Charles McAdam's residence at Douglas was burned Tuesday.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council will be held next Tuesday evening.

Mr. Edwards, of the Queen, was receiving congratulations last night, on the thirteenth anniversary of his wedding.

The University students gave the usual cannoodle Friday morning, and must have been well satisfied with their efforts to disturb the sleeping citizens.

The 71st Batt. band gave an open air concert on Parliament square Thursday evening to a large crowd of people, and next week they will play up town.

The Son of England, in a body, attended service at St. Ann's church last Sunday and listened to an interesting sermon by their chaplain, Rev. Canon Roberts.

The value of dutiable exports from Fredericton during May was \$17,480, of which \$14,800 was in shingles, and the imports for the same month amounted to \$18,743.

James Boyer one of the aged residents of Maryville who died on Tuesday, was an Englishman by birth and came to this country forty years ago with the late Hon. R. Bellamy.

The closing public examination of the Normal school will be held next Friday, and the examination for teachers' licenses commences here and at St. John and Chatham on the 12th inst.

The scholars in Miss Bella Miles' S. S. class, Gibson, will give a concert Tuesday evening in the Baptist church. Doors open at 8 o'clock; admission 10 cents.

Proceeds for church purposes will be made on Saturday.

Prof. Duff of Parda University, Lafayette Ind., formerly of the N. B. University, is to be married at Kingsclear, June 18th, to Miss McIntosh, who graduated Thursday from the University.

The Bernard Walker concert company of Halifax, advertised to appear here Thursday evening, did not show up, only thirteen tickets had been sold, and the company got the hint at St. John not to come.

At the police court, Wednesday, the Police Magistrate sentenced Thos Ogden to four months in jail for selling liquor to an Indian and Mrs. Linforth convicted of a similar offense had to pay a fine of \$100 and costs.

Pte. Brechen, who was arrested here last week for deserting from the military school at St. John, Quebec, has been sent back. On Saturday last he made two attempts at suicide in the R. C. I. guard room here.

The gold watch offered by the Independent Order of Foresters of McAdam for the most popular engineer on the Atlantic division of the C. P. R. has been won by Robert Donaldson of the Fredericton branch, he having received 930 votes.

The University students entertained their friends to an informal dance in the main hall of that institution, Thursday evening, and the young folks present had a very pleasant time. Excellent music was furnished by Hanlon's orchestra.

The N. B. Telephone Co. have connected Florencia and Centerville, and express their intention of continuing the line to Hartland, crossing the river to Victoria and thence to Woodstock. They are now connecting Woodstock and Houlton.

A full house greeted the St. Dunstan's amateur dramatic club, Tuesday evening, when they played with remarkable success "More sinned against than sinning," a striking drama from the pen of John I. Carleton, the well known St. John lawyer.

The boys' brigade concert in the city hall, Monday evening, was not largely attended, but it was a pleasing affair. The boys went through the physical drill and fancy marching in fine shape, their singing was fair, and Miss Gilmore's and Mr. Mayes' solos were well received.

Rev. F. D. Davidson expects to spend Sunday, June 24 at Millville, and his pulpit will be supplied as follows: Gibson, 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.; Rev. J. H. Saunders, of St. John; Maryville, 3 p.m.; Rev. E. Saunders, D. D., pastor of Fredericton Baptist church.

Monday's express from Fredericton to Chatham did not arrive at the latter town till five o'clock Tuesday morning. An axle of the tender broke between Blackville and Chatham, and one was obtained from a box car about three miles away and substituted for the broken one.

During the month ending May 31, 1894, there was deposited in the Fredericton branch of the government savings bank \$14,869, and withdrawn \$12,203. The balance due depositors amounts to \$509,566, representing about 2400 depositors, the majority of whom are farmers in the vicinity of Fredericton.

Over one hundred invitations are out for the wedding of Miss Agnes Wilmet and Dr. Parke next Wednesday. The ceremony will be performed by Rev. H. E. Dibble at the Parish church, Oromocto, at 12.30 p.m.

The bridegroom is to be Miss Mira Randolph of Fredericton and Miss Parke of Quebec, and A. B. Wilmet, the bride's brother, will accompany the bridegroom.

Judge Vanwart, on the application of Geo. F. Gregory, has granted an injunction in the suit of Geo. Creighton, v. Julius L. Inches, restraining Mr. Inches from erecting a new building on Queen street, immediately adjoining Creighton's wooden building, on the ground that Creighton had previous to 1875 acquired the right to the use of light that the erection of a new building would close up.

