew, on Lacout stream, will put in two million feet of hemlock and spruce; he had a large crew working since early fall. E. H. Dow, Russel, Joy, and another firm are also hauling into the same stream. Yarding is difficult on account of absence of frost and snow.

**To Help Themselves.**—The intention of the St. Mary's firemen is to purchase a first class fire apparatus or none at all. A plan is on foot to get the village incorporated and then issue debentures to the extent of \$300, which will buy the engine and a full supply of tools. The village requires protection, and although the city is kind when a fire breaks out, yet it is not proper to expect the city to pay taxes to protect the village.

**Welfare Bridge.**—W. Brewer's crew have returned from Welsford, Queens, where they have completed an iron and stone bridge over a branch of the Meric. The bridge is of one span, thirty-eight feet long, and is necessary to build a long approach, which made considerable stone work. The branch of construction was superintended by Ernest Shields, of St. Mary's. Alfred Haines is rushing the work at Moncton as fast as consistent.

**Board of Health.**—Dr. Bayard, of St. John, was in the city on Tuesday attending a session of the provincial board of health at the Queen hotel to conclude the year's business. The secretary's report dealt with the precautions to be taken against cholera next year. He reported the result of the inspection of the quarantine station at St. John, and said that all had been made satisfactory. A thorough cleansing of their localities will be ordered by local boards in early spring.

**Hen R. Bellamy's Will.**  
 The will of the late hon. R. Bellamy, of Southampton, York Co., has been admitted to probate. The estate is valued at \$6,000 of which \$7,000 is personal. The property is disposed of as follows: Janet Bonald, the farm at Southampton on which he resides, valued at \$600; John Anderson, ex-M.P.P., \$1,000; G. S. Ingraham, Southampton, \$1,000; Victoria hospital, \$1,000; Jacob Allen and daughter Minnie, Southampton, \$500 each; T. W. Purvis, Millville; Rev. Wm. Ross, Prince William; John Turner, Rivere DuLoop; R. B. Turner, his grandson; G. W. Grant, Southampton; and Richard Allen and daughter Minnie, Southampton, \$500 each. G. S. Ingraham and Jacob Allen are executors, and Havelock Coy. proctor for the estate.

**The New Brunswick telephone company** have added a new apparatus to their trunk line between Fredericton and St. John which completely stops that loud ticking noise, which has heretofore been a source of annoyance, and is not afraid to try out whatever money is necessary to insure the best service.

**CANTERBURY STATION.**  
 Dec. 5.—There have been a number of deaths here during the past fortnight. Francis Laughlin, John McCanna, and Mrs. Parsons, three old and well known residents, were buried during the same week. The following week a child of Thomas Callinan of Skiff Lake, and John Nicolson, one of the oldest residents of the village, passed away. Mr. Nicolson died from cancer of the stomach; he was an old railroad man, having worked at the building of the N. B. and Canada road and on it for over twenty years. For the last few years he has been engaged during the fishing season as guide for the Skiff Lake fishing club.

**John McDonald, who has been working in the woods in New Hampshire, came home a few days ago, having injured his leg while rolling logs. Upon examination Dr. Revelly found that the leg was broken in two places; but owing to being very much swollen, the doctor was unable to set it until Sunday—over two weeks after the accident.**

**T. Falconer, who broke his leg a short time ago, is doing as well as can be expected, and we hope to see him around again soon.**

**The concert, to take place on Christmas eve in the Methodist church, is expected to eclipse anything of the kind ever given here, and a big crowd is expected. The program will consist of the latest songs, expositions, tableaux, recitations. The management expect to make this even more pleasing than any with which they have yet delighted their Canterbury audiences.**

**The C. P. R. are building a new tank completely similar to that at Debec Junction. The water supply from the old tank will be brought to the street for the convenience of the public—that is if suitable arrangements can be made with the C. P. R. The new tank will be supplied by a steam pump.**

**George A. Bennett, better known as "Bub," has gone west for the winter, and we all wish him success.**
