NEWS FROM THE STIRRING VILLAGES OF YORK.

Milville. Nov. 22.—Four-fifths of our male population...

There is considerable sickness here and vicinity and Dr. McNally is doing a rushing business.

Our merchants, Purvis, Jones and Estey, report business dull—money at a premium—but are looking forward for things to live up during the Christmas week.

Brother Ted seems to have his hands full of work; the sound of his anvil is heard in the wee sma' hours.

The interest took place in the Milville cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, when a large number of his friends and neighbors gathered to pay their respects to his memory.

We are having our first snow fall today which, from present appearances, will not amount to very much.

Our farmers are looking forward to the action of the government at Ottawa making better trade terms with our American neighbors.

They think that with a democratic government in the states, the present tariff relations could be materially changed.

Marysville. Nov. 24.—The saw and lath mills closed down Monday night for the season.

They have been sawing night and day for the last five weeks, to finish up the logs, having been delayed by low water during the early part of the season.

They had a little over 20,000,000 feet of these some 2,500,000 were frozen up at the mouth of the Nashwaak, but the steam tug Champion and G. D. Hunter arrived last night and took the logs out.

They kept a mile or two from the mill and will return for the rest. The tugs had to break ice all the way from the head of the Reach, in some places three inches thick.

Wm. Worth, an Englishman who arrived here about two months ago, and was employed in the mule room in the cotton mill, died suddenly on Tuesday morning of inflammation of the brain.

He was a widower and had two children in England and had intended returning home the first of next month. His remains were interred in the Marysville cemetery on Thursday afternoon.

What might have been a very serious accident, happened in the single mill on Saturday afternoon. The drum on the main shaft burst and flew in three pieces.

One piece of iron fell on the head of the engineer, David Tapley, and another piece struck the stairs at the feet of John Tucker, who was just coming down.