An officer of the R. R. G. I. takes exception to the Farmer's statement that the officers and men of the school do not take sufficient interest in rifle shooting. He says the men are required to fire hundreds rounds each year in target practice, firing at both stationary and movable targets, and adds that one reason why the school does not enter the rifle league matches, is that they consider that crooked work marks these competitions.

Harry Greenlaw, farmer, of Millville was brought to the city Wednesday night and lodged in jail, having been arrested on the charge of receiving stolen goods from Benj. Dunford, who is now in jail awaiting trial for burglary of R. H. Eatey's store. Greenlaw's preliminary examination is to take place Tuesday. This afternoon Deputy Sheriff Hawthorn went up river to arrest David Greenlaw and John Evans for complicity in the robbery.

Governor Fraser was sight royally received when he called on Admiral Hopkins on board the warship Blake, at St. John yesterday. The Admiral sent his steam launch to meet the Governor, and when he honored the big ship, and when his honor appeared on deck, accompanied by Major Gordon, A. D. C., he was received with a guard of honor. After a pleasant chat with the Admiral, and having a look through the Blake, the Governor on leaving was honored with a salute of fourteen guns. The Admiral, at 11 a. m., today, returned His Honor's visit, calling on him at the Royal Hotel.

The case of Armstrong and others vs. the Canada Eastern Railway Company, was before Judge Archibald at Montreal, Thursday. The plaintiffs, a firm of London brokers, undertook to float the bonds of the Canada Eastern Railway Company of New Brunswick, owned by Senator Snowball and Alexander Gibson. One hundred and ninety thousand pounds of bonds were placed on the London market, the issue price being 97, the company receiving 77. On July 10th the Financial News of London attacked the scheme with the result that the issue of bonds was not proceeded with. Messrs. Armstrong state that the cause of the discontinuance of the issue was the company's neglect to supply them with documents, and they now sue for \$707,921.25.

MARRIED AT SUNRISE.

A Fredericton Wedding the Public Did Not Have a Chance to Witness.

"Society" has been promising itself a treat in the wedding of Miss Aline Harrison, daughter of the chancellor of the university, and Prof. Dixon, of the same institution, and it was announced, without authority of course, that the affair would be made one of the grandest seen in the city for many a day.

The prospective bride was popular and attractive, Prof. Dixon has made many friends since his residence here, and the prominent position of all the parties concerned, together with the usual accompaniments of a wedding at the Cathedral, were likely to render the affair something beyond the everyday events in that line.

But the principals had ordered it otherwise, and the marriage of Miss Harrison and Prof. Dixon must be christened as the "Quietest and Most Undemonstrative of Fredericton's long record."

After the first impression of a grand affair had worn off, and it was alleged to be known to the bride's friends that the wedding would positively take place at the Cathedral in a quiet way at five a. m. Friday morning, the plan among those immediately interested, outside the family circle, was to take the bride and groom by surprise by appearing in force at the ceremony.

The students also had planned for one of the favorite diversions of a lively set off at the C. P. R. depot, when he appeared with his bride to take the early train for St. John yesterday morning.

But alas! all were outwitted, and Miss Harrison was several hours a bride before even her most intimate friends knew anything about it. The interesting ceremony took place at 5 a. m. Thursday morning, and the solitary witnesses were Dr. Harrison and A. G. Harrison, father and brother of the bride, and Rev. Dr. Alexander, who joined the young couple in marriage. There were no coaches, the party quietly walked to and from the Cathedral long.

"Before Fredericton was Awakened, and no whisper of the affair reached the public ear until the afternoon of the same day. Prof. Dixon was down to deliver the address for the Faculty at the University Encenia Thursday afternoon, and not a half dozen in the large audience knew that when he was lastly addressing them on the necessity of a university course in civil engineering, he was inwardly wondering whether he would be able to pull through his effort before the afternoon train left for St. John. However, he accomplished that, and after his address was concluded, he left the library, joined his wife in her home in another part of the university building, and with but a handful of the trunks had gone to the depot an hour before Prof. and Mrs. Dixon sauntered out, presumably to those who saw them, on a

Quiet Afternoon Stroll. But they were really off on their honeymoon trip to Europe, and when the 4 p. m. train to St. John stopped at Salamanca, the rustic little station just beyond the city, it picked up as happy a couple as ever started together on life's journey from Fredericton. That portion of the public who dearly love to witness a first class wedding, for once had been outwitted, and it was evening on Thursday before the accredited report of the nuptials of Prof. Dixon and Miss Harrison got around the city.

