SCHOOLS DEBATE.

Dr. Alward's Amendment Voted Down.

Regulations Supported by Both Sides of the House.

(Continued from last issue.)

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said: He for one was willing to stand or fall by his conduct in this matter. Twenty years ago he had been elected on the school question; he had endeavored to allay the religious animosities that then existed, and by no act of his since then had he endeavored to interfere with the principle of free non-sectarian schools. No one who had the welfare of the province at heart ought to desire to see the terrible condition of those early years revived. The question should be fully discussed by the committee of the whole house where all that was said and done would go before the people, who would not make a government at any time.

On motion of Hon. Mr. White the question was laid before a committee of the whole house.

On Wednesday on the order of the day being reached, Hon. Mr. White, seconded by Mr. Robinson, moved the following resolution:

To strike out all after the word "resolved" and insert the following: "That the petition number 29 of Henry Chestnut, William Lemont, J. A. Vanwart, and 117 other ratepayers of the county of York, praying that a committee of the whole house be appointed to inquire into the extreme Protestant contumacy, he would not support the government for an hour if he believed that they were pursuing a course of undue favor towards the Roman Catholic people. He challenged the opposition to point to a solitary item of evidence to establish that charge. This matter had been thoroughly fought in the general election and also in the county of Queens and the people had ratified the course of the government. The weapon they had raised against the government would prove to be a boomerang.

On the order of the day being reached the clerk read the reading of the returns, correspondence, etc., in the Bathurst schools.

The house at 4:30 p. m. resolved itself into a committee of the whole, Mr. Killam in the chair. The chairman read the petition number twenty-six in re public schools matter.

Upon the chairman asking what action the committee proposed taking, no response was made and a motion was carried that he should leave the chair.

Hon. Mr. Blair said he observed with great surprise the entire absence of hon. members who had been promising this petition to propose that any action should be taken. It could not be said at all events, that the government or its supporters had treated the petitioners with disrespect. They had felt that the petitioners, if they believed that grievances existed, were quite within their right in bringing them to the attention of the house and asking that they be remedied. It could not be said that those who had been employed in circulating these petitions and bringing them before the house had treated the petitioners with disrespect, for there was not a single name of them who felt himself willing or unable of suggesting what action should be taken upon their complaints. It was matter of extreme surprise to him that these gentlemen, who were ready enough in election campaigns to stab the government in the back, should now be dumb before those whom they had accused. Since the hon. gentleman opposite had no proposition to make as to what action should be taken upon the petition, he would propose a motion or two himself. He proposed to ask the house to express its opinion with regard to the regulations which had been imposed, and as regards the conduct of the government in the administration of the regulations. He would afford the hon. leader of the opposition an opportunity of getting down from the nicely balanced and elevated position he occupied between the two parties, and of declaring whether the regulations were right or wrong. He proposed to make these gentlemen declare their opinions, or else quietly retire from the assembly. With reference to the suggestion that the government had not honestly administered the school law of this province, Mr. Blair denied that charge entirely. He asked the opposition to state wherein the law had not been carried out, in conformity not only with the spirit but with the letter of it. The leader of the opposition had vaguely intimated the other evening that the government ought to have done something which they did not do; but he had failed entirely to indicate just what that something was. The second paragraph alleged that special privileges had been granted to the Roman Catholic church, implying possible for the members of religious orders of that church to qualify for teachers, without submitting to the rules enforced upon other candidates for license. He meant no disrespect to the petitioners when he stated that they had signed this document without a knowledge of the facts. It was only now that the house itself was fully informed upon the facts. As a matter of fact this statement was entirely incorrect and no evidence worthy of the name would be adduced to show that any regulations had been published in the press of education which were in conflict with the free common non-sectarian principles of the school law. He said that statement as a simple matter of justice to the former government, which did not contain one Roman Catholic member in its ranks. They were published in the press and no protest or objection had been made to them, either in the house or country. The committee was familiar with the terms of these orders. He would only refer to proposition No. 2 and the reply made to it.

PROROGUED.

On Saturday last, the Dominion parliament prorogued. The governor, general Lord Stanley, addressed the members, as follows:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate—
Gentlemen of the House of Commons—

In relieving you from attendance in parliament this year, I congratulate you upon the energy and promptitude with which you have disposed of the duties of the session just ended and upon the useful legislation which has resulted therefrom.

The assembly at Paris of the Baling arbitration tribunal gives reason to show that the differences which have existed between the government of the United States and the government of the Dominion have been satisfactorily adjusted, while the nomination of the prime minister of Canada as one of the arbitrators offers its guarantee that the interests of our sealer will be properly and thoroughly safeguarded.

The treaty of commerce which was negotiated with France on behalf of Canada has been laid before you, together with the correspondence which passed during the negotiations, but owing to the late period of the session at which the treaty was received and the pendency of communications as to its bearing in respect of the most favored nation treatment and the interpretation of certain clauses, your government has thought it advisable to postpone for the present its ratification by parliament.

I thank you for the ample provision you have made to protect the country from the possible introduction of cholera, and I trust that the precautions which will result in guarding against any danger from that source.

The liberal provisions made for the proper representation of Canada at the World's Fair will, I doubt not, enable the country to make a worthy exhibit of her resources and progress among the nations of the world.

The various acts which you have placed on the statute book will contribute to the maintenance of public security and the continued peace and tranquility of Canada. I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the requirement of the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate—
Gentlemen of the House of Commons—

I feel with deep regret that the period of my official connexion with the dominion is drawing near to a close and in all probability I am taking leave of you for the last time. Let this should be the case I desire to avail myself of the present occasion to testify to the welfare of Canada and my sincere affection for her people who have never failed to testify their loyalty to the person and the throne of our sovereign and show kindness and consideration to her representatives. It will be my earnest desire to be of service to the dominion, and I shall continue to cherish feelings of the warmest solicitude for the welfare and prosperity of those amongst whom I have been placed during the past five years.

I pray that the blessing of Almighty God may at all times attend you.

The session has been famous rather for what has not been done, than for any useful legislation enacted. It was believed that there would be considerable changes made in the tariff, but Foster has asked for another year of high taxes, and has put Sir Charles Tupper in a dilemma and either he or Foster will have to take a back seat.
