

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

Introduction of Newly Elected Members.

The opening of the dominion parliament Thursday afternoon was the most brilliant spectacle of the kind for many years, the glorious weather permitting the ladies to grace the senate chamber in unusual force. His excellency's mounted escort was supplied from the Princess Louise Dragoon guards under captain Gordon. Lord Stanley delivered the following speech:

Honorable Gentleman of the Senate:
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:
In meeting you at the commencement of another session of parliament it affords me pleasure to congratulate you on the continued progress which the history of the past year unfolds with regard to Canada. The increase in trade as illustrated by the exports and imports during the period for which the official returns have been prepared have been most gratifying, and that increase has continued down to the present time, with promise that the volume of trade during the current year will exceed that of any year in the history of the dominion. The revenue of the country have likewise provided for all the services for which parliament has made appropriation, and the operation of the government railways has been less burdensome as regards the difference between income and expenditure than has been the case for a long term of years previously.