The bride, who was the Society's Favorite, at her wedding wore a pretty blue traveling costume, and there was neither bridesmaid nor groomsmen. Although the date of the wedding was uncertain she received handsome presents from admiring friends and many more were ready for the formal announcement of the wedding. Prof. and Mrs. Dixon went from St. John to Boston, and sail at once, thence to Ireland, first visiting the lakes of Killarney, then Dub-dub, the bridegroom's old home, and afterwards London, Paris, etc., returning home in the autumn, before the opening of the university's next term.

The quiet marriage was the bride's choice. She is yet in deep sorrow for the loss of a fond mother, and did not court the excitement and pomp of a public wedding.

UNIVERSITY ENCENIA.

Interesting Closing Exercises Thursday Afternoon.

There was an attendance at the University Encenia on Thursday afternoon that completely filled the large college library and overflowed into the corridors, and the exercises were of an unusually interesting character.

Dr. Harrison, the chancellor, presided, and had beside him on the platform, Dr. Inch, president of the University Senate and Sup't. of Education; Hon. James Mitchell, Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Dr. Travers, J. E. B. McCready and Dr. McLaren, of the Senate; W. Wilson, registrar; Judge Vanwart, president of the Alumni society; Dr. Coulthard, Hon. C. N. Skinner, Prof. W. C. Foster, of Dalhousie College; Rev. Canon Roberts, Dr. Bailey, Dr. Bridges, Prof. Stockley, Davidson, Dixon and Downing, of the Faculty; Havelock Coy, and other gentlemen intimately associated with the institution.

Chancellor Harrison commenced the proceedings by calling on Prof. Dixon to deliver the address on behalf of the Faculty, who, notwithstanding he has so recent a bridegroom and about to start on his wedding trip, read an interesting paper on the place of civil engineering in the University curriculum.

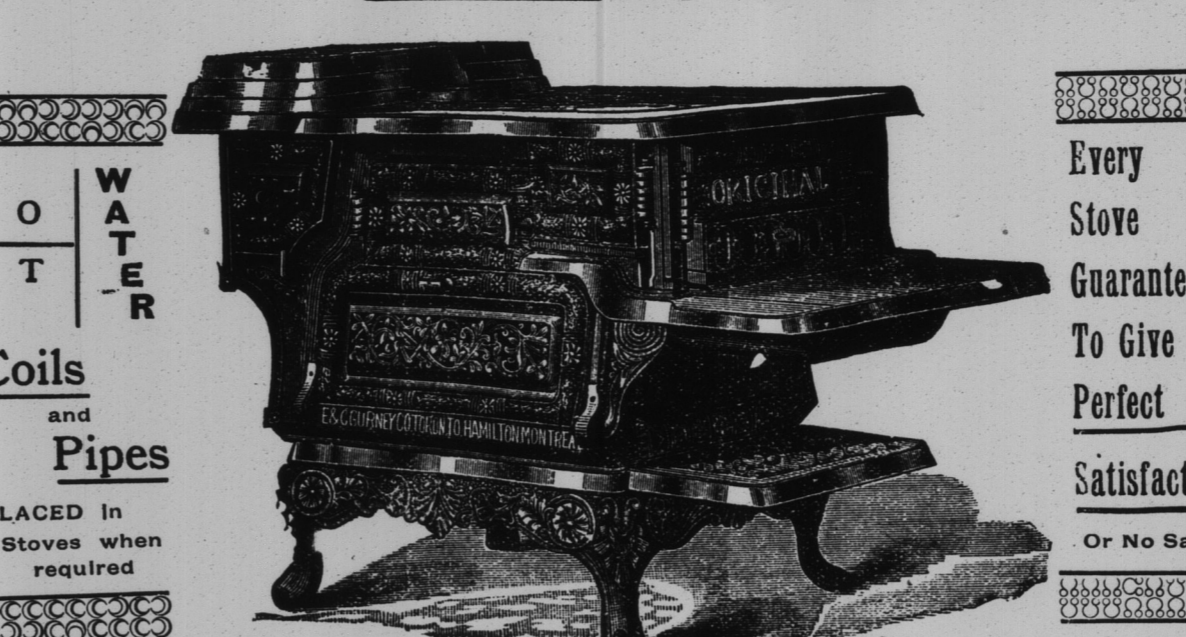

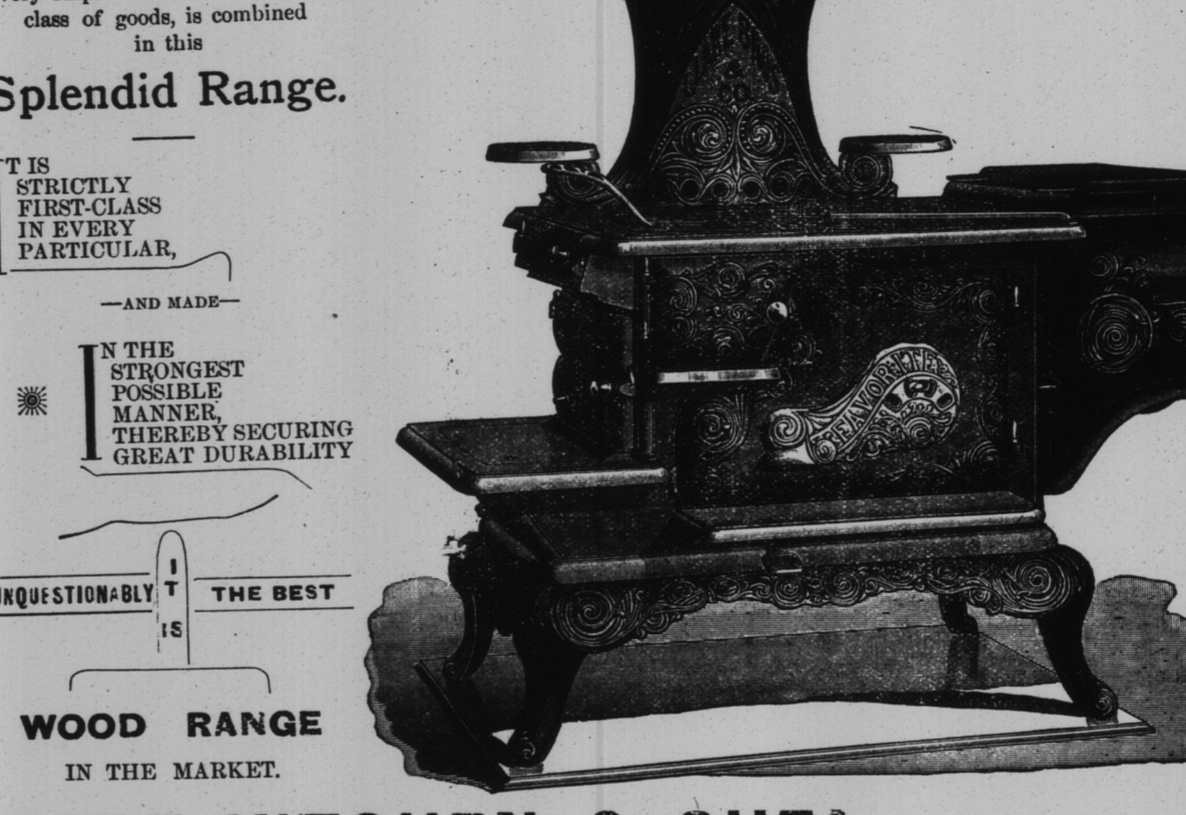

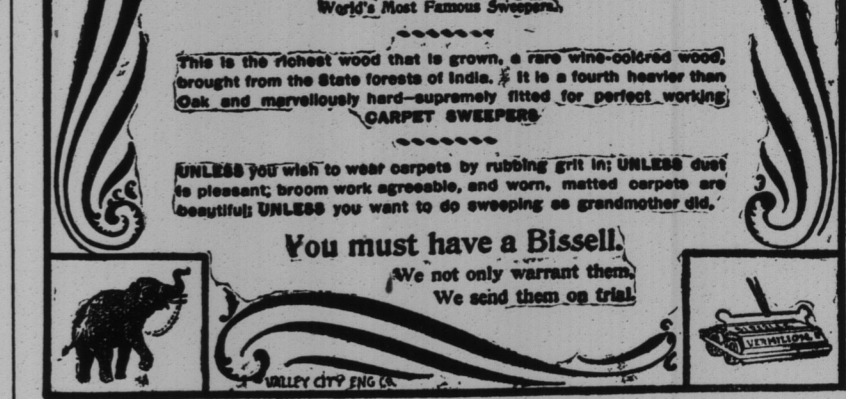
